Report From Cotton Classing Week Ending 11-11

The Munday cotton classing office of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, classed over 11,200 samples during the week ending November 11, according to A. D. Peebles, in charge of the office.

Three tables were in operation this week and another classer is expected to be added next week. This will bring the office to peak capacity.

Consumer and marketing service statistics for the week show about 10 percent of the cotton in the White grades; over 80 percent in the Light Spotted grades and about 7 percent in the Spotted grades. Leading grades were Middling Light Spotted, 48 percent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 35 percent.

Peebles said staple lengths for the same period showed approximately the following ranges: 7-8 inch and shorter, 1 percent, 29-32, 34 percent, 15-16, 54 percent, 31-32, 4 percent and 1 inch and longer, 7 percent.

Micronaire reading for the week indicated about two-thirds of the cotton was in the 3.5-4.9 range, about one-fourth in the 5.0-5.2 range, and less than one-tenth 5.3 and above.

Sales of cotton continued quite limited. Cotton Division summaries show prices mostly ranging from 30 to 60 points above loan value.

Average selling prices during the week for Mid Lt Sp, 15-16, was 18.75 cents per pound and Slim Lt Sp, 15-16, was 17.80 cents per pound.

There are 21,000 farmers in the Rolling Plains that are being urged to do the same thing. This is not a guarantee that we will get the poundage back, but if the appeals are not made, there is absolutely no chance of receiving the poundage back.

Forms are available at all gin offices in Knox County, and these forms need to be completed and carried to the ASC office by Monday, November 21.

A spokesman explained, "We are not trying to get something for nothing, but this is rightfully ours and the only chance we have of getting it, is by appealing. If we are successful in this effort, it will mean an income in excess of \$100,000 for Knox County farmers next year."

The judges awarded the place prize to the third and fourth grades for their entry, "Peace on Earth."

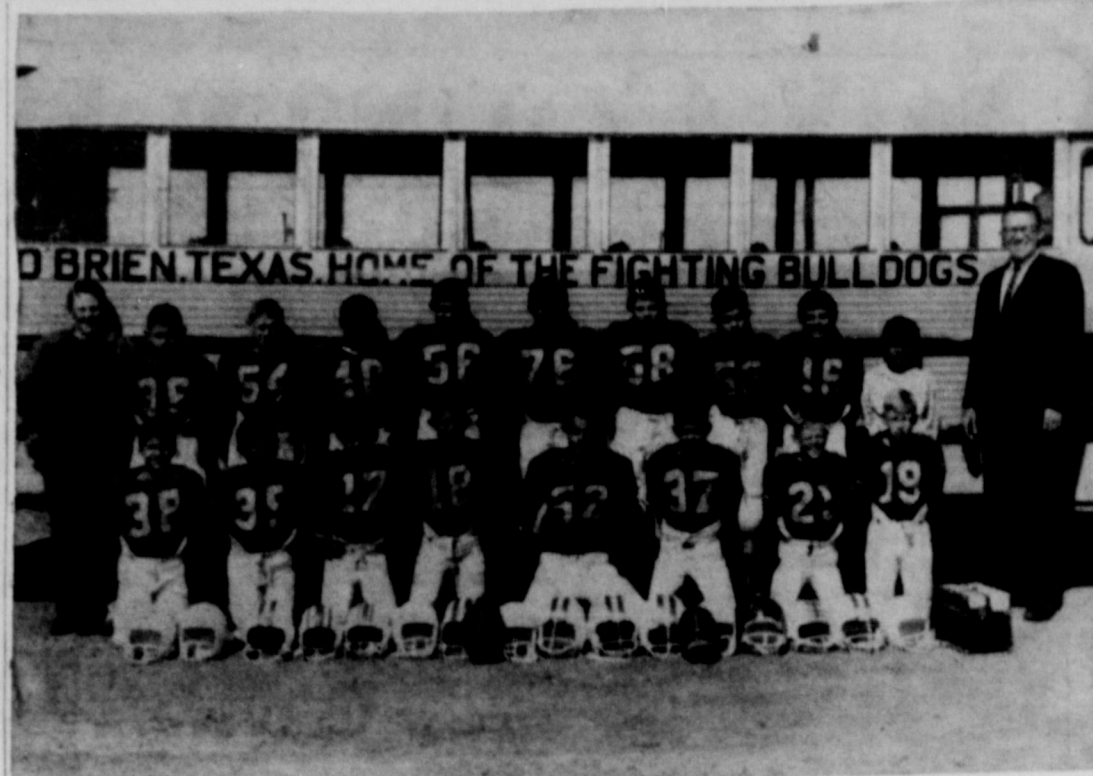

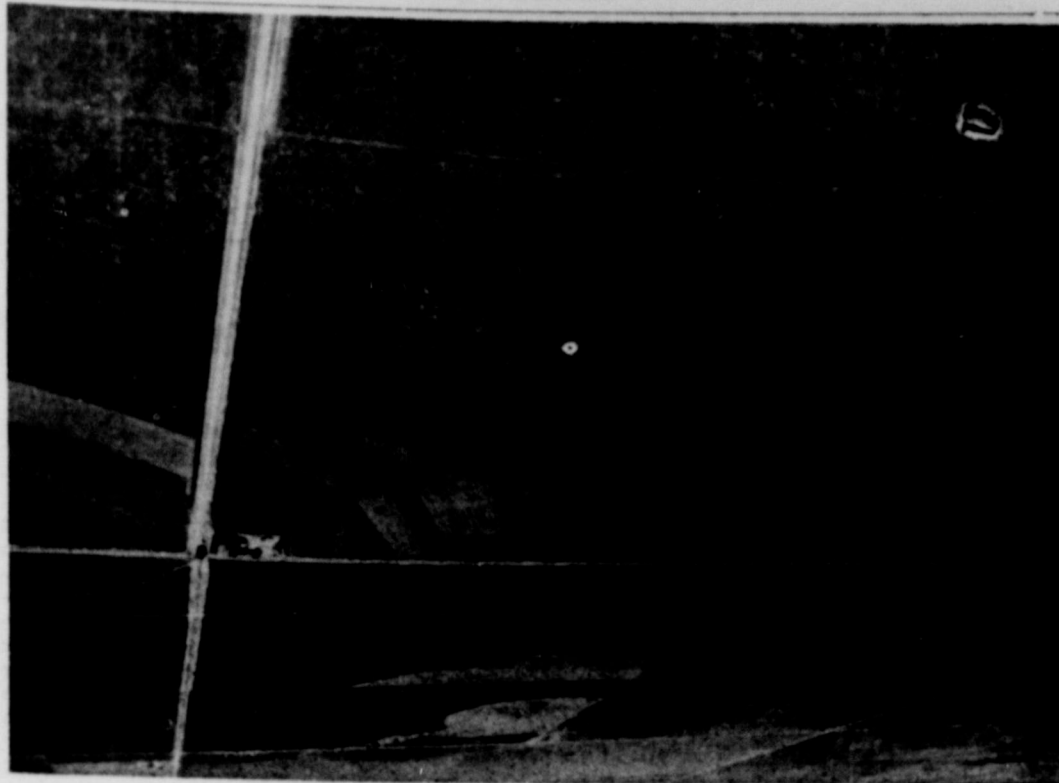

Parallel Terrace Now Most Popular

Pictured above is one of the many new Parallel Terraces built on farms through technical help from SCS and loans from FHA.

Texas built enough of the new evenly spaced parallel terraces last year to reach from Texas to Maine—more than 2,200 miles, according to Wesley Robbins, soil conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Knox City. "In fact, nearly half the terraces built in Texas were the new kind."

Cooperators with local conservation districts built more than 3,000 miles of all kinds of crop and terraces last year. 2,265 miles were parallel, as compared to 994 miles in 1965, 440 in 1964.

"This isn't just another Texas brag," Robbins continued. "It just shows how popular these modern terraces are becoming. The amount built has doubled two years in a row."

"Terraces spaced on even number of rows apart and without point rows are called parallel terraces," Robbins pointed out. They really save time and money for the farmer and they do a good job of conserving soil and water.

Parallel terraces are spaced to fit both the farmers equipment and the lay of the land. For example, they might be built 24 rows apart or 72 rows apart, depending upon the slope, three-, four-, six- or eight-row equipment could be used in either of the above cases.

Designing, laying out and building this kind of terrace system, however, is not an easy job. Robbins said it takes more engineering time to design and stake a parallel system. They may cost more to build. Shorter terraces with more graded waterways may be needed. More cuts and fills are used.

Our engineers are willing to take the extra time to figure out parallel terraces," Robbins said. Some short cuts have been developed and we're getting more efficient in working out these modern conservation systems."

"We feel that in another year or two, 50 to 75 percent of the terraces built in Texas will be the parallel type."

Landowners and operators like them—from city farmer to soil and water conservation district supervisors. They are easy to plow and they save time and fuel. They also eliminate or greatly reduce short rows of uneven length-point rows. Some landowners say they would not have built terraces if SCS had not worked out these which are much easier to farm.

"Cost-share from the Great Plains Conservation Program and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has helped

many farmers build these terraces. Technical help from the SCS and loans from the Farmers Home Administration have also helped get this job done", Robbins concluded.

Knox County Hospital Does Not Operate To 'Make Money'

Many contrasting ideas are gathered about community hospitals. These ideas are often likened to the contrasting ideas that the fabled blind men got when they examined the elephant. Since each blind man touched only a small part of the elephant, each visualized a different picture and none could accurately describe what the whole elephant was like.

We don't want your hospital to be like the elephant. We want every citizen to know the whole story, to be able to describe the whole hospital, to know why the hospital exists, what it does, and how it performs its mission.

Let us begin by describing the type and ownership of an average size hospital we will call Knox County Hospital.

All of the nation's 7,123 hospitals fall into three major categories insofar as ownership is concerned. These categories are the voluntary non-profit, governmental and proprietary.

About 3,426 of the 7,123 hospitals are what we know as voluntary non-profit short-term hospitals. These are community institutions or are operated by churches or fraternal organizations. Usually their patients have ailments requiring hospitalization for less than 30 days.

These hospitals make no profit but must use their income to provide services to the community. They are governed by an unpaid board of trustees. These trustees employ an administrator who works as a full-time executive head of the institution. The doctors work in the hospital but are not employed by it.

These voluntary hospitals are

financed by patient income, although as a general rule, patient income is not sufficient to pay all the expenses encountered by the hospital. The balance comes from other sources, such as gifts and contributions, endowments, community funds, local governmental reimbursement for indigent care, legacies, and other sources of income.

The second major ownership category is governmental, federal, state, and local. These include the hospitals owned by the federal government used mostly for hospitalization of members and veterans of the Armed Services. Our governmental hospital system also includes more than 1,453 short-term hospitals and some 600 long-term hospitals that are owned by the state and local governmental units. For the most part, locally owned hospitals (county, city and district) are also dependent on patient income to defray total operational expenses. Deficits, when other sources of income are not available, must be absorbed by public tax money.

The third major category is the proprietary of profit making hospital. The average size of the 857 hospitals is less than 45 beds. The proprietary hospitals, usually owned by an individual, partnership or corporation, is totally dependent on patient income.

Knox County Hospital falls within the second category, is owned by Knox County and is governed by an appointed board of directors, who serve their community in this important assignment with out pay. The board of directors, employ an administrator who is a full time executive director of the hospital.

Knox County Hospital is classified, staffed, and equipped to take care of short-term general medical, surgical and maternity patients as well as emergencies. The average length of stay of patients treated at Your Knox County Hospital is 5 days.

Knox County Hospital is established under the Statutes of the State and is fully licensed to operate as a hospital by the State of Texas. Your Knox County Hospital does not "make money." Every dollar that is collected for services rendered is utilized to pay the operating expenses of the hospital and to provide hospitalization services to the community. The charges for services are established at a rate designed to pay the actual cost of day-to-day patient care.

Knox County Hospital has staff of doctors. These doctors are a part of a self-governing group responsible for seeing that high quality medical care is given to all patients in the hospital.

Knox County Hospital has 42 adult patient beds and 8 bassinets, complete X-ray facilities, operating room, emergency room, delivery room and a nursery. It employs registered nurses, licensed vocational nurses, and nurses aids or practical nurses who provide nursing care to the patients around the clock, 365 days a year. There are many other people employed who provide services to the patient but with whom the patient has very little contact such as the business office personnel and the food service personnel, and the building and maintenance personnel.

It takes all these things and all these people to create the whole picture; to make the "elephant" take its true shape. It takes many hands and many skills to provide today's hospital care, which is more important for your good health than ever before.

There Is A Lot Of dissatisfied Cotton Farmers In Rolling Plains Area

Dissatisfied Rolling Plains cotton producers affected by a recent U. S. Dept. of Agri ruling which would penalize farmers for certain skip-row planting in the past, and greatly effects the 1967 through meanselected yield, can have an opportunity of voicing their individual opinion of USDA decision through means of appeal for a fair projected yield.

"Farmers across the Rolling Plains who feel their 1967 projected yield is not what it should be, or think they are not receiving the pounds they are entitled to may appeal to their county ASCS committee," said Charles Stenholm, executive vice president of the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

This possible solution of the highly controversial ruling which has been increasing in interest and opposition during the past few weeks came out of a meeting of 125 cotton farmers and ASCS personnel from 15 counties of the Rolling Plains Thursday night in Stamford. The meeting which was called by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. was to determine the feelings on the farmers as to what action should be taken concerning the ruling which will mean a loss of up to 4 million dollars in the Rolling Plains.

Also attending the meeting were Frank Moore of Plainview and James E. Goad of Rosebud, both State ASCS committee members, Lewis Davis, State executive ASCS director, and W. M. Holt, State program specialist.

"Although tempers flared and feelings ran high during the meeting, several routes to take were brought out into the open," Stenholm said, "But a lot of major unanswered questions still remain."

"Where are the pounds of cotton the Rolling Plains lost? Has the State of Texas received its fair and equitable projected yield? How is the projected yield for Texas derived by the USDA?"

"These are questions that no one has been capable of answering, thus far," Stenholm said. But they must be answered and soon."

"Feelings of the Rolling Plains farmers were strong last year in their protest of the change of the skip-row regulations which was

forced on the Rolling Plains farmers in 1966," said Mr. Stenholm. "However, when you compare a farmer's reaction now when he fully understands that cotton he produced by skip-row planting in 1962-65 under a no-penalty system is now being penalized, that farmer is hopping mad."

The USDA ruling says that the skip-row penalty would be retroactive for 2-1 and 2-2 cotton planted in 1962-63-64-65. Projected USDA cotton yields in Texas for 1967 takes in the retroactive penalty for skip-row planting. Consequently, projected yields in skip-row areas are considerably lower than they should be.

The penalty, combined with a lower projected yield, would mean a loss of some 4 million dollars to the economy of the Rolling Plains. Beginning in 1966, Rolling Plains farmers have changed to a 2-4 system of planting, which is a no-penalty system" said Stenholm. "But from 1962-65, farmer who planted under a 2-1 and 2-2 system were also planting under a non-penalty system. Now the USDA wants to change the rule in the middle of the game."

"Whenever a rule is written that has the effect of saying: 'stake of cotton that makes 11 bolls in 1962 is now only entitled to 7.7 bolls in 1967, that rule severely discriminates against an area that certainly does not deserve such inequity. That ruling should be removed. This is the heart of the protest."

A report of the meeting in Stamford is to be forwarded to the USDA in Washington by those ASCS committee members who attended. However, communications in the past with the USDA have indicated the ruling will not be changed.

"The USDA and the State ASCS committee has admitted there has been an inequity placed on the Rolling Plains farmers but neither group indicates they will correct the situation. Now is it up to the farmers themselves to get the job done. This can be accomplished by immediate action in the form of protests from the individual farmers through their local ASCS committee requesting that their farms receive a fair and equitable projected yield," Stenholm said.
