## **Reviewing Board Denies Cotton** Haskell County Youths Show Top Group Acreage Pleas

In a hearing conducted here Monday, a reviewing board of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation committee, refused the request of two county farmers for readjustments and increase of their cotton acreage.

The hearing was the first of six scheduled in West Texas counties. Actually, the claims of the cotton farmers, who say allotments in West Texas are cut more heavily than were those in other parts of the state, are not against the county ASC committee but against the state committee.

Farmers whose claims were presented Monday are Clarence O. Neinast and M. D. Thompson, both of Sagerton. They were represented by Austin Wilson, Houston attorney, who is representing West Texas cotton farmers in the controversy.

controversy.

Members of the reviewing board were Herman Josselet of Haskell, G. W. Hawkins of Munday and John F. Trible of Throckmorton.

Neinast and Thompson contend their acreage was cut five percent from last year, and that the cut is inequitable.

Presiding was Henry Marshall, head of the marketing quota and allotment division of ASC in Texas.

The allocation proposal will not in any manner increase the total amount of tax but will only authorize the Commissioners Court to reallocate the 80 cents that is now levied to the various funds as the need arises. As the levy now stands the authorized maximum to be levied for the operating funds are as follows: General fund 25c, jury fund 15c, courf house and jail 25c road and bridge 15c. Under this fixed schedule some of the funds always have a surplus while other funds do not have sufficient revenue. If the reallocation is approved then the Commissioners Court may reallocate the 80c levy among these four funds as needed.

#### 30c Tax for Road Purposes

Discontinuance of the 25c Road bond levy authorizing the 30c ad valorem tax would make available funds which are needed for construction and maintenance of farm - to - market and lateral roads, the Commissioners Court explained.

The 30c ad valorem tax will not be levied on the first \$3,000 valuation of residential or farm homesteads, and will actually result in a lower tax bill for many average property-owners, it was pointed out. This arises from the fact that the 25c road bond tax which will be discontinued, has been assessed against all taxable property, including homesteads.

Commissioners point out that the need for the 30c ad valorem levy arises from the fact that the cost of machinery, equipment, fuel, labor, etc., has increased many times in recent years, while the income to the road and bridge funds have increased very little. Then too, they point out, Haskell County like most others, has had to pay for right-of-way for farmto-market roads out of their regular operating road and bridge

Many counties throughout the State have successfully voted both the resillocation of taxes and the 30c ad valorem or lateral road tax, including several ne boring counties. Among these are Baylor, Stonewall, Wilbarger and recently,

Balloting in the March 17 election will be held at all regular voting boxes in the county. List of polling places and election fudges appears in the two election notices being published in this issue of The Free Press.

# Coming of Cattlemen to Area in 1880 Results in Range Being "Overcrowded"

(This is the third in a series of articles on early days in this section, based on material in the late R. E. Sherrill's "History of the ranch in 1878.

In the summer of 1879 Col. Haskell County.")

As the hunters and Indians drifted out, cattlemen came in. They came from the overcrowded range in the east and pushed west till it too was overcrowded. By 1880 they began to complain and competition showed itself in fueds among themselves as well as with newcomers hunting grass and water. With little law to regulate, each outfit was a law to

many conflicts, usually over the grass and water, but often the maverick was the bone of constealing too much from his neighbors, monopolizing this lucrative feature of his business, an indig-nation meeting might be held among the boys, the honest men, and the rustlers' scalp was not highly valued. He was lucky if he learned in time and wise in seek-ing new fields. If he stole in moderation after the custom of his own class he was a bully good fellow. A gluttonous thief was to

be put out of the way. However a large portion of the cattlemen were as straightfor-ward, honest, industrious, broad-minded and far-seeing as any men in any profession; and these men frowned on any dishonesty, and helped to get rid of the cow

Sheep men as well as cow men were rushing into the country. And as sheep and cows do not this caused many quarrels and serious difficulties, and an occasional killing over range rights. cattle and horses do not willingly graze after sheep. When the sheep man moved onto the range cattle and horses would drift out. This caused all sorts of trouble to cattlemen; and they and the sheep men were always at dagger's points.

in Haskell County was made by George T. Reynolds and J. A. ifornia Creek in the southeast corner of Haskell Co. They built the house in the winter of 1876. soon afterwards, and Glen Reynolds and wife lived with Mr. and Mrs. Matthews. Nothing was thought of it so long as each one got his share., doing equally well and prospering. But when an expert thief got hoggish, on the west side of the square. the first real store opened in town and paved the way for others which soon followed.

In the latter part of August the daughter of a sheepman, R. Payne, was bitten by a rattle-snake. There was no doctor nearer than Anson, and without relief, she died in five or six hours and was buried in the first grave in the cemetery in the town.

At the beginning there was no post office in the county. The mail was directed to Albany and brought out for the community by some member who might be going to Albany on business. In 1884 a petition was sent to Washington requesting the Depart-ment to establish an office with the name of Rice Springs. There was an office in the state by the like to work on the same range; name of Rice and the Department declined to establish an office with that name. Some one suggested the name of Haskell. 

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

An average of nine convictions each week was recorded in Jus-tice Court during 1955, with a total of 466 culprits paying court costs amounting to \$2,503.83, ac-cording to Justice of the Peace Eal Treadwell's report for last

In addition to presiding for the hearing of these cases, Justice Treadwell had other official duies which kept him well occupied in his office.

The report shows that his office filed 355 detailed reports on births and deaths during the year. Jus-tice Treadwell also served as coroner in conducting three inquests during the year.

Also, the Haskell Justice of the Peace was called on to officiate in more than a dozen marriages in 1955, he reported.

Busiest court month was July, when 80 convictions were recorded, with the next largest number of cases, 51, in December, Lightest month was September when only 21 cases were cleared from the docket.

A majority of the cases filed in Justice Court deal with traffic violations, although the dock-et lists arraignments on complaints for offenses ranging from check swindling to attempted murder. Major felony complaints are transferred to county or district court.







Factors other than farm income have been keeping farm land values high during the past 2 years. In the past, according to John

G McHaney, extension economist the value of farm land and buildings has risen when farm inome declined, showing a definite relation between the two. Since 1953, contrary to the isual pattern, farm land values have slowly and steadily risen o a new record-high peak, despite declining farm income. U. S. Department of Agriculture figures, based on regular reports 16,000 farmers and 10,000 real estate operators, show this

be a nation-wide trend. McHaney cites these important developments as probable causes for this unexpected strength in and values:

Farmers themselves are strong bidders for additional land to enlarge their farms. Caught in a cost-price squeeze, many farmers see increased use of machinery and more land as a means of increasing their pro-duction efficiency.
