## County Officials Will Try to Work Out Lake Problem Solution With Stamford

The City Council of Stamford has announced that it proposes to take "Lake Stamford" into the city limits of the Jones County city. This will be done by "stem annexation," whereby the city limits would be extended along the 15-mile pipeline and would include the lake and such land as would be necessary to enforce regulations.

Because of the many complex problems which might result if the City of Stamford believes it necessary to annex the lake

and surrounding area, Haskell County officials said this week that the Commissioners Court was prepared and willing to take all legal steps required to fully enforce any regulations deemed necessary by the Stamford City Council to eliminate any unsanitary conditions, and to safeguard lives and property at the lake in the areas open to the public.

To that end, the Commissioners Court will endeavor to work out with the Stamford City Council a program of controls

which will meet with that city's approval.

Virtually all of the land involved, and the lake, is in Haskell County. The Stamford city charter will have to be amended in order that the city limits can be extended by the Stamford city council after due notice without consent of the property owners affected. An election to authorize amending the charter must be called by an ordinance, which will be passed on Sept. 16, it is understood.

Basis for the unprecedented action, according to Stamford officials, is to give the city authority to control the lake and a surrounding area.

Although the lake is now and has been since it was built, subject to all State regulations governing fishing and boating, the Stamford council contends that no boating regulations are in force, there is no system of licensing boats, and that many houseboats and rafts are on the lake. Owners of these units are residents of Haskell, Jones, and other counties.

In September, 1953, the Scott Estate deeded Scott Park, a 55 acre tract bordering the lake, to the public for free use as a park and recreation spot. Since then, the lake has been accessible to the public regardless of place of residence, and no charge has been made for fishing, boating, or camping in the park area.

Also, Haskell County, which was charged in the deed from Scott Estate with maintaining the park for free use of the public, has spent \$40,000 or more in improving the park.

Since gift of Scott Park to the public in September, 1953, until the present time, members of the Commissioners Court declare, no complaints concerning the lake had been made to Haskell County officials until at a joint meeting last Friday of the Commissioners with the Stamford city council.

At that meeting, Haskell County officials were told that Stamford proposed to go ahead with the annexation in order to "control the lake." However, it was declared at the council meeting that Stamford has no intention of taking in the Scott Park and will confer with the Haskell County commissioners while drawing up the regulations.

It is presumed that these regulations could include the charging of a fee for fishing and a system of licensing boats which would involve a charge of some amount. However, any new regulations would be in addition to State laws now in force at Scott Park designed for the protection of lives and property, as well as fishing and boating.

Since Stamford has not announced the nature of regulations to be proposed in the event of annexation, nor the extent of the area defined "such land as necessary," some of the property owners whose lands adjoin the lake have become concerned as to the full import of the annexation proposal.

Several fishing camps adjacent to the lake are owned and located on privately owned lands where the owner sold a portion of the property or granted easements to Stamford while reserving riparian rights for control and use of lands when not covered by water.

In the event of annexation, landowners are wondering if city taxes will be levied and assessed against lands and improvements which might be taken into Stamford city limits through "stem annexation."

All of the land covered by the lake, and lands in Haskell County traversed by the water pipeline to Stamford, lies within the boundaries of Paint Creek Rural High School District.

Whether a rural high school can retain within its district boundaries for tax purposes, land and real estate located within an incorporated city, is a matter of conjecture.

The Paint Creek power generating station of West Texas Utilities Company, representing an investment of \$4 million, or more, is located at the water's edge on the north shore of the lake. Whether the plant would be taken into Stamford city limits has not been made clear.

## Two Men Fined for Dumping Rubbish On Public Road

Dumping rubbish on a public road resulted in fines being assessed against two men last week.

One violation occurred in the northeast part of town and the other south of town. In both instances, the parties involved professed they did not know that a law was being violated, and were given the minimum fine which amounted to \$20.50 in each case.

The complaints were filed in Justice Court by the sheriff's department.

The Commissioners Court recently announced that the new law would be enforced against littering of trash and rubbish on any public road, and they have asked the cooperation of the public in keeping the roads and right-of-way clean and free of

## Colored Patrons Prefer Separate School Building

Colored residents of Haskell prefer a separate school building for their children, provided adequate facilities are provided in all respects, a delegation of colored citizens told the School Board and members of school advisory committee Monday night.

The group of 11 colored citizens had been asked to meet with the board to discuss the building of a new Colored School as originally planned when taxpayers of the district voted bonds last year.

As a result of the meeting, the group was asked to submit a tentative outline or sketch of the building they desired. Then, architect's drawing and cost estimates will be secured and other details, including selection of building site, will be worked out.

Mr. Wilfong will be no stranger to the people of Haskell County as he has lived here all of his life, except for a few years spent in the Army during World War II, the four years he was at A&M College, and some 7 or 8 months he served as assistant County Supervisor in La Grange.

## San Antonio Firm Awarded Contract on Weinert Road

The State Highway Department will spend \$144,543 for construction of a new Farm-to-Market road in the Weinert area on which work is expected to get under way at an early date.

Contract for the new F-M project was awarded at Austin Wednesday to Cage Brothers of San Antonio, who made the low offer of \$144,543 on the road job.

The new road will carry designation FM 1720 and will extend from U. S. Highway 277 east to the Throckmorton County line, a distance of 12.4 miles. It will serve a wide farming and ranching area in northeast Haskell County, and will intersect all-weather roads to Monday and Throckmorton.

In addition to the Weinert project, the expenditure of an additional \$178,000 for F-M road construction in Haskell County has been approved by the highway department.

The work will include a stretch of about 5.8 miles from the end of F-M Road 2229 west of O'Brien to F-M Roads 1587 and 1720 and 4.7 miles of road extending south from the Knox County line to F-M 2229.

## Grandson of Haskell Couple Injured In Odessa Accident

Russell Ivan Phelps, 2 1/2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Phelps of Odessa and grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Viney of Haskell was seriously injured when he was struck and run over by an automobile in that city Sunday morning.

The child suffered internal injuries and is under treatment in Medical Center Hospital in Odessa, where attendants reported his condition as critical.

The little boy had accompanied his mother to church, where she teaches a Sunday School class. Mrs. Phelps had gone into the county nursery for her six-month-old daughter, Vicky Lynn, and the little boy walked outside the church. He was standing in the street in front of a car waiting for his mother. Driver of the vehicle, unaware of the boy's presence, started the car and ran over the child.

## Commissioners Order Clean-Up Of Lake and Area

Any unsanitary conditions existing at Lake Stamford on Paint Creek—municipal water source for the Jones County city—will be cleaned up as the result of action taken by the Haskell County Commissioners Court Friday, County Judge Alfred Turnbow has announced.

Legal authorization for that action was embodied in a resolution passed and adopted on that date by the Court, with all Commissioners voting favorably on the measure.

The step was taken after Commissioners had met with Stamford City Council and heard for the first time, complaints that objectionable and unsanitary conditions existed at the lake, which is situated in Haskell County, Judge Turnbow said.

The meeting in Stamford was arranged at the request of Haskell County Commissioners, after recent rumors that Stamford people felt that county officials were not cooperating as they

should in eliminating unsanitary conditions at the lake. Because of these conditions, Stamford proposed to annex the lake, Commissioners had been told.

Haskell's only representatives at the session were the four county Commissioners, Claude Ashley, Leon Newton, Estle Gililand and Francis C. Blake.

An entirely friendly atmosphere prevailed throughout the meeting, they said, although there was some good-natured "ribbing" at times. Stamford's principal complaint concerned houseboats and rafts on the lake.

At one point, after Stamford Mayor G. C. Carothers had made a particularly pointed comment concerning the presence of houseboats and rafts on the lake, Commissioner Blake explained:

"Whereas, at such meeting efforts were made by all concerned to cooperate in the matter of cleaning up Lake Stamford from a public health standpoint, and

"Whereas, no complaints had ever come to the knowledge of the Commissioners Court or any other county official as to any unhealthful or unsanitary condition that may exist on Lake Stamford; and whereas at such meeting complaints were made for the first time to the Commissioners Court.

"All Commissioners being present the following resolution was introduced:

"Resolution stating the policy of Commissioners Court of Haskell County, Texas: Be it and it is hereby resolved by Commissioners Court of Haskell County, Texas, that the following policy be and is hereby adopted to govern sanitary conditions on Lake Stamford and the shores of said lake.

First bale of Haskell County cotton from the 1935 crop was ginned at Rochester Monday. The bale weighed 512 pounds and the seed 660 pounds. The cotton was raised by Johnnie Williams and ginned by Rochester Gin Co. Merchants of Rochester gave Mr. Williams a premium of \$84.50.

The residence of J. M. Cameron in the east part of Haskell was destroyed by fire Monday night about 9 o'clock, together with practically all household effects.

A new all-steel school bus has been purchased by the Haskell school district and will be placed in use during the coming term. Jerry Carmichael has been employed as bus driver.

R. L. Lemmon, who has been connected with Perkins-Timberlake store here for the past three years, has resigned and accepted a position in Hunt's Store here.

The tax rate for Haskell County was placed at 73 cents on the \$100 valuation by the Commissioners Court, to be effective on this year's rendition. This is the same rate as last year. No road bond tax will be due, however, which lowers the total amount to be paid from last year. This year's tax rate was based on an approximate valuation in the county of \$8,000,000, the same as last year.

Thompson, a mechanic in Company B of the division's 100th Tank Battalion, entered the Army in November 1952 and has received the UN and Korean Service Ribbons.

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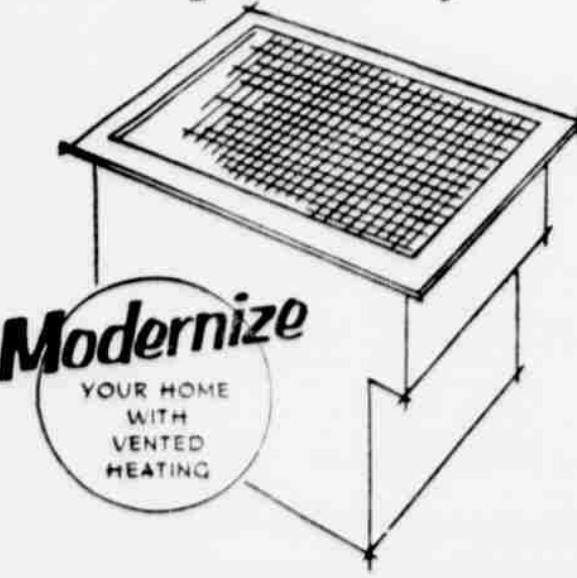

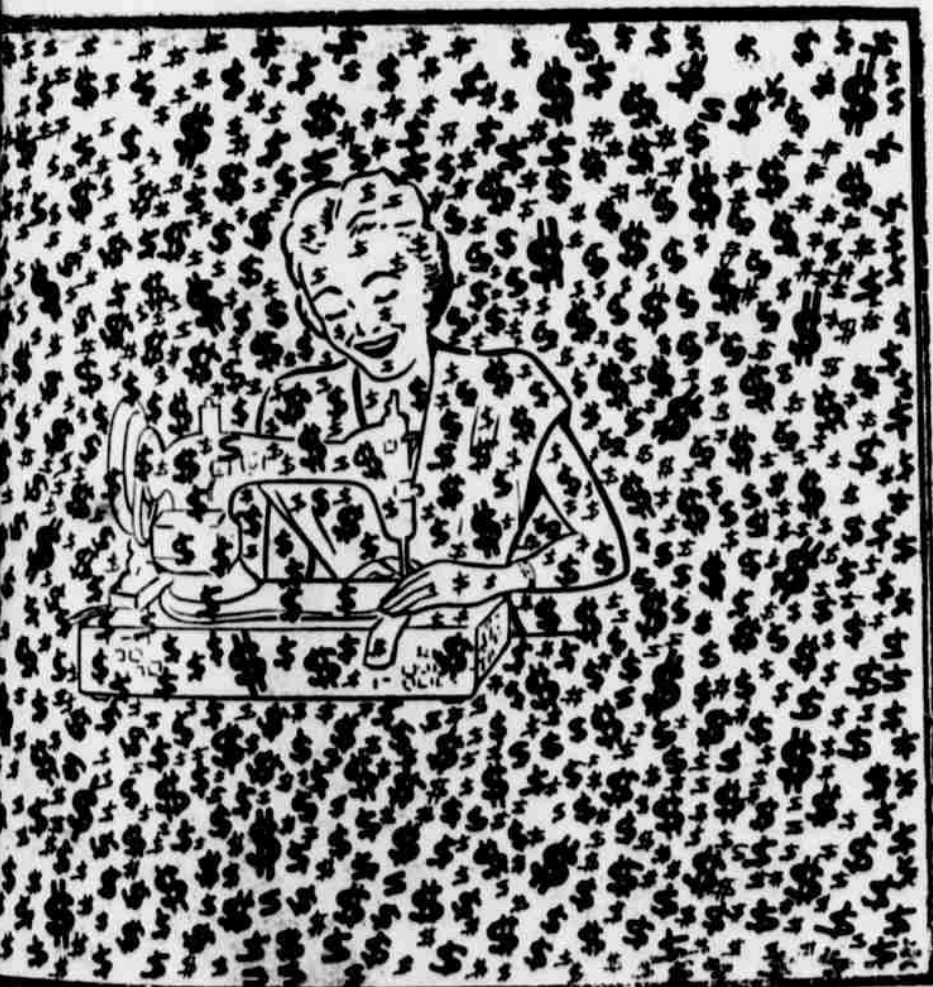

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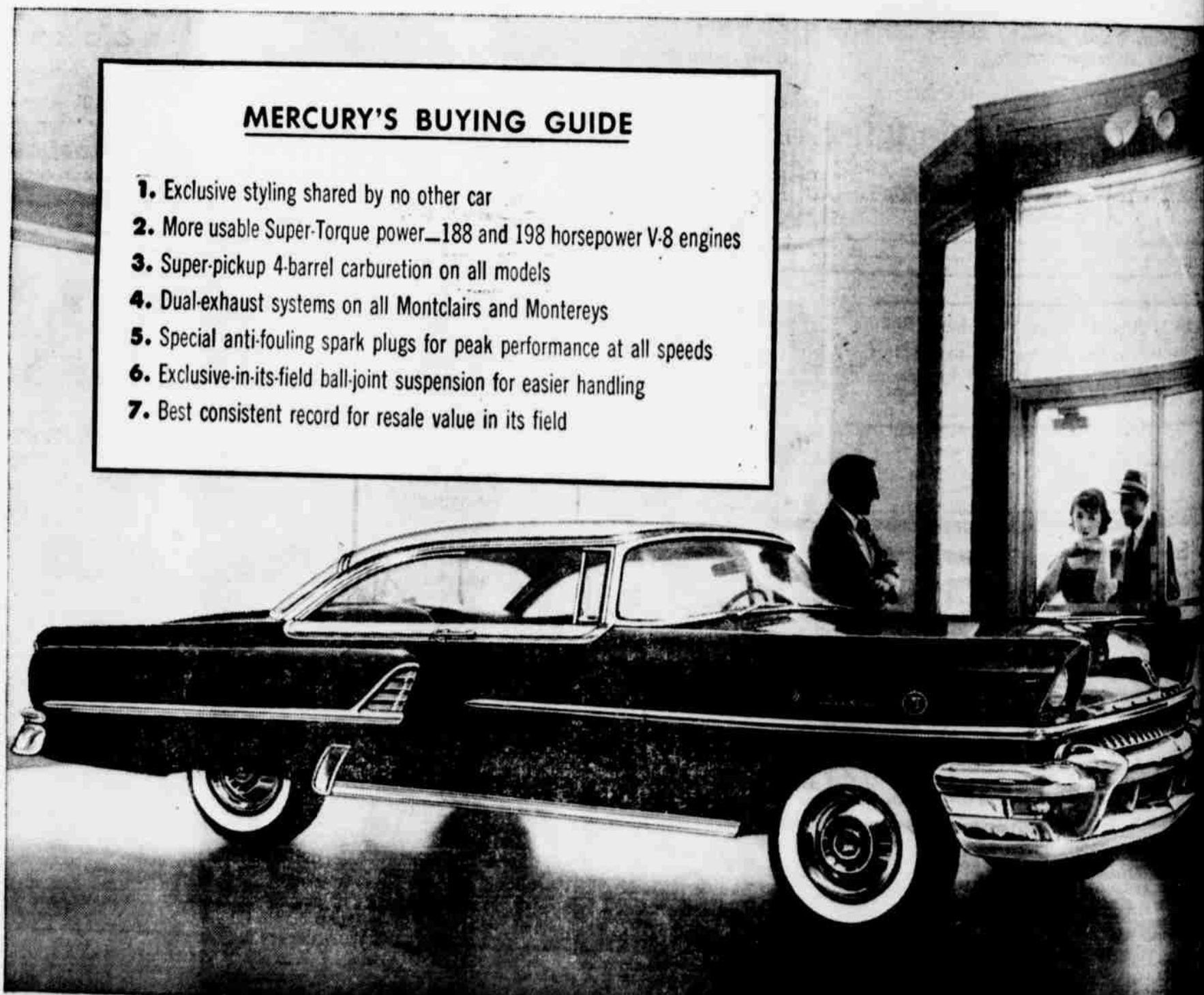
