Monthly social security benefits can be paid to a wife on her work record even if her husband keeps working, and if a woman has worked long enough under social security and retires, becomes disab led, or dies, her children can be paid benefits on her record until they're 18--or until 22 if they're full-time students and remain unmarried.

Half of all retired women get monthly social security retirement payments on their own record, according to Beisner.
