Benjamin Testing Well As Source City Water

jamin reports that an adequate supply of water for the city of Benjamin has been discovered two miles east, on the O. D. Propps farm, north of Highway

Ree Gardner, driller, reports that the water was found at a depth of 52 feet, and that the well was drilled to 59 feet. From all indications an abund-ant supply of water can be obtained if three more wells were drilled. Mr. Gardner is driller for J. M. Whittaker Co. of Anson, and has had several years experience in drilling oil and water wells, and Mr. Gardner is of the opinion that the well will furnish from 10 to 20 gallons of water per minute at present conditions.

Preliminary tests were made by use of a bailing bucket that yielded 10 gallons per minute nder continuous bailing.

Citizens of Benjamin are very nuch elated over the possibil-ties of an adequate water sup-oly for the city, and hope that the discovery will solve the water problem that has been ndering the city's growth.

Mayor Ball, city councilmen and the Chamber of Commerce are making every effort towards supplying the town with water. Possibility of getting a loan

for the city, is being planned.



U. S. COTTON EXPORTS SHOW BIG INCREASE

U. S. Cotton has been shipped abroad in significant amounts since June of last year, the Department of Agriculture reports. For the first four months of the 1945-46 season, August-November, exports were 924,000 bales, compared with 511,000 bales a year earlier.

These figures included shinments to France, the United Kingdom, Canada, Spain, Poland, Yugoslavia and Czechoclavakia. No cotton was exported to Germany and Japan, both of wheih were large prewar buyers of American cotton.

If exports continue at same rate, total foreign shipnents of cotton would amount to 3.3 million bales for the year compared with 1.9 million bales during the marketing year ended last July.

HEALTH LETTER

Inasmuch as typhus fever is ven this early in the year, showing an increased incidence over the State, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, today issued an urgent appeal to every Texan to cooperate in rodent control measures.

"The conquest of typhus fever in Texas is far from com-Dr. Cox declared. "There is still entirely too much of this disabling disease

"Concentrated effort and close cooperation from every citizen of Texas is urgently needed if typhus fever is to be brought definitely under control," Cox continued, "and this certainly must be done if our public health in Texas is to be protected.

Inasmuch as typhus fever is spread by the flea which feeds on typhus infected rats, control measures, according to Dr. Cox, depend on rat extermination through means of starving out and building out rats as well as trapping and poisoning. He stated that regardless of what fine garbage collection and disposal system a community naintains, it is almost worth ess in rodent control unless garbage is put into (and not peside) a garbage pail and the pail kept covered at all times.

Rat-proofing of all homes and usiness houses should be unertaken as quickly as possible and the local health departments are usually able to assist in overcoming the obstacle of obtaining materials and labor.. They can also assist in trapping and poisoning campaigns and will gladly do so upon request.
