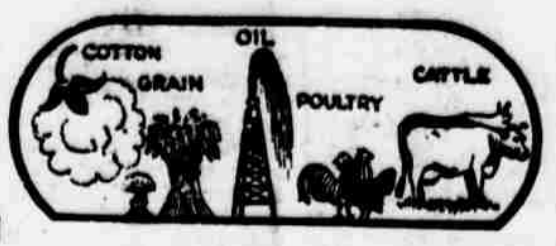

Voters Reminded Of Absentee Balloting Rules

Voters who cannot come to their regular voting box are being reminded that they should procure an absentee ballot from the office of the County Clerk. Changes in the election laws specify that election officials will not be permitted to carry ballots or envelopes or materials for voters' use to the polls. However, ballots may be taken from the polling place by an official when the voter is unable to leave his car after being transported to the place of voting. The changes are believed to be responsible for the unusually heavy absentee voting for the July 23 primary. According to Deputy Allie Belle Smith of the County Clerk's office, 180 absentee ballots have been mailed to voters. Of these, 77 have been returned and are in ballot boxes.

Campaigning Due to Hit Peak As First Primary Nears

Political campaigning is expected to reach its peak this week end as candidates enter the final days remaining before the first primary balloting. And despite the fact that there has been but relatively little interest evidenced on the part of voters to date, a heavy vote turn-out is being predicted. This forecast is based on the unusually large number of absentee ballots cast since July 8, with applications for ballots continuing to come in daily. The number is expected to exceed any previous year, deputies in the County Clerk's office believe. Although this year's ballot is shorter than usual, due to the change from two to four year terms for officials, contests in four county-wide races will result in a full turn-out of voters, observers believe. For added interest voters have two contested races for County Commissioner—in Precincts 1 and 3—and for Constable in the Haskell precinct which takes in all of the city and the southeast section of the county. At State level the ordinarily "hot" Governor's race has failed to generate the usual partisan interest of the past so far as outspoken support of voters is concerned. Visit of Candidate O'Daniel to Haskell last week served to spark some interest in the race for Governor but the political atmosphere is still far below the comparative period two years ago during the torrid Shivers-Yarborough campaign. The first primary ballot for Haskell County voters is about evenly divided with respect to State races and the groupings of district and county races. Voters will ballot on nominees for 32 county and district offices, ranging from public weigher to congressman and associate justice of the court of civil appeals. At the State level, they will choose nominees for 31 offices ranging from governor to congressman at large. Also, in Haskell Precinct 4, voters will decide the contest for the precinct chairman post on the County Democratic Executive Committee.

O'Daniel Predicts 'No Run-Off' In Campaign Talk Here Friday

W. Lee O'Daniel, ex-Governor and former U. S. Senator from Texas in the early 40's who is again seeking nomination for Governor in the Democratic primaries addressed a crowd estimated at more than 2,000 people here Friday night. Although O'Daniel had lost none of his political adeptness in making a crowd-pleasing campaign talk, his audience gave frequent scattered applause but there was none of the enthusiastic response given the former flour salesman in his first political appearances when he was swept into the Governor's office on an avalanche of votes. O'Daniel's Hillbilly Band, however, seemed as popular as ever with the crowds cheering for votes. O'Daniel described his campaign for Governor as "Not much of a race because there is not much opposition. There's nobody running against me that amounts to much," he said. Continuing, he admitted "Oh, there are three or four, but not in the gang of professional politicians we beat out who stole what, and how much."

Firemen Get Call When Junk Lumber Pile Blazes

Firemen were called to the 200 block on North 14th Street at 1:45 p. m. Monday to extinguish a pile of burning lumber and junk which threatened several nearby structures. Children playing around the discarded lumber and old automobile casings were believed to have been responsible for the blaze. Nearest structure was the home of Beattie Hanson, only a short distance from the fire. Firemen made short work of extinguishing the blaze. Two trucks were sent out on the alarm, but only one was used. Firemen explained that with the water shortage imminent, extra equipment will be dispatched on all alarms where the extent of the blaze is not reported. "We can't risk any chance that a fire will get out of hand as dry and hot as it is now," a member of the department pointed out.

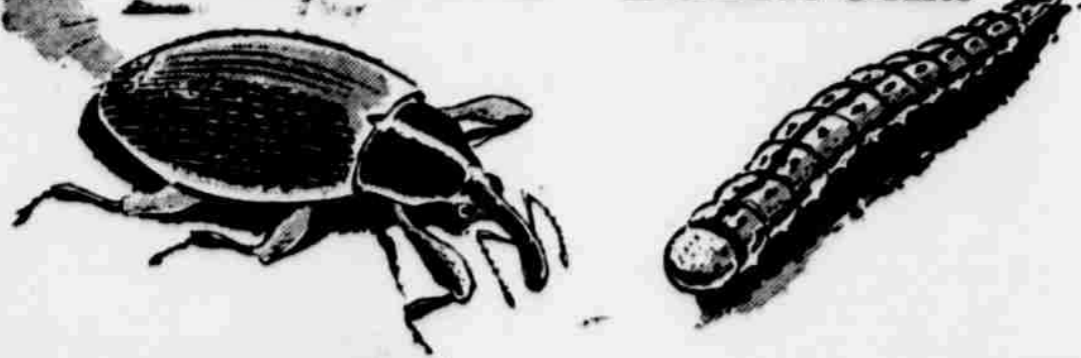

Rep. Ed J. Cloud Makes Statement To Voters

First, I wish to thank the people of Haskell County and the people of other counties that compose the 33rd legislative district, for the vote and confidence that you gave me two years ago in sending me to Austin as your duly elected state representative. I enjoyed the work. There is no better way in which one may serve his or her state during the peace time than being an honest, able, and conscientious member of the State Legislature. I may say that during the current session that I received all the recognition that a new member is ordinarily accorded. I served on the following committees which were of my choice: Banks and Banking, Municipal and Private Corporations, School Districts, Education, and Military and Veterans Affairs. These assignments were given in consideration of my past experience and training. I was in the banking business for fourteen years, nine years of which were in an executive position. I was a school teacher for fourteen years; I served overseas as an enlisted man during World War I and saw fifty-seven days of continuous combat service. During the last sixteen years I have been engaged in the operation of farms and during the meantime I served for eight years as mayor of my home town. Rule; in addition to the above I have served as Independent Executor of at least three Estates, the business of all was terminated without trouble or charge of unfairness; too, I have been actively identified with various civic affairs of our community, and I have been an active worker in the local church of my choice. May I say that I am not asking for re-election on the plea that I need the office financially, though I am not what you call a wealthy man I have always, since

I was 20 years of age, made my own way and most years I saved money and I made it honestly. During the past session I supported the old age pension measure without amendments; I supported a bill that would have largely cured, in the future, such troubles as recently were experienced by the Waco Guaranty and Trust Company, but the bill was defeated. Though I am not an authority on the Insurance Business, I supported other bills that had as their purpose the cure of insurance troubles. I supported most of the educational measures that came up, probably all, except one, and I have letters of commendation from educational leaders of the state in which they expressed their appreciation for my work in that field. Though the major field of agriculture comes under Federal jurisdiction, there were a number of bills that came up which were of state jurisdiction. I also have in my files letters of commendation from agricultural officials and other leaders in which they set their seal of approval upon my attitude.

I supported the Special Schools for the Unfortunate; I opposed a State Income Tax proposal; I opposed a two cent tax raise on gasoline, and was one of the group of House members who went into a solemn agreement to stay in session all summer rather than vote for a two cent tax raise on gasoline. I was one of the group who held up adjourning the session, and being called back into special session when we could have drawn pay. We wished to finish the job without strings, for in a special session we could have considered only that which was submitted to us. We worked hard for an additional thirty days without pay in order to be independent and unrestrained.

I may say that I believe that the legislature should meet every year for in no other business that I know do the directors meet as seldom as every two years. There are many problems to come up with the next year's session. Among these are the Penitentiary, Conservation, Education, Insurance and Lobbying. There were too many conflicting interests and ideas that prevented a satisfactory adjustment during the last session. Let me say I favored a water-users' pay program unless the districts see fit to levy an ad valorem tax. I certainly opposed a 3 cent State ad valorem tax, for too much of our territory could not have derived any direct benefit. I supported a reformed Land Program for Veterans.

I am in favor of the segregation of our schools and will do what I can legally to continue this system—but I will not go to open rebellion against the Federal government. I believe in State's Rights. I oppose Federal encroachments upon the states whether in the fields of education, social life or in business that is more or less local in its nature. In conclusion may I say that Texas is now raising and spending about three quarters of a billion dollars a year and it is the responsibility of the legislature to raise these funds and to earmark the spending. It is the responsibility of the voters to send men and women to the legislature who are already Trained and Experienced, men and women who are without biases and prejudices. Governors and Legislators come and go—but principles remain. Let us go to the polls and vote for whom you think is best qualified for the job. A person should not ask for the job unless he can be on the job. I say that I am a Democrat—I do not believe that the principles of Jefferson, Jackson, and Wilson should be permitted to die. I supported the Democratic party in the past and intend to support the Democratic Nominees this year from constable to president. If my experience as teacher, soldier, banker, mayor, farmer, civic worker, churchman, and as

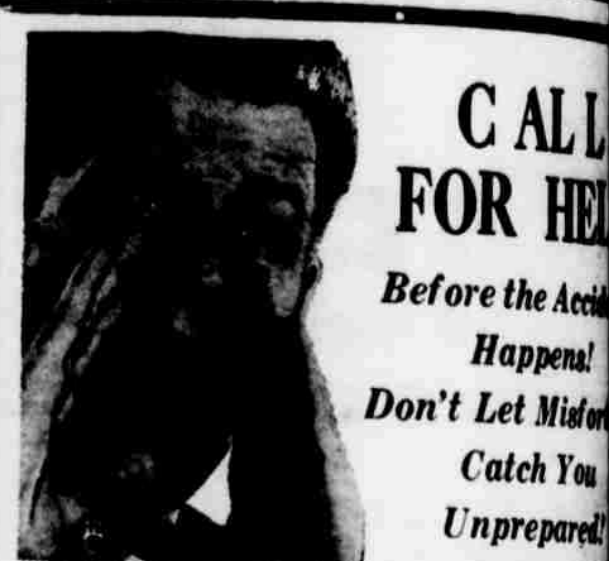

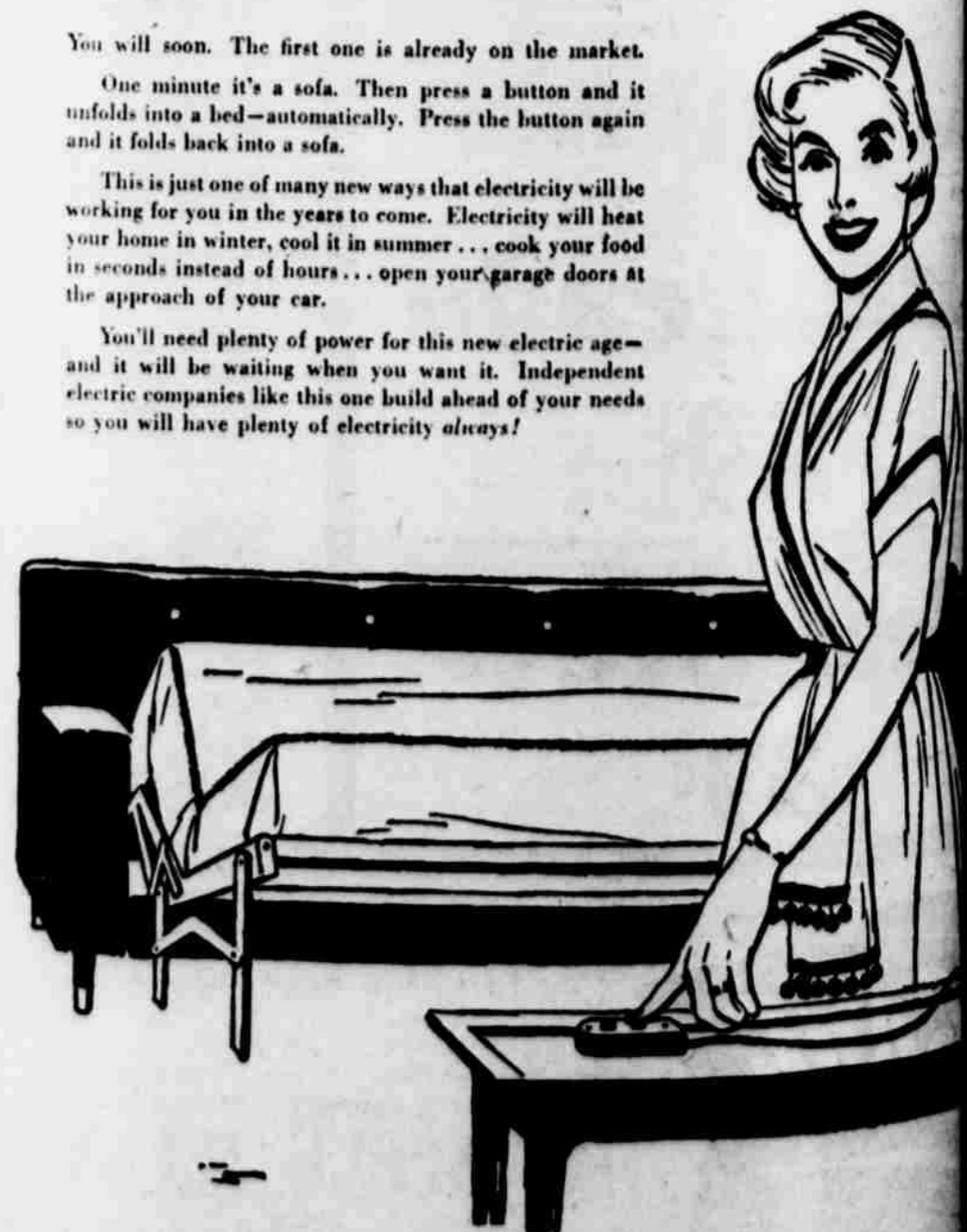

Two of the top attractions at the 1956 Fair will be in the beef departments. The State Aberdeen Angus Show and Sale will be held Sept. 14-15 and \$3,600 will be paid in premiums.

The Hereford Show will be held Sept. 11 which has been designated as "Roy Largent and Hereford Day at the Fair. \$5,000 in premiums will be paid in the show which will be judged by Largent, resident of Merkel and past president of both the American Hereford Association and the Texas Hereford Association.

Dairy cattle will vie for West Texas honors in both Holstein and Jersey departments. Premiums of \$1,300 each will be paid in both.

Sheep breeders can look forward to prizes of \$1,144 in the sheep department and the Swine Show will have a cash total of \$1,016 for the winners.

Farmers may obtain details on how the new Soil Bank program will work from any county ABC office or from an ABC committeeman or county agent. Time is an important factor now. Acreage agreements must be signed before July 28.
