**30 Years Ago—April 26, 1924**  
Results of the school census just completed under the supervision of Miss Minnie Ellis, county superintendent, shows a total of 1,387 children of school age in Haskell County. Independent districts have 1,337 schoolchildren, while 1,730 are listed in the common school districts.

**30 Years Ago—April 25, 1924**  
The ladies of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan held some kind of a meeting here Thursday, April 22. As they have no press report, nothing is known concerning the purpose of this assembly. The city was filled with cars, the tags and numbers indicated most of them were from neighboring towns and adjoining counties. It is believed that at least 125 women took part in the meeting. Late in the afternoon a small number of the visiting ladies in full regalia, but with their faces unmasked, put on a Klan parade around the square. People on the streets were very orderly and no demonstration was noticeable. This is the first Klan parade that has been staged in this city.

**30 Years Ago—April 23, 1924**
