## Haskell County History

20 Years Ago—May 18, 1934

The Government has approved a project for improving and beautifying Rice Springs Park. T. L. Donohoo, in charge of the Federal work program in the county, said that \$6,207 had been allowed for the job, which will employ approximately 100 men for 30 days.

Ed Hollar, state highway foreman of Haskell County, was injured in an automobile accident Wednesday night. He was removed to the Stamford Sanitarium Thursday for treatment.

Fire which broke out at noon Thursday destroyed the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ratliff in the northwest part of town, together with all furniture and household goods in the home. An electrical short is believed to have started the fire.

The Ferris Ranch, located in the northeast part of Haskell County, was sold last week by the First National Bank of Dallas to R. Campbell of Olney, Texas. Deeds filed in the County Clerk's office cover 3,257 acres and the consideration is given as \$44,050.

## Two Adventure Trips Scheduled For Area Explorer Scouts This Summer

Explorer Scouts of the Chisholm Trail Council will have two adventure trips this summer. Twenty Explorers will take the Southbound Expedition at Philmont Scout Ranch, Cimmaron, New Mexico, July 23-Aug. 6th and 33 Explorers will participate in the Canadian Canoe trip from June 30 to July 19 starting at Ely, Minn.

The Philmont Scout Ranch located at Cimmaron, N. M. is the National Camp for all Explorers in America. 125,000 acres of rocky timberland was given to the Boy Scouts by Waite Phillips in 1937. Each year some 9,000 Explorer Scouts from over the United States camp at Philmont.

Explorer Scouts from the Chisholm Trail Council will take what is known as the Southbound Expedition which is a ten day pack trip with burros and horses over 82 miles of mountain trails. Before starting on the expedition instructions are given in basic camp crafts, nature, field sports, and fishing.

After the Philmont trip the boys will return home by way of Carlsbad Caverns. Total cost of the trip is \$60.00.

### Hogs Higher At Ft. Worth; Big Fall Crop Seen

Butcher hogs were steady to 25 cents higher at Fort Worth, Monday with top butchers at \$26.75 to \$27. Less desirable kinds sold from \$24 to \$26.50. Sows were around 50 cents lower at \$23.

Latest release by the USDA says that hog production on Spring pigs appears substantially above the intentions reported some months ago. They expect Fall marketings to be well above the earlier estimates.

Favorable corn-hog ratio is expected to continue, however, and the report says that while the seasonal drop in hog prices this Fall may be bigger than normal, it will be so because the April prices were at record high.

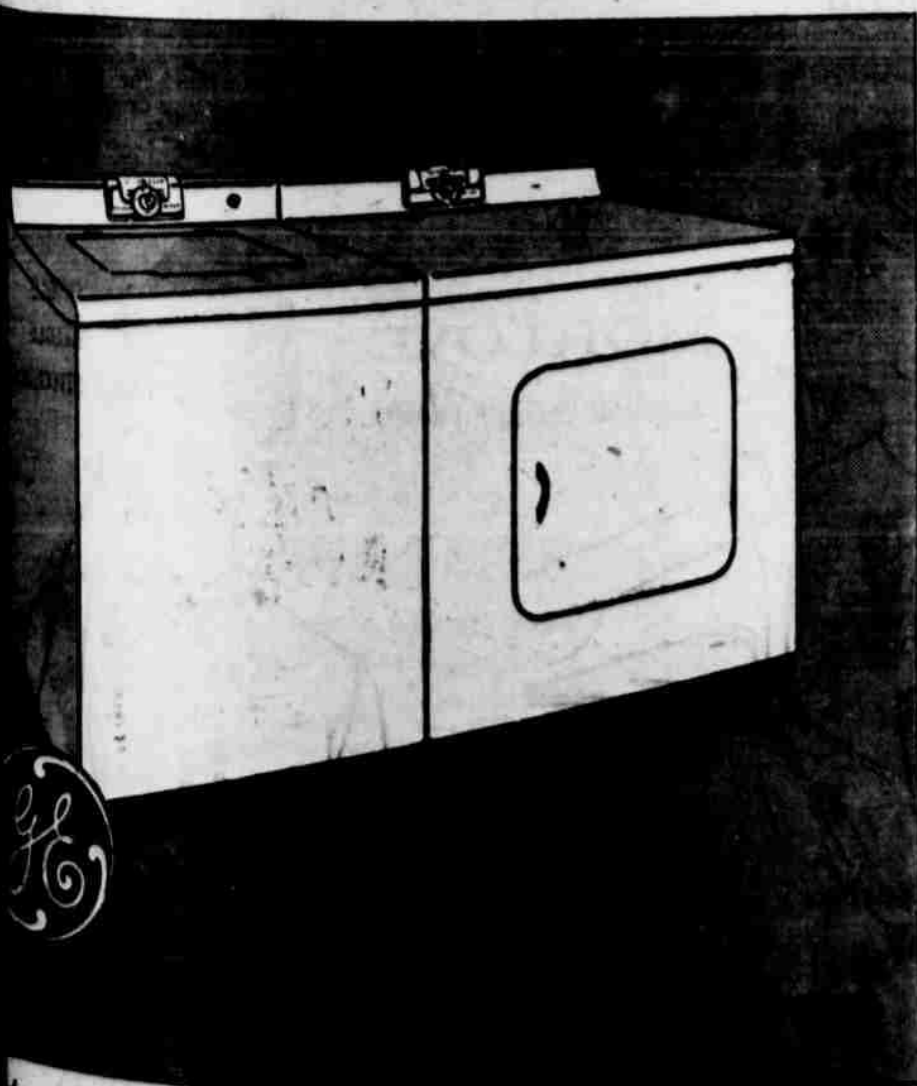

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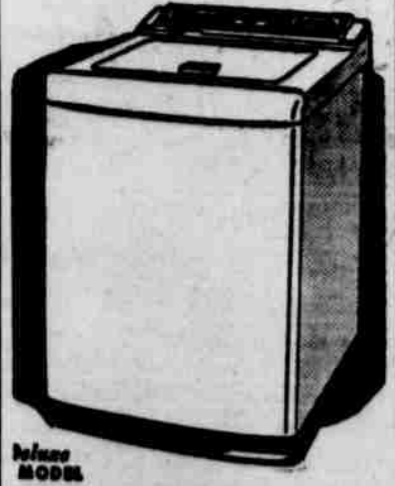

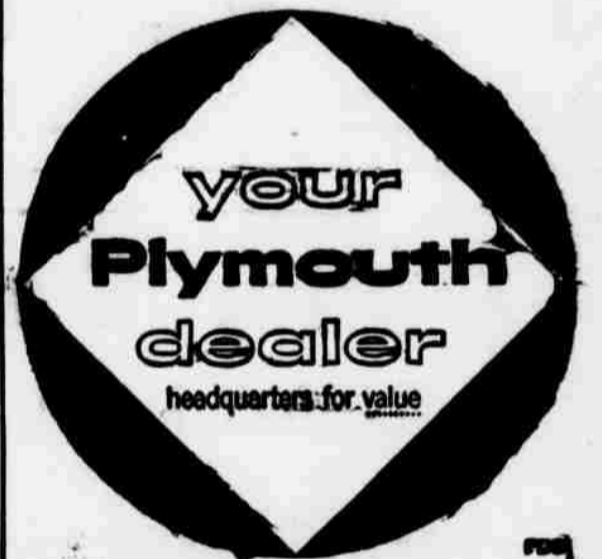

The election was called by the Stonewall County Commissioners Court after a petition bearing approximately 500 names was presented asking for the vote.

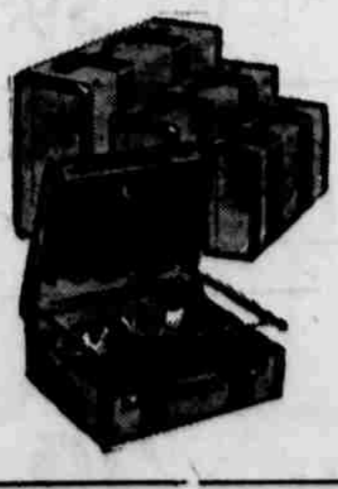

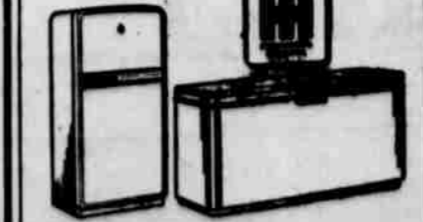
