





Cotton Samples Now Total 8,600

The USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service Office at Munday classed 8,600 cotton samples during the week ending Friday, December 6, according to Sidney Ferrell. In-Charge.

Total samples classed for the season was 10,800. At this time last year 55,000 samples had been classed. which is greater than the total amount expected this season.

Grades continue to improve with twenty-five percent grading white. Grade 41 accounted for eighteen percent, and grades 31 and 51 were three and four percent respectively. Grade 32 accounted for thirteen perecent, grade 42 for forty four percent, and grade 52 was seven percent. Ten percent of the cotton classed was full spots. Only two percent of the cotton was reduced in grade because of bark. Staple 30 was the predominant staple length with forty-seven percent. Staple 31 was twenty-four percent, and staple 29 was seventeen percent.

Mike readings continue to be good with ninety-four percent falling in the 3.5-4.9 range. Low and high mike readings each accounted for three percent.

Local market activity is extremely slow. The Dallas Exchange showed no changes in prices quoted. Grade 41 with staple 30 was quoted at 33.75 cents per pound, and grade 42 with staple 30 was 31.00 cents.



Former KC Man Doing Tech Cabbage Research

LUBBOCK, Dec. 4, 1974 --Texas Tech University agricultural researchers found that spring cabbage planted in the protection of winter wheat outyielded the unprotected cabbage by 143 per

The test was made by vegetable researchers near Munday in Knox County 140 miles east of Lubbock and 75 miles west of Wichita Falls.

"Thus the yields of cabbage in the protected area would have paid for the land taken out of cabbage production and devoted to wheat." said Joe D. Tidwell, who is in charge of the vegetable research program near Mun-

"The major benefits of the wind protection appeared to be in the promotion of crop growth," Tidwell reported. The heads of cabbage in the windbreak strips averaged 119 per cent larger than those in open ground, resulting in the average increase in yield of 143 per cent."

Tidwell said the winter wheat windbreak had no consistent effect on cabbage stands, although the average number of plants per acre was slightly higher in the protected strips.

The cabbage was field seeded in February in threebed strips of winter wheat four beds wide. For comparison, cabbage was seeded at the same time in open ground, in beds without any kind of wind protection. The wheat was harvested June 3. leaving 10 inches of stubble height

"The real protection, however, came from the time the cabbage was seeded until near maturity," Tidwell said. The cabbage was harvested only two weeks after the wheat was cut.

from windbreaks such as wheat strips are associated with the reduced velocity of the wind over the soil surface, resulting in less drying of the soil and reduced water loss from the crop plants, as well as reduced abrasion of crop leaves and stems from windblown soil particles. The protection also increased soil and

air temperature in the microclimatic zone near the ground. Increased air temperatures induce more rapid crop growth and earlier maturity.

Increased soil temperatures accelerate root growth, the rate of nutrient uptake by crop roots, and the conversion in the soil of unavailable forms of plant nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus to readily available forms.

Increased soil temperatures also aid water absorption by the crop plants and favor increased root extension into areas where additional water and nutrients are stored. Tidwell said.

Dr. John D. Downes, professor of agronomy at Texas Tech and director of the College of Agricultural Sciences vegetable research program, said that vegetable research in the Munday area has been under way since

MODERN FURNITURE NEEDS SPECIAL CARE

Modern furniture materials need special care. What was good for wood isn't necessarily good for the plastic and metal furniture so popular

Some pointers to help you care for your non-wood furniture are

-Acrylics sold under the brand names Plexiglas and Lucite: Remove grease and oil stains with kerosene, while gasoline or isopropyl alcohol, followed with soap and water.

A mild cleaner-polish can be made with one part liquid detergent and three parts

Paste wax takes care of minor surface scratches.

Solvents such as acetone benzene, carbon tetrachloride or laquer thinner damage these acrylic materials. Also, never use a cleaner-wax com-

-Plastics including Micarta, Formica, and Melmine:

These materials are used for laminated tops and sides of case goods and counters and washing with detergent and water, followed by polishing with a soft, dry cloth is

sufficient.

If the finish is dull, polish it with a low luster cream or silicone base wax.

For badly worn areas or spots, use a single step auto cleaner polish. Pour it on a cloth and rub with the grain in long, even strokes. Do not use a whirling motion.

Rub those worn areas or spots until an even gloss appears, then apply a cream polish or silicone base wax. as with acrylics, never use solvents such as carbon tetracholride, benzene, acetone, or laquer thinner.

-STainless steel:

Ordinary cleaning methods with soap, synthetic detergent and water should be sufficient for stainless steel. For difficult stains, use

quality metal polish. Remove scratches with extra fine steel wool--using a light touch-then towel dry parallel to the polish lines.

Water softener in a paste will remove water spots.

Stubborn spots on chrome can be removed with a paste of whiting and household

Always rinse metals and polish with a soft cloth.

About Your Social Security

People under 72 can work and earn more and still get their social secuirty benefits starting in January, according to Carl R. Beisner, claims representative, from the Vernon Social Security office.

"In 1975 people can earn as much as \$2,520 and get their full social security retirement or survivor's benefits." Mr. Beisner said. "Previously the yearly earnings limit was \$2,400. The increase keeps the amount in line with increases in general average wages."

For earnings over \$2,520 in 1975, social security benefits will be reduced by \$1 for every \$2 earned. "But no matter how much people earn for the year," Mr. Beisner said, "they can get their full social security benefit for any month in which they neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in their own business." Previously the monthly earnings limit was

Different rules apply to disabled people who are getting social security disability benefits. "And people 72 and over will continue to get their full social security benefits regardless of earnings." Mr. Beisner noted. The \$2,400 figure applies to the report of earnings for 1974 that people who get benefits must send to social security

by April 15, 1975.

The social security contributions rate remains the same--5.85 percent of covered wages contributed by employees and employers: 7.9 percent of covered self-employment income.

The earnings and contributions base -- the amount on which social security contributions are made -- will be the first 14,100 of covered earnings for the year, starting in January. Previously the base was \$13,200.

Social security pays over \$4.9 billion a month in retirement, disability, and survivors benefits to over 30 million people. The Social Security Administration is an agancy of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.






and aid in crop production on the next crop. Tillage with sweeps or chisels which leave sorghum stalks standing or on top of the soil, provide excellent wind erosion control. The stalks should be left on the soil surface as long as possibile before preparing the land for the next crop. Deep breaking the land should be confined to cotton land, or used on sorghum fields following the blow season. Very sandy fields should be drilled with a crop that produces a large amount of residue, such as small grain or sorghum.

The planting of shelter belts, or windbreaks was one of the first practices used to control wind erosion in our area. It is true that in recent years many of the early plantings have been taken out, but the fact remains that the shelter belt of selected trees and shrubs still offers one of the best ways to protect land. houses, barns, and other enclosures from high winds. A properly designed wind break will deflect the wind up and over fields, buildings, livestock, and increase the efficiency of wall and roof

insulation in buildings.






