LAYING OF THE CORNER STONE.

APRIL STORMS.
No More Cold Weather is Predicted for the South.

Dangerous Ocean Storm—Great Flood in the Missouri River.

St. JOSEPH, Mo., April 4—My last letter give dates of storm wave due to cross the continent from 5th to 7th. All the storm waves of this month, as heretofore stated will show unusual energy because of the near approach of Saturn's equinox, and from this till the June storms of 1892 have passed all the storms will develop more than average energy, including some of the most destructive and dangerous that have occurred since 1832. Following April 6 the next disturbance will be due to leave the Pacific coast about the 10th pass the Rocky-Allegheny valley from 11th to 13th and reach the Atlantic coast about the 14th. This storm will close the fifty-second day rain period which was due to set in about April 1. The general course of this disturbance will be along the 40th degree of north latitude, but the rainfall will principally be south of the line. The cool wave following and the frost will not be severe, and will be confined to northern latitude. Another storm wave will be due to leave the Pacific coast about the 16th, cross the Rocky-Allegheny valley from 17th to 19th and reach the Atlantic coast about the 20th. This storm will become very dangerous on the Atlantic east of New York city in about the longitude of Labrador on April 21, and it will not be safe to be on that part of the ocean at that time. At the same time, April 21, a dangerous storm will be off the coast of Alaska southeast of Behring sea. On this continent this 10th to 20th storm will not be remarkable, but the cool wave following it will probably develop destructive frosts as far south as the 38th degree of north latitude. The March storms were almost continuous. I expect a flood in the Missouri river during April from excessive rains and melting of the snows in the mountains.—Fort Worth Gazette.

Italian Scheme—A Diabolical Plot.
 NEW CASTLE Pa. April 3.—Today Sebastian Gabarco, leader of the Italians employed near Wampum, told a strange story, which should be communicated to the authorities at once. Gabarco is a property owner in Wampum, and seemed to place considerable weight upon the information imparted.

He said that yesterday a strange Italian, who resided in Pittsburg, called him aside and asked him if he would go into a plot to avenge his countrymen. The stranger who refused to give his name, said that at least 20,000 Italians could be brought into Pittsburg in five hours to meet, and with the aid of guns and by surprising the citizens they would be able to take the city without much trouble. He strongly urged Gabarco to get the Italians at Wampum to consent to meet others in Pittsburg at a given signal. He then went on to tell him that every Italian settlement in Allegheny and other counties were receiving some information and now each settlement was expected to send large delegations. He stated also that a movement of this kind was to be started.

 In the afternoon the Pittsburg envoy left for Carbon, this county, to stir up the Italians there, and said that a secret meeting was to be held in the near future to talk the matter over among themselves. There are four or five hundred Italians at Carbon and it is known that at least a dozen are members of the Mafia. Gabarco is a naturalized citizen of the United States and will prevent such a plot in this section.

A dispatch from Wheeling states that 2000 Italians near Mountville now employed on railroads, and who have been drinking intend to go to New Orleans, though for what purpose they refuse to state.
