## Additional Rain General Over County Monday

Rainfall varying from one-half inch to more than three inches fell generally over Haskell County and this area Monday, bringing additional moisture following last week's ground-soaking downpours and providing considerable run-off water.

Precipitation here was gauged at .85 inch from Monday through Tuesday morning. Downpours ranging from 2.60 inches at West Texas Utilities Paint Creek power station, and 3.10 inches in the Mattson community were reported. Rochester had an inch of rain, and at Rule 1.10 inches was measured.

In a small area northeast of Haskell, a 3-inch downpour and light hail damaged wheat to some extent. Elbert Mapes, Mattson farmer reported. The hard rain also caused some damage to dirt roads and the new F-M road in that area, Mapes said.

## \$190,000 Bond Issue Approved by Rule Voters Saturday

Rule voters Saturday approved a \$190,000 bond issue to build a new high school in that city, and to remodel the present Rule high school gymnasium.

Vote in the election was 195 for the bond issue, 30 against the proposal.

Two other propositions also carried, one to extend the district's \$20,000 indebtedness over all of the district; and to extend the maintenance tax rate of \$1.50 per \$100 property valuation over all of the district.

The \$190,000 issue will be for 36 year bonds with option to retire them in 20 years. Interest rate is from 4 1-2 to 5 1-2 per cent.

The new high school will be a one-story brick building. It will include six classrooms, library, auditorium and cafeteria. The top story of the present two-story high school building will be taken off.

The new building will be joined with the old building by a walkway and a walkway will also connect the grade school with the cafeteria in the new school. The gymnasium to be remodeled is a separate building.

## School Bonds Given Majority of 2-to-1

A \$350,000 bond issue for providing new buildings and additions to the Haskell Public School System was approved by voters Saturday with a better than 2-to-one majority. A companion proposition relating to the school maintenance tax necessary to retire the bonds, carried by almost the same majority.

Vote for the issuance of bonds was 350, with 168 against. On the maintenance tax, 324 votes were registered for the proposition, and 165 against.

Total vote in the election, according to unofficial tabulation, was 534 ballots. Voting results were announced within minutes after the polls closed by Election Judge Virgil A. Brown and Clerks Mrs. Claud Jenkins, Mrs. Brown, and Wiley Quattlebaum.

The \$350,000 bond money authorized by voters Saturday will be used to build an addition of eight classrooms to the present Elementary school building in southwest Haskell. The high school plant would be enlarged with an additional building which would connect the junior high and high school buildings. This unit would provide three additional classrooms, administrative office, and reception room. Through this arrangement, it would be possible to use office space in the present high school for classroom area if needed.

A new structure would be a gymnasium for the high school, which would be located adjacent to the present field house of Indian Field.

Additions and improvements or Central Ward colored school are also provided for in the bond proceeds.

Trustees of the district said this week that Stanley Brown, architect-engineer of Dallas, had been employed as architect. As soon as plans are accepted by the board, bids will be accepted from contractors, trustees explained. This will probably require 30 days or longer.

The school officials believe, however, that construction work can be started in time to have most urgently needed units in the expansion program ready for use at the beginning of the September school term.

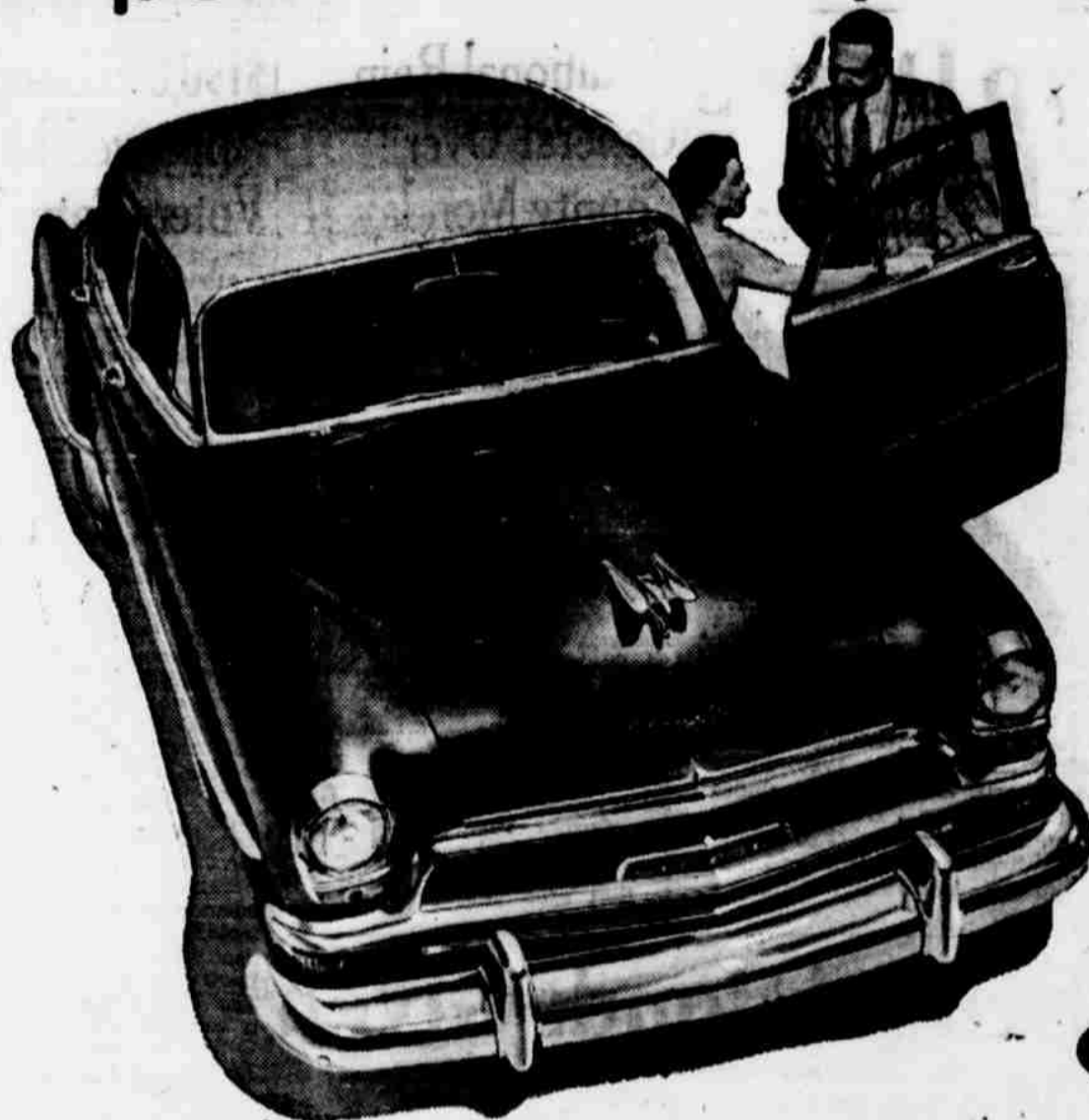

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**TEACHER OF THE WEEK**

Miss Josephine Stueber is Elementary Consultant for the Haskell Independent School District, the Paint Creek School, Sagerton School and Mattson School. Her area of supervision covers curriculum and instruction in grades one through eight.

Miss Stueber is a native of Denison, Texas. She received the B. A. degree from Texas College of Mines in El Paso, the M. A. degree from the University of Texas, and has completed two additional years of graduate work at the latter school for the Doctor's degree. She also attended Teachers College, Columbia University. Miss Stueber received a graduate university fellowship at the University of Texas and during her residence became a member of Kappa Delta Pi and of Pi Lambda Theta, honor fraternities in education.

Miss Stueber served as a teacher and as primary supervisor in the E. Paso Public Schools for a number of years. She has been a member of the faculties of West Texas State College, Louisiana State University, and State University Teachers College in Buffalo, New York. Her experience also includes teaching in a number of summer sessions, among which were the University of Texas and North Texas State College.

The Haskell Consultant has contributed to elementary education through the publication of articles in educational journals. She is a co-author of a college textbook on the teaching of reading, Effective Reading Instruction, published in New York by McGraw-Hill Book Company, 1942. Miss Stueber is listed in Leaders in Education. She holds membership in a number of professional organizations, including the National Education Association, The Texas Teachers Association, the Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, the Association for Childhood Education International, The Texas Elementary Principals and Supervisors Association, various regional and local professional organizations, the local Parent-Teacher Association, and the American Association of University Women.

The goal of the elementary consultant in any school system is to help to improve instruction in all classrooms in order that all children may be given the best possible opportunity to learn and to develop into well-rounded personalities and responsible citizens. His aim is to help teachers to study individual children and class groups as a whole and to devise ways and means of interesting the gifted children and the average children as well as those who learn more slowly. In a democratic society we need to develop leaders as well as followers. Individual needs of children must be met, because children differ so greatly in their physical, social, emotional, and intellectual development. On the other hand, class groups are important, because it is in these groups that children learn to work together and to get along with others. All suc-

cessful adults must be able to do this.

The consultant assists the teacher in diagnosing the difficulties of individual children and of groups by administering standardized tests. Tests of mental maturity, batteries of achievement in all school subjects, and achievement tests in particular curricular areas, such as reading and arithmetic, have been given by Miss Stueber in the schools which she serves in Haskell County. In one school occupational interest inventories have been given to junior and senior high school students.

The consultant attempts to assist the teacher by observing her work and offering suggestions. Miss Stueber often has stepped in and taught lessons to demonstrate certain techniques and procedures of teaching. She has introduced and demonstrated the use of new materials in the classrooms such as the McCall Test Lessons in Reading, which are aimed daily lessons, designed to increase the speed and compre-

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hension of the pupils. The consultant assists teachers by suggesting professional reading on certain aspects of teaching which the teacher happens to need at the moment. While there is no established library of this type in Haskell County, Miss Stueber has collected many professional books, periodicals, and other materials which she lends to any teacher who desires to study.

Another way in which the consultant helps to improve teaching is through an in-service curriculum program, in which, teachers study, plan together in groups, and perhaps set up a guide in a certain field. During the spring of 1952, the first and second grade teachers of the Haskell Elementary School participated in such a study in the field of arithmetic. Sagerton School faculty has used the services of the consultant in studying the subject of reporting to parents and also in a short study of child development. These are small beginnings, and the schools of Haskell County need to do much more in the field of in-service education for teachers.

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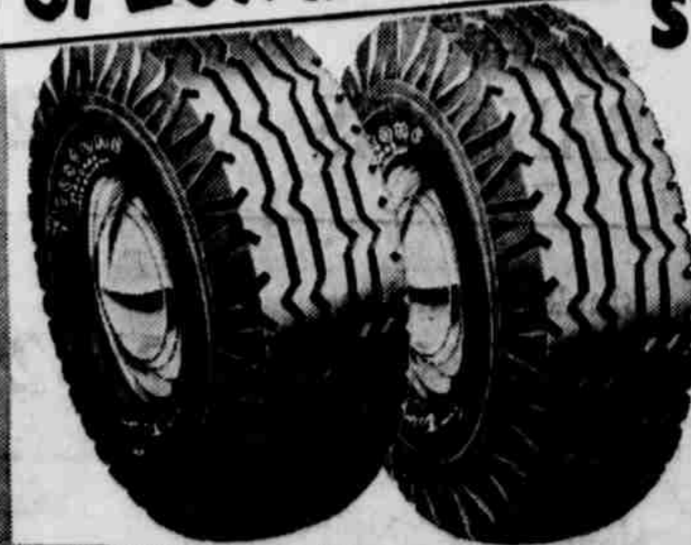
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## County 4-H Club Girls Visit Bedroom Projects On Annual Tour Saturday
