The Anti-Lottery bill which recently passed the senate, reads as follows: "No letters, postal card or circular concerning any lottery, so-called gift concert, or other similar enterprise offering prize dependent upon lot of chance or concerning schemes devised for the purpose of obtaining money or property under false pretenses, and no list of the drawing at any lottery or similar scheme, and lottery ticket or part thereof, or any share of any chance in such lottery or gift enterprise, shall be carried in the mail or delivered by any postmaster or letter carrier."
