

CLOSURE BEGAN AT MILLERS CREEK RESERVOIR about mid-afternoon Tuesday, April 16, according to Pete Beecher, North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority manager, who came by the News office last Friday to report on the event. Beecher explained that crews were running 12 hours a day, seven days a week, and hopefully, within five or six weeks, will bring the earthen dam to the top. They are now filling in two to three feet per day. Beecher said that it would not be necessary to have the lake full to begin supplying water to member towns of Haskell, Munday, Goree, and Knox City, but that after a good rain is received, the water valve could be closed off two or three feet above the low water intake structure. 





When on special, buy pienty of eggs--and freeze the extras, Miss Nancy Fuhrken, asst. county Extension agent suggested.

But don't just place eggs-shell and all--in a freezer, she warned.

To successfully freeze them, break eggs and blend whites and yolks together. Add one-fourth teaspoon of sugar or salt per egg--to prevent them from becoming thick and gummy--and cover tightly

If preferred, yolks and whites can be frozen separately.

To freeze egg yolks, add sugar or salt, as instructed previously.

Egg whites, on the other hand, don't require extra ingredients to maintain quality during freezing, the agent said.

A new Santa Fe record: Moving a BILLION bushels of grain in 20 months



This year marks the one hundredth anniversary of Turkey Red Wheat in the United States. Through the efforts of the Santa Fe back in 1874, the Mennonites emigrated from Russia and brought with them a few sacks of their wheat. It thrived in the Midwest and parts of the Southwest to develop that area into the breadbasket of the world.

The past twenty months have been the most strenuous period in Santa Fe's one hundred year history of moving grain. A billion bushels have been handled since the heavy movement associated with the sale of grain for export, and the bumper harvests began in July, 1972. Within this period of time, Santa Fe has moved over 350,000 carloads of grain.

The Santa Fe freight fleet of 78,000 cars includes 16,000 covered hoppers, 12,000 of them jumbo 100-ton cars, which are ideal for moving grains, potash and other bulk commodities. Big moves also require modern diesel power, automated yards and skillful people to get the job done. All of this is now at work as Santa Fe continues at a record pace moving billions of the many things needed and used every day by the people of our nation.





Get More Work From Less Fuel

Leon Burkham, vocational agriculture instructor in Knox City High School, has submitted the following suggestions for making the maximum use of tractor fuel. The information was provided by Norman K. Waggoner, tractor maintenance specialist at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Waggoner states that never has there been a time when a good schedule of regular maintenance was more important than now. No engine can make maximun use of fuel without abundance of clean air and clean fuel. This calls for servicing the air filter to assure the engine's "free breathing". Give special attention to keeping the fuel clean and servicing the fuel filter. Operators may be forced to accept a low grade fuel that may be high in sultur content. Sulfur in diesel fuel should not exceed one-half of one per cent. A greater percentage than this will require more frequent oil changes. Tillage practices might well be analyzed. Can the number of trips over the field be reduced without affecting the yield? Can some tillage operations be combined? Maybe we should ask ourselves, "is this trip really necessary?" Being sure tillage implements are properly adjusted will relieve side draft and reduce power requirements. Selecting the proper forward gear to match the load will greatly improve efficiency. In many cases an operator can shift up to the next higher gear and throttle back. Diesel tractors give better fuel economy when fully loaded. Weight the tractor to keep wheel slippage below 15%. Preferrably about 10%. It has been found that wheel slippage of between 15-20 percent increases fuel consumption 10% and tire wear 40%. Excessive weight will also waste fuel. So good judgement is required here. Using the small tractor for small jobs and big tractor for big jobs is more important today than ever. Don't "baby" the tractor, load it and work it. Remember that an engine that is idling is not idle at all. It is surning valuable fuel.





Kehoe said facilities (poles, cable, lines, connectors, lighareas are more costly to the company per customer than in urban areas because of the length of the facilities between rural customers and the fewer customers served by rural facilities.

'I think anyone can see that in rural areas a mile of facilities may serve very few customers, maybe no more than one. This mile of facilities in an urban area can serve hundreds, making the cost per customer much high-

Kehoe continuted, "Additional equipment is needed to provide rural service because it is scattered and this additional equipment means more maintenance and more possibilities of outages and trouble reports, he said.

Other rural-oriented expenses cited include more automobile expenses and manhours in driving time; wire facilities usually require more time and are more susceptible predominant in rural areas, require more manhours to locate trouble.

"To initiate this new rate structure, we have completely reviewed our service in this area on an individual basis. Some customers in the past have been paying for the lower priced eight party service when they are actually receiving four party or better service. Now, they will be charged for the class of service they are receiving." explained.
