The Crowell Wildcats had seven players named to the all-district team, while Aspermont filled six positions, and Haskell, M... and Paducah placed one each on the first team.

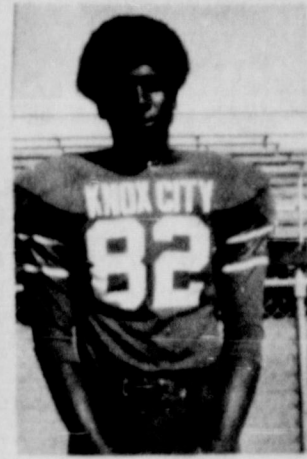
Coach Mullins explained to the News office that any coach is not allowed to nominate or vote for one of his own boys.

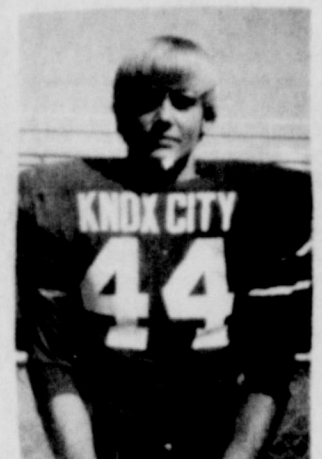

KC Couple Injured Tues.

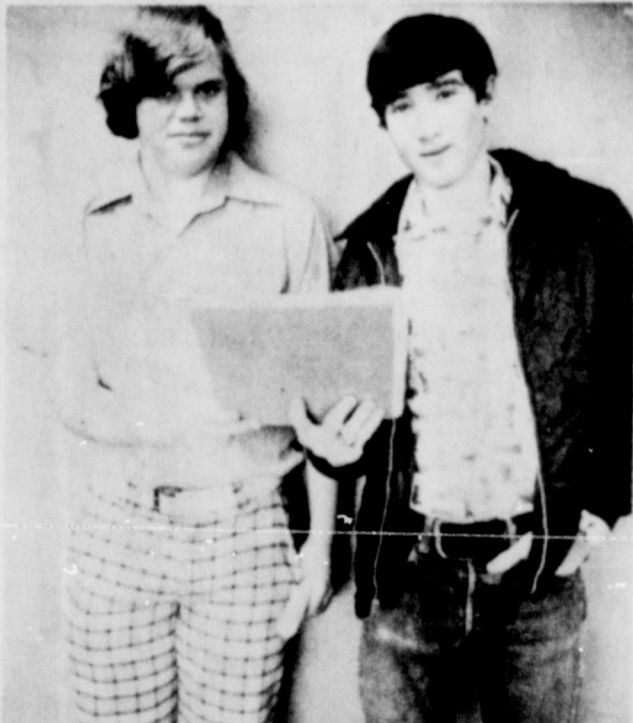
Mr. and Mrs. E.G. Parkhill of Knox City were injured in a two-car collision on a curve half a mile west of Haskell on FM 2163 Tuesday afternoon.

A Haskell couple, Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Foote, both died at Haskell Memorial Hospital as a result of the accident. Mrs. Foote, 79, the driver, died at 3:45 p.m. and her husband, 90, died five minutes later.

The Parkhills were taken to Haskell Memorial Hospital by Holden-McCauley ambulance and later transferred to the Knox County Hospital here where they are listed in satisfactory condition Tuesday night. According to a hospital spokesman Wednesday morning, Mr. Parkhill was up and about in his room and Mrs. Parkhill was still undergoing X-rays.

According to investigators James Davis and James Sanders of the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Foote vehicle was traveling west into the curve and the Parkhill car was going east, about to turn north onto a dirt road, when the left front-to-left front collision occurred.

Services for the Footes were pending in Haskell. Mrs. Foote was a high school home economics teacher in Weiner, Paint Creek, and O'Brien for many years.

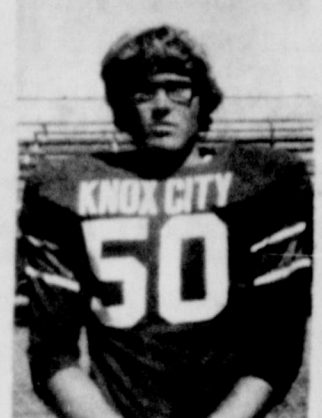
With all the busy days ahead, we hope that our readers will consider the advantage of placing their greetings in this special edition, thus taking away the added expense of stamping and mailing cards this year.

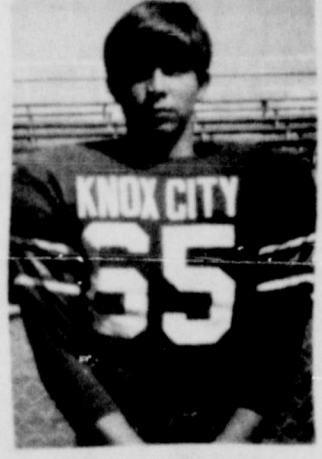

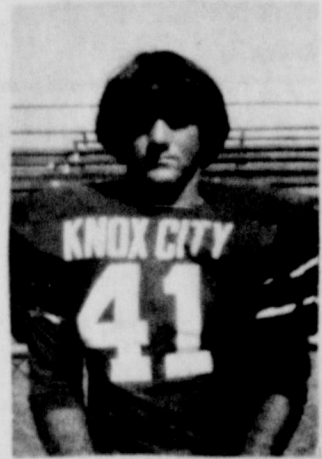

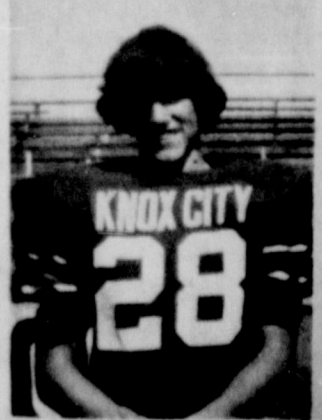

Cotton Samples Now Total 8,600

The USDA's Agricultural
 Marketing Service Office at
 Munday classed 8,600 cotton
 samples during the week
 ending Friday, December 6,
 according to Sidney Ferrell,
 In-Charge.

Total samples classed for
 the season was 10,800. At
 this time last year 55,000
 samples had been classed,
 which is greater than the total
 amount expected this season.

Grades continue to improve
 with twenty-five percent
 grading white. Grade 41 ac-
 counted for eighteen percent,
 and grades 31 and 51 were three
 and four percent respectively.
 Grade 32 accounted for thir-
 teen percent, grade 42 for
 forty four percent, and grade
 52 was seven percent. Ten
 percent of the cotton classed
 was full spots. Only two
 percent of the cotton was
 reduced in grade because of
 bark. Staple 30 was the
 predominant staple length
 with forty-seven percent. Staple
 31 was twenty-four per-
 cent, and staple 29 was seven-
 teen percent.

Mike readings continue to
 be good with ninety-four
 percent falling in the 3.5-4.9
 range. Low and high mike
 readings each accounted for
 three percent.

Local market activity is
 extremely slow. The Dallas
 Exchange showed no changes
 in prices quoted. Grade 41
 with staple 30 was quoted at
 33.75 cents per pound, and
 grade 42 with staple 30 was
 31.00 cents.

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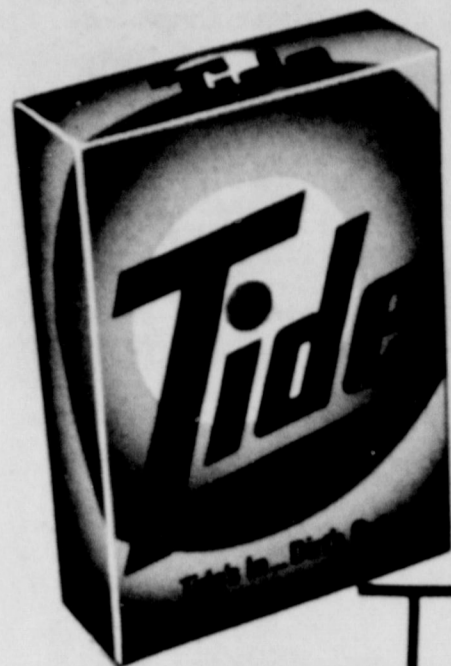

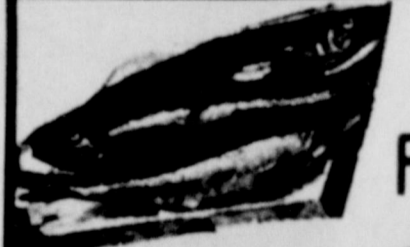
