

Absentee Voting To Begin May 26

Sunday from 3:00 to 4:30 p.m.

Absentee voting for the Saturday, June 5, runoff election will begin Wednesday, May 26, and continue through Tuesday, June 1, according to Zena Waldron, County Clerk.

However, as the courthouse is closed every Saturday and as Monday, May 31, is Memorial Day, the actual number of days that voters may cast their absentee ballots in person will be limited to four.

Persons desiring to vote absentee by mail may do so by writing to the clerk's office and requesting an absentee ballot. These ballots may be received by mail until noon on election day, June 5, Mrs. Waldron said.

In the Democratic Primary on May 1, out of a field of four candidates running for the office of Knox County Commissioner, Precinct One, Billy Gene Johnston came out in top spot with 245 while C.C. (Buddy) Angle received 196, necessitating the runoff on June 5.

Truscott Woman To Be On Channel 3

Mrs. Curtis Casey, Truscott's Bicentennial chairman, will appear on "Focus" on KFDX-TV, Channel 3, next Monday, May 24, at 12:20 p.m. to publicize the sale of Truscott's Bicentennial coins.

Don Alexander of Channel 3 is host for the show.

The community, along with area residents, will honor Dr. R.G. Howell, his wife, Barbara, and their children, Mark, Mike and Kay Sunday afternoon with a tea at the Knox City Country Club from three until four-thirty in the afternoon.

The Knox City Chamber of Commerce is responsible for coordinating the affair and Knox City Mayor R. Kenneth Crownover has proclaimed the week of May 23 as "Dr. Robert G. Howell Week."

Dr. Howell announced in March of this year that he was closing his practice here, reluctantly, on May 31 after 13 years.

In an interview granted Abilene Reporter-News writer Jim Conley last month, Dr. Howell said, "I'm quitting because I don't want to get to the point where I can't do what I'm doing," in describing the exhausting around-the-clock schedule which has become intolerable to him.

He emphasized that it had been "a fantastic 13 years" and that he and his wife love the people and the activities of the town.

"The major problem is just not enough time," he said. "We see 80 to 110 patients a day-not because we like to but because we have to."

"Sure I'd like to see 40 a day but there's no place to send the other 60."

Dr. Howell, who was raised in DeLeon, said that when he first came to Knox City he "thoroughly enjoyed" his

practice, but by the end of the third year a doctor in Munday with whom he had gone to school, plus a second doctor

in Knox City, had both left. "Two other doctors have come since then-one stayed about a year and a half and

Rodeo To Open Friday Night

It's rodeo time in Knox City!

The annual Knox County Junior Rodeo is set to get underway at 8:00 o'clock Friday night at the Brazos Valley Recreation Association arena.

Entries have been received from all over the Big Country and from as far away as San Angelo, Winters, Slaton, and Tahoka. Some of the top junior rodeo contestants in

the area will be competing for money and the all-around cowboy and cowgirl buckles, which are to go to the winners of those titles in each of the two age divisions, including 14 and under, and 15 through 19.

Events will include barrels, flags, poles, goat tying, tie-down, ribbon, and break-away roping, chute dogging, bareback and bull

riding, and rescue racing. A calf scramble will be held each night for youngsters eight and under. There will be no entry fee for this event.

Preceding the rodeo performance Saturday, a downtown parade is scheduled for 5:00 p.m. according to Herbert Bellinghausen, parade chairman.

Floats, decorated bikes, decorated carts, and riding clubs entered in the parade will be judged, with trophies going to the top entries.

The trophies to be awarded are on display downtown in the window at Edith's.

Church and school organizations, including the Knox City High School Band, as well as clubs and businesses

are planning to participate in the parade which is Knox City's Bicentennial parade and will feature the Bicentennial theme.

The parade will form at the Knox City School grounds. Those persons participating in the parade are asked to be at the school area by 4:00 Saturday.

Persons wishing information regarding the parade are asked to contact Chamber of Commerce secretary Doris Crownover or parade chairman Bellinghausen.

Following the parade, a barbecue will be held in the City Park, catered by Haskell Steak House. Tickets are available from members of the BVRA and Mrs. Crownover. In the event of rain, the barbecue will be served in the large barn at the Knox City Grain Company on the west edge of town.

For the first time, a rodeo dance is being planned Saturday night at 9:00 o'clock at the rodeo grounds on the large concrete slab. According to dance chairman Joe Boone, country-western music will be provided by R. R. C. Daniel and his band, and a small admission charge will be made.

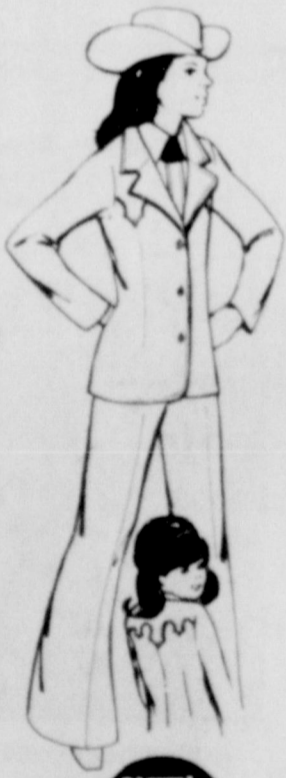

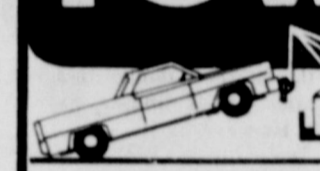

Knox City, Rochester are to provide the parade in each town.

"To practice medicine in a town by yourself takes seven days and seven nights. It leaves no time for your family. The problem is not with the family itself, but being able to enjoy the being home when they need you, going to church—we even open the clinic on Sunday mornings.

"It's going to be hard to leave, but with the prospect of not getting any help, it's an impossible situation," he explained.

"Usually, after 6 or 6:30 p.m. when I get home, I come back to the emergency room three or four times before midnight and then during the night I'm usually up once or twice. I never get to bed before midnight."

Dr. Howell isn't leaving the medical profession by any means, he emphasized.

At least until his second son, Mike, finishes high school in two more years, the family plans to live in Knox City. In the meantime, Dr. Howell said he probably would find a position with less demanding hours—perhaps as an emergency room doctor on a shift at some larger hospital.

For all the above reasons, Knox City and the area towns are honoring this wonderful doctor and his family, Barbara, Mark, Mike, and Kay, for their patience and understanding as Dr. Howell gave and gave to those who needed him, regardless of how exhausted he was!

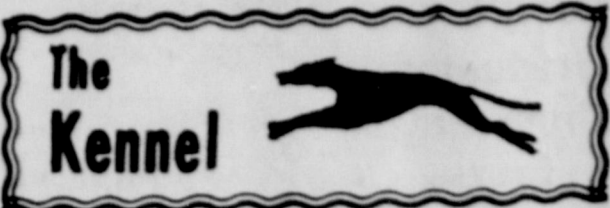

Retired Teachers Complete Book

When 350 retired teachers recount vivid memories of their earliest days of teaching, the result is sure to be a grab bag of humorous, poignant, and often incredible anecdotes which illustrate the range of education in this century. As We Remember is presented to the public and the profession as the bicentennial effort of the Texas Retired Teachers Association. It is a goldmine of information about the way things were in the distant and not-so-distant past.

From the accounts in this volume the reader catches glimpses of pioneer teachers on the job from the pine woods of East Texas to the windswept plains of West Texas--and from the coast to the Oklahoma border. Here are documented examples of the salary scales, the procedures for securing a position, the archaic codes of conduct for teachers, and the herculean daily program of the one-teacher school. Here also are heartwarming memories of individual children helped to overcome handicaps of many kinds as well as special recollections of such celebrities as Bill Moyers and Lyndon and Lady Bird Johnson.

There are detailed accounts of surviving disaster situations such as the explosions in the New London school and the Beaumont ship channel. There are fond reports of the rigors of preparing school programs of many kinds. And various currents innovations are provided some early antecedents in the classrooms of creative teachers.

The over-all impression is one of optimism, of calling attention to the progress which has been made in the teacher's status and in public support of education.

Lois Gray of Fort Worth chaired the committee which edited this volume. Others were Buelah Bratton and Margaret Caskey.

sicians close by who patients might need to see and will help in any way we can by getting patients to hospitals in the area if they need to be hospitalized.

"Dr. Newsom in Munday will have all he can handle by taking care of patients in his own office and attending to patients in the care homes, both in Munday and Knox City. He has indicated that he will utilize hospital facilities in Haskell for patients who need hospitalization during this time. He simply cannot cover the emergency room here under government requirements.

"Remember - we WILL NOT be closing our doors and locking the place up, we simply will not be able to admit and care for actual hospital patients.

"In next week's edition, hospital officials will make a definite statement as to whether or not we will be able to accept patients after 12:00 noon, May 29."

Further Explanations Made On Donations

In last week's story concerning the efforts of the Brazos Valley Health Resources Inc. to raise needed funds to assist in locating the new doctor and his family, several facts need clarifying for the benefit of our readers.

First of all, Dr. W.F. Thompson, who will begin practice here July 15, did not ask for, nor receive, any type of guarantee. In fact, Dr. Thompson did not ask for anything. Because of the increasing demand for doctors in small communities especially, many towns do offer a guarantee but this was not the case here. The corporation did offer, only as an incentive, a year's paid rent on the clinic, rent on a house for one year, and his moving expenses.

Another item that needs explaining is that the clinic is being made available to the corporation and the new doctor by several area families, certainly not as a profit-making venture or investment, but merely as an interim financing procedure until permanent financing can be obtained. The clinic had to be purchased by June 1 and as a 100% loan was not available through the Small Business Administration, the corporation had to look to private sources for the interim

Comptroller Collects Tax Judgments

AUSTIN--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday his department has collected nearly \$1 million in sales tax judgments in the 16 months since he took office, more than was collected during the previous eight years.

Bullock said his sales tax division has collected \$993,000 in judgments since January 1, 1975, compared to only \$763,000 collected in the previous eight years since the sales tax was implemented.

"These judgments were against hard-core delinquents who refused to be considered uncollectable. Now we're starting to cash them in."

Also Friday, Bullock mailed checks totaling \$9.1 million to 599 Texas cities and towns, representing their May city sales tax rebates.

Bullock said he has remitted \$96.5 million so far this year to the 845 cities collecting the one-cent city sales tax.

Knox City's net payment was \$1085.26. Area towns and their totals include Munday, \$1397.65; Haskell, \$2578.31; Seymour, \$3286.92; Stamford, \$3136.10; and Aspermont, \$1337.27.

financing. According to a spokesman, 12 families agreed to offer their credit on bank notes as collateral to secure the clinic with each family's being responsible for \$5,000. Then, others volunteered to help and it was decided to increase the number to 20 families with the amount set at \$3,000. Presently 17 parties have agreed to be responsible for the lesser amount and the spokesman said that if as many as 30 families wanted to help, then the amount could be further reduced to \$2,000 each. If there are any readers who are interested in helping with this temporary financing procedure, they may contact any of the newly-elected officers of the non-profit corporation, including Bruce B. Campbell Jr., president; Joe Reeder Jr., vice president; Mrs. Jinx Shaver, secretary-treasurer or any of the twelve remaining board members who are Mrs. Stanton Brown, Charles Baker, R.A. Shaver Jr., Mrs. Grady Ellis, Martha Jones, R.C. Daniel, Hob Smith, W.R. Baker, Arnold Navratil, W.O. Smith, Lee Smith, or A.A. Cox.

Work is continuing toward a permanent loan on the clinic building whereby the corporation also will be responsible for this indebtedness. After a year's practice, Dr. Thompson will have a lease-purchase option on the clinic, as well as the house.

The drive is continuing for the \$20,000 in donations, and contributors are reminded that each person who donates automatically becomes a member of the corporation regardless of the amount he or she contributes.

Several persons mistakenly took the suggested amounts of \$300 for a family of three or four and \$120 for individuals over a year's time as mandatory when actually, these amounts were only suggested as guidelines for contributors to consider.



"The school year at most institutions is drawing to a close," Carl R. Beisner, Social Security Representative in Vernon, commented today, "and it is a good time to remind students receiving Social Security benefits of their obligations in making certain reports. Of course, the obligations are a year round thing," Mr. Beisner went on, "but end of the school year is a convenient time to sum them all up."

"A student may be receiving Social Security benefits on the record of his or her retired, deceased, or disabled parent," Mr. Beisner explained. "They must be over 18 and be in full-time attendance at a properly certified school. The benefits can continue through the end of the term in which the student becomes age 22. Naturally in the four year period lots of changes can occur. Therefore," Mr. Beisner stated, "if a student who receives Social Security gets married, or stops attending school, or reduces attendance below full-time, or changes schools they must report to Social Security. Also, if your employer pays you to attend school as part of your job you must report."

"One thing students should also understand," Mr. Beisner said, "is that they are subject to the same work test as a retired person. They are allowed to earn \$2670.00 in 1976 and receive all benefits. If they expect to earn more they should report to Social Security. A parttime or summer job might cause them to be overpaid if they don't report. The local Social Security office is ready at all times to answer student questions and assist with reports," Mr. Beisner concluded.
