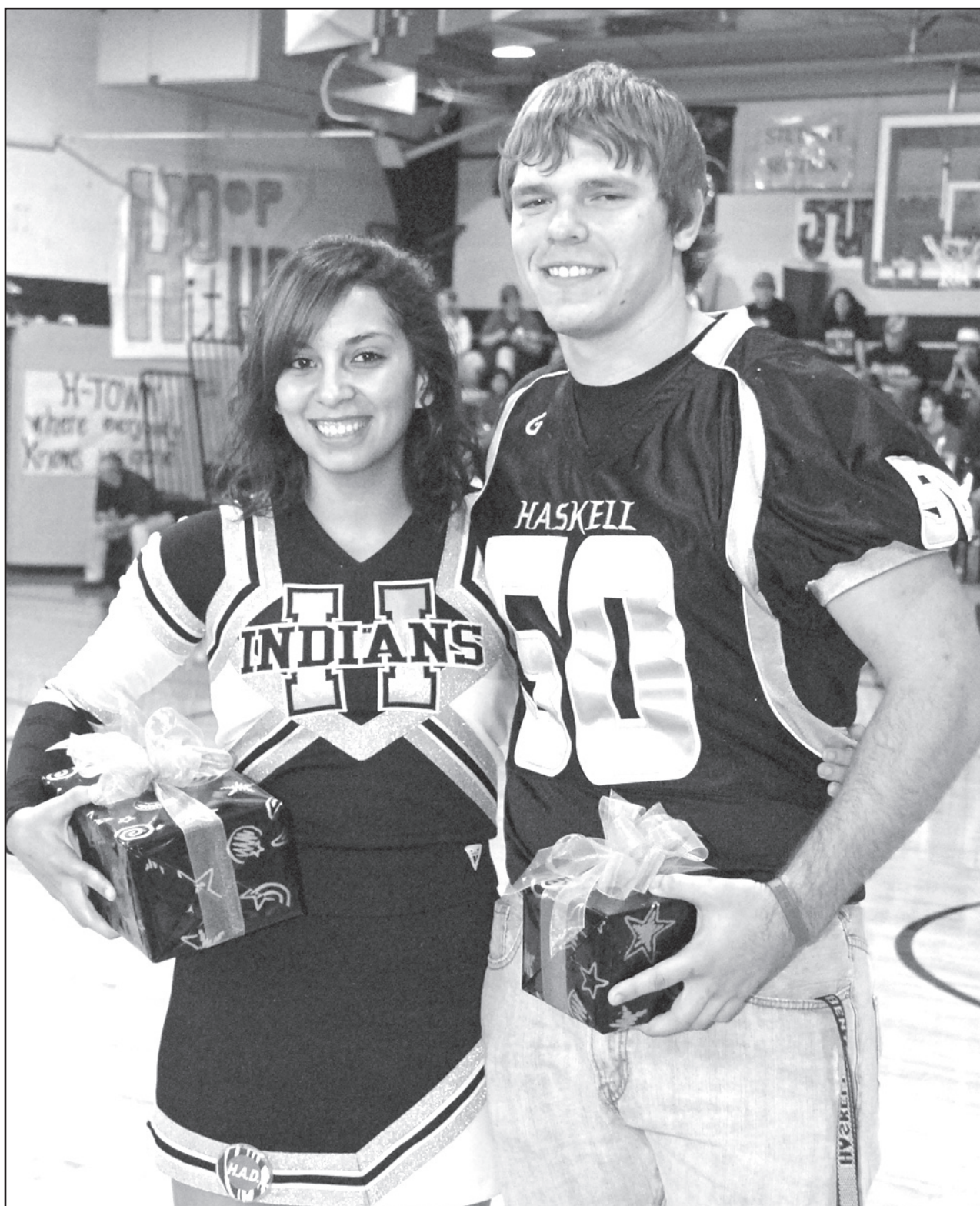

## Collins retires from tax assessor's office

Collins, who was raised up the road in Munday, began her 54 year career, as a deputy tax assessor in Oct. 1955, under the supervision of county tax assessor Elizabeth Stewart.

When her husband Don's job as a DPS trooper required a move to Memphis, Texas in 1957, Collins hired on in that county tax office. She worked there for the next seventeen years. After a three year stint in the Lampasas tax office, it was back to Haskell.

Collins worked as a deputy in the Haskell County office from 1977 until Jan. 1, 1981, when she was elected tax assessor-collector for the county. She has ably served in this position for the past 28 years.

It is with a feeling of satisfaction and a lifetime of wonderful memories that she will retire on Nov. 30.

Collins says her training was the "on the job" type, however she has regularly attended schools for updates and changes, which always seem to come about after the legislature meets.

She has seen many changes in the tax office throughout her career. When she first began, employees were required to stand and type all day. All vehicle registrations were due by the end of March each year. Needless to say, that made for a very busy and stressful month. She even missed Don's promotion ceremony held in Austin, because it was scheduled at this busy time.

Positive changes have made the job easier. Vehicle registrations are now staggered throughout the year. The tax assessor's office no longer collected the taxes

forward to retirement. She plans to spend more time with her family which includes, husband Don, daughter Lindy Barefoot, son David and three grandchildren. She will be traveling to Graham more often to check on her Mom, as well. Collins loves to travel and loves to shop, so she sees both as a part of her future.

Looking back on her career, Collins says, "It just seems like a short time ago, I began working." She adds, "One of the highlights of these years would have to be meeting so many people, because I love to visit."

While she describes her years in the tax assessor office as very enjoyable and lots of fun, she is looking

forward to retirement. She plans to spend more time with her family which includes, husband Don, daughter Lindy Barefoot, son David and three grandchildren. ## Indians outlast Blizzards for Bi-District title

With 1:08 left to go in the third quarter of this Bi-District game, Haskell took the lead on a four yard touchdown run by Quarterback Christian Myers. The PAT kick by Scottie Rodriguez sailed a little left and was no good. The score was 20 to 14. What looked like a sure victory for the Indians became a real nail biter and the outcome was unclear until the final gun of the game. The good guys prevailed and became the 'Bi-District Champs.'

Haskell scored on their first possession of the game moving some 45 yards on eight plays and took the lead on a five yard touchdown run by Christian Myers. The PAT kick was good—Haskell 7, Winters 0.

On the Indians' second possession, they moved the pigskin 82 yards on a 15 play drive. A complete domination of the first quarter. Quarterback Myers passed to fullback James Williams to cover the seven yards needed for the touchdown. Scottie Rodriguez added the PAT kick. The Indians lead 14 to 0. The Blizzards came back at the 4:02 mark of the second quarter on a seventeen yard touchdown pass and added the extra point kick to make the score Haskell 14, Winters 7 at intermission.

Winters tied the score when they scored on another pass play for five yards and added the PAT kick. Score was 14 to 14 with 7:45 left in the third quarter. Haskell would score on a Myers 4 yard run to take a 20 to 14 lead to start the final and nail biter quarter. The Indians secondary had three interceptions during this important game. One by Myers, one by Williams and one by Kelson Aguero, free safety. These three picks helped save the day.

Haskell advanced to the area game against Seymour at Clyde Stadium on Fri., Nov. 20. Kick off is 7:30 p.m.

The Indians had 51 rushes for 242 yards. Myers had 12 carries for 57 yards and two touchdowns. Myers passed for one touchdown on a seven yard play to Williams. Tyler Rodriguez had 16 carries on 75 yards while Williams got 110 yards on 23 rushes. Williams caught two passes for ten yards and Marco Gonzalez caught two for 18 yards. Myers was 4 of 5 with no interceptions in the passing department.

He was stationed in the Pacific in World War II, including service on the island of Guam, and served until June 6, 1946. Upon his return from World War II, he graduated from Mississippi College with distinction in 1948.

He began his career as a chemist with The Texas Company (later to become Texaco) in 1948 in Port Arthur. There he met a school teacher, Anne Katherine Rike (Katie) of Haskell. They were married July 3, 1955.

In December of 1961, he was transferred to Texaco's Research Center in Beacon, New York. During his tenure in New York he worked with Texaco's Supply and Distribution Division at Texaco's Headquarters in New York City. In August of 1979 he transferred back to the Texaco Research Lab in Port Arthur where he worked until his retirement in 1985.

Upon retiring, he was elected as an elder at his church, Presbyterian Church of the Covenant in Port Arthur, and volunteered at St. Elizabeth's Hospital in Beaumont.

His competitiveness and love of games converged when he entered his first

bridge tournament in 1991. Duplicate bridge then became his specialty. He won the United States Rookie of the Year (ACBL) title that same year and became a Life Master in 1993. From then on, his mission was to partner with Katie and help her earn her Life Master award. That turned into an eight year project, accomplished in 2001.

In 2004, the couple moved to Denton to be near their son John of Trophy Club.

He was preceded in death by his parents; two brothers, Odell and John William; and one sister, Thelma Thornton.

Survivors include his wife of 54 years, Anne Katherine Rike Winstead; sons, Stephen and wife Amy of Houston, and John and wife Windi of Trophy Club; seven grandchildren, Andrew and Daniel Winstead, Devon James, Cora, Seth and Jessica Winstead and Dakota James; a sister, Josephine Roberts of Hattiesburg, Mississippi; a brother-in-law, Curtis Thornton of Morton, Mississippi; a sister-in-law, Mildred Winstead of Townsend, Tennessee; and brother-in-law, John S. #### Gubernatorial candidate Hutchison to hold her Senate seat through Republican primary

AUSTIN—U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison announced her intention to stay in the race to be the Republican Party of Texas' nominee for governor while continuing to serve in the Senate.

In her Nov. 14 address in Houston to the Texas Federation of Republican Women, Hutchison said she would not give up her Senate seat as long as a national health care bill and cap-and-trade energy legislation are on the table.

"I realize this will keep me in the Senate past the primary election," she said.

Recent polls show incumbent Gov. Rick Perry leads Hutchison by about 12 points.

#### Senators question commission head

At a Nov. 10 hearing of the Senate Committee on Criminal Justice, John Bradley, newly appointed chairman of the Texas Forensic Science Commission and Williamson County district attorney, said the commission had no written policies or rules yet and that guidance from the Legislature is needed.

Sen. John Whitmire, D-Houston, chair of the criminal justice committee and dean of the Senate, asked Bradley if the commission would continue to investigate the arson report that contributed to the Cameron Todd Willingham murder conviction and recent execution.

Bradley, who Gov. Perry brought in as chair when the investigation of the Willingham case already was in progress, said the commission will continue, but he refrained from stating a timetable for doing so.

Whitmire asked Bradley if his role as a district attorney presented a conflict of interest for him. Bradley said he believed it did not.

Some committee members expressed concern over whether the commission would conduct its business in an open and transparent way. Bradley responded that confidentiality is critical in the early stages of the investigatory process.

Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, raised questions over the governor's possible influence over the commission. Bradley countered with an insinuation that Ellis's position on the national board of directors of the Innocence Project might be a problem.

Sen. Juan "Chuy" Hinojosa, D-McAllen, said he wants the commission to focus on forensic mistakes and prevent

"junk science" from entering into the legal process.

#### New agency absorbs old duties

A new state agency, the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, opened Nov. 2.

The "DMV" is taking over certain responsibilities formerly shouldered by the Texas Department of Transportation, the Texas Department of Public Safety and a few other agencies.

TxDOT will provide services and facilities to the DMV until the agency can stand on its own.

Gov. Rick Perry appointed former car dealer Victor Vandergriff as chairman of the nine-member board that oversees the agency.

Created last spring by the 81st Texas Legislature, the DMV will have about 650 full-time employees, who will carry out the following responsibilities:

- Vehicle titling and registration;
- License plates;
- Disabled driver placards;
- Vehicle dealer licensing and enforcement;
- Motor carrier operating authority;
- Grants to law enforcement to prevent vehicle theft; and
- Texas Lemon Law assistance.

The Texas Department of Public Safety will continue to issue driver's licenses.

#### Slower economy cuts into revenue

A tamped down economy has slowed spending enough to result in decreased state sales tax collections.

That might force a downward adjustment in state revenue. And that, in turn, could mean stop-gap measures may be needed to keep government functioning smoothly.

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs, whose job it is to make revenue estimates and keep the state fiscally on target, suggested that sales tax revenues this holiday shopping season, which extends into the new year, could improve the picture.

Combs is expected to give a new revenue estimate by the end of the month.

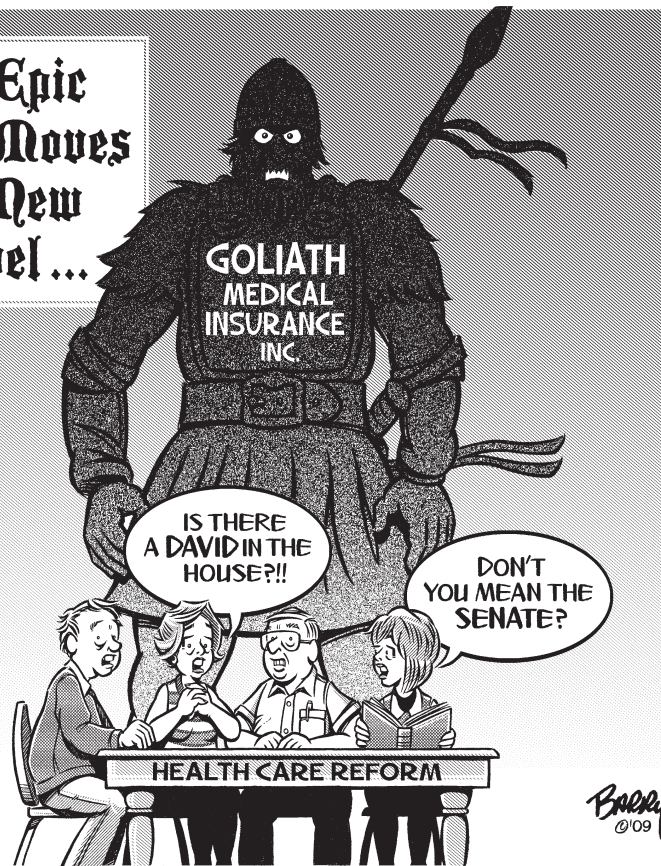
#### Texas still behind on H1N1 doses

The Texas Department of State Health Services regularly places orders in efforts to get the Lone Star State's current allotment of the vaccine, which is 3.3 million doses.

## City Council report

The Haskell City Council met in a regular meeting Nov. 9 with Mayor Bob Smith, Mayor Pro Tem Sue Medford, and Councilmen Chan Guess, Randy Bowers and Robert Tribbey in attendance. Councilman Jason Hall was absent.

An ordinance was approved regulating the sale of alcohol within the city; providing distance requirements for alcohol sales near public and private schools, hospitals, churches and day cares; providing for the issuance of permits; providing a severability clause; providing for the repeal of ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing for publication and providing an effective date.

A resolution authorizing the mayor of the City of Haskell to execute a letter of waiver for payments in lieu of taxes relative to the Haskell Housing Authority was approved.

During a public hearing, Mayor Smith swore in three witnesses, Elisa Sosa, Israel Sosa and Willard Mullins who testified in the substandard structures public hearing.

These cases were heard: One involving the property located at 504 N. Ave. B, Block B, Lot 6, Martin Addition owned by Israel Sosa;

One involving the property located at 608 S. Ave. E, Block 51, Lot 1 Section (65.5x84), Original Town Haskell, owned by John Narvais, lien holder—Office of the Attorney General Child Support Division;

One involving the property located at 1308 N. Ave. G, Block 2, Lot 3 NWC (50x140), Robertson and Day Addition owned by Herb Beslanowitch;

And one involving the property located at 501 N. Ave. E, Block B, Lot 1 and South 10 ft. of Lot 2, Tandy Addition owned by Willard Mullins.

Each property was found to have structures being dilapidated, substandard, unfit for human habitation and a hazard to the public health, safety and welfare; that the property be repaired, removed, demolished, any holes filled, lot cleared, any wells capped, and cesspools filled within 30 days.

Motions concerning all cases were approved.

City Administrator Brandon Anderson reported:

• The golf course board will meet Nov. 10 to elect a new chairman and make some important decisions regarding the future of the golf course.

• Results from the election were positive for the city. Both the local option and the water tax passed.

• A conversation with the representative from Stripes revealed they plan to rebid their project for the Haskell site and hope to have the location completed by mid 2010.

• Members of the Public Works Department have attended two schools recently. One was a waste screening training and one was a water school.

• Anderson will meet with the local representative from the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission on Nov. 10.

• Owners of the Arrowhead Motel have become motivated sellers and in the near future plan to sell that property so new owners can get the property cleaned up and use it for better purposes.

From the beginning, we have assigned our leaders the awesome task of guiding our nation through the storms of war, economic crisis and social conflict. Some of them were undoubtedly better at it than others, and all of them were a mixture of virtues and weaknesses. Nonetheless, they had one thing in common. They all prayed for God's guidance whenever they had to make a major decision that would affect our destiny. That was the secret of their greatness, they had the humility to rely on a higher source of wisdom. Those of us who don't bear that much responsibility would still do well to follow their example and go to our house of worship, to seek the best advice for the well-being of ourselves and our families.
