

McFARLANE CHARGES GRAFT

Two former senators received money for interfering with activities of the Lepartment of Justice in a case at Wilmington-, Del., involving the Radio Corporation of America and other large companies, Representative W. D. McFarlane of Texas charged Thursday.

Urging a house investigation to dctcr mine whether monopolies exist in the radio field, he told the Rules Committee the interference occured six years ago wmic the Senators were in office.

McFarlane did not name the former Senators nor did he explain a statement that he had been considering impeachment proceedings.

Sees a Conspiracy.

"It has been my thought for some time," he said. "To present to the house certain information including data in affidavit form which conclusively proves the existence of a criminal conspiracy, which not only debauched a financial institution, persons holding high public offices and also our court officials.

In a resolution to authorize an investigation of charges that a monopoly or mouopolies exist in radio broadcasting alleged to be held by the Columbia, National and Mutual Broadcasting Systems, McFarlane said: "Under a consent decree, approved by the Hoover administration and entered as an order of the Federal Court in Wiimington, Del., Nov. 21, 1932, a monopoly in radio manufacturing, sale and distribution of all radio equipment was illegally authorized and the said consent decree is also credited with defrauding the stock holders of one corporation of more than \$200,000,000."

Shows Auditor's Report.

He said if he had failed to present his Information to the Rules Committee that would have permittd "those who know I possess this information to indict me for my failure to live up to my oath of offfice."

The Texan exhibited a report of an auditor of the RCA which he said showed RCA officials "have defrauded common stock holders to an extent of millions of dellars.

McFarlane had not concluded his testimony when the committee adjourned, subject to the call of Chairman John J. O'Connor, New York Democrat.

The editor gets the blame for the mistakes of ommission and commission, but from opinions of most gentle readers the mistakes of commission are in the majorit,. The editor always tries to be fair to all alike, but sometimes he innocently blun ders-then the fat's in the fire and the cussing begins.

Running a newspaper is a hard life; an easy life; a life of roses and thorns; an interesting and sometimes a repulsive life. Yes, it is a great life, if you don't weaken.

Also frequently one undertakes to carry on a conversation with a person who doesin't seem to know much and quite frequently we learn that he is a college graduate, but a person who had not kert up his education by reading the daily pa-

The professor also says that the school pupils should be taught to read the editorials appearing in the papers.

Frankly we'll have to admit that some discussions which pass off as editorials are very weak, and puerile.

But the editorials in a paper are sup posed to give the editor's interpretation of the events discussed.

And the suggestion is a wise one

There is only one source of such nows and such interpretation of news-and that is the daily newspaper.

ORSES have no sense of height. And that is just as well, for the ORSES have no sense of height. And that is just as well, for the new skyline trail which has been taid out in Jasper National Park, in the heart of the Canadian Rockies, lies for three miles on the top-most edge of a ridge more than 8500 feet high. It is a mile down to the valley floor from the top of the ridge and the shale slopes shoot downward from both sides of the trail at an angle of 45 degrees. On a clear day it is possible to see more than 100 miles from this spectacular trail, even down into the Columbia Icefield region, the largest glacial area south of the Arctic in North America.
