Funeral services were held at 10:00 a.m. Thursday in the Gillespie Church for Miss Lue Ophelia Vance, 78, with the Rev. Jack Maddox, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Gillespie Cemetery under the direction of Smith Funeral Home. Miss Vance died Tuesday at 6:00 p.m. at Callan Hospital in Rotan where she had been a patient for one day. Born April 12, 1890, in New Moon, Alabama, she was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Vance. She had been a resident of Rotan for two months, moving there from Knox City where she had resided for 46 years. Survivors include three brothers, Ewell of Rotan, Oscar of Temple, and Jim of Bakersfield, California; and five sisters, Mrs. Homer Beard of Rotan, Mrs. Rodie Gore of Imperial, California, Mrs. Julia Knight of Winnsboro, Mrs. Mayme Mathis of Odessa, and Mrs. Cal Jeffries of Pixley, California.

Wreck South Of O'Brien Kills Abilene Couple, Injures One

A head-on collision Saturday morning .9 mile south of O'Brien killed an Abilene couple and injured a Knox City man. The accident occurred on a curve near the Cities Service loading dock on State Highway 283. Mr. and Mrs. Everett Maton Owens of 1145 Grand, Abilene, were dead as a result of the accident. Owens, 44, lived only three minutes after being brought to the Knox County Hospital by Smith Funeral Home ambulance. Mrs. Owens, 41, was dead on arrival. Daniel Espinoza, 31, was injured and received emergency treatment at the Knox County Hospital before being taken to Wichita General Hospital in Wichita Falls. He was reported to have suffered a broken jaw, broken shoulder, and lacerations about the head and face. Highway Patrolman Stuart Eriksen said the Owens' 1967 Ford pickup was traveling south

when it collided with a north-bound 1965 Ford car driven by Espinoza. According to Eriksen, both vehicles were total losses. Mr. Owens was owner of Jolly Cleaners in Abilene and was employed as a parttime driver for Butterfield Express Company, which delivers The Abilene Reporter-News to area agents. He was making his run at the time of the accident. Funeral services were held Tuesday at 3 p.m. in Elliott's Chapel of Memories with Dr. Tilden Armstrong, pastor of the First Methodist Church there, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Jack Riddlehoover, pastor of Pioneer Drive Baptist Church. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Gardens. A report on the condition of Espinoza was not available at press time. Moore asked that those who are interested contact the nearest DPS patrolman or DPS office. "In return," he said, "they will receive complete information in regard to the application and examination."

Training School For New Patrolmen Begins July 30

A training school for 120 new patrolmen with the Texas Department of Public Safety will start July 30, Major Luther Moore, Regional Commander, announced today. "We have several new benefits to offer qualified young men," Moore said. "For instance, the pay during training is \$500 per month and upon graduation this is increased to \$571." "Also, our selection methods are more liberal in that an applicant is not required to live in Texas for one year prior to employment, and the entrance examination is given every day at our larger offices." To qualify for employment in the uniformed services of the DPS, a man must be between the ages of 20 and 35, not less than 5 feet 8 inches tall, have a high school education or its equivalent, be in sound physical condition and good vision and must be a citizen of the United States. "Among the many benefits that patrolmen enjoy," Moore pointed out, "are two weeks annual vacation, all holidays provided for by the Legislature, modern liberal retirement systems and group hospitalization and life insurance plans, travel-

First Phase Of Two County Planning Survey Completed

In a meeting held Tuesday evening in Monday, representatives from Rochester, Haskell, Knox City and Munday were given the preliminary report for Comprehensive Water and Sewer Planning of Knox and Haskell Counties. This survey, which was made available to the two counties through a Grant by FHA, is being made by Freese, Nichols and Endress, Consulting Engineers of Fort Worth. Mr. James R. Nichols explained to the group the facts that had been compiled to the present date. He also gave a summary of population characteristics of the two counties. Despite the decline in population since 1930, which was the peak year for Knox and Haskell counties, the study shows a projected growth trend, in most areas, of the two counties through 1990. Detailed economic base study and analysis of agricultural economy of each county was studied before arriving at these estimates. The only possible deterrent to population growth is that which presently exists -- a continuation of a limited supply of municipal water. Irrigation water for agricultural crops is available in adequate quantities; however, the industries to utilize these crops will be dependent upon a high quality water that is not available from the underground source. Both Knox and Haskell Counties contain favorable conditions for future expansion of their economies. However, future growth will depend largely on how well the counties prepare for the attraction of industry and how well they exploit their present economic advantages. It is felt that the Knox-Haskell Region has a great number of resources that are necessary for economic expansion; however, the growth of the area will depend entirely on the desire of its residents to undertake the necessary steps to provide foundation for this growth. Mr. Nichols expressed a desire to meet again in the near future. See SURVEY, Page 2

missed and allowed to come home.

Only three days before Mr. Hudson's confinement, he and his wife had begun a new home at 507 East Third Street here in Knox City and as he came back to his new home, Mr. Hudson realized that he was coming home to a new way of life, also. Instead of returning and folding his hands, he decided that now was the time to do the things he had always enjoyed doing but had never had time for—until now. This is how his miniature orchard came about. His first trees were ordered and it took some of them months to arrive, but in March, 1967, the first trees were planted, each a dwarf. The beautifully-kept orchard now has two peach trees, an Elberta and a Golden Jubilee; three apple trees, a red delicious, yellow transparent, and a McIntosh; one pear; two cherries, a sweet and a sour; three apricots; and three

plums, Stanley prune, superior, and green gage. He is planning to add more trees this fall.

The fruit trees are bearing, and according to the Hudsons, one of the apple trees recently had more than eighteen full-size apples on it, but due to the high winds two weeks ago and an occasional 'visitor', the number was less when these pictures were made.

In addition to keeping the orchard, Mr. Hudson is in the process of welding horse shoes together for ornamental gate posts on his backyard fence and for the porch supports to the building on the back of his lots which houses his upholstery business. (Incidentally, Mr. Hudson took this up for a livelihood after his return home and stays 'booked-up' for months ahead in this business!) The horse shoes are then sprayed with aluminum paint for a very neat and attractive finish.

East of the miniature orchard, the Hudsons have a beau-

tiful flower bed with multicolored zinnias and dianthus. Next to the flowers, a thriving vegetable garden is in evidence with onions, tomatoes, beans, egg plant, squash, and strawberries in clean, even rows.

The Hudsons have recently completed several attractive planters in their yard built of brick and trimmed with rocks that he has collected since about 1930 from several states including South Carolina, Georgia, Mississippi, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arizona, California, and Texas. One planter contains dwarf zinnias and dwarf marigolds; the other a pear tree and dwarf dianthus.

This is all very remarkable, because it takes many hours of work and Mr. Hudson still must rest some each day. Also, his wife and helper in all of this is an employee of the Knox County Hospital where she has worked for nine years.

The Hudsons are the parents of three daughters who are Mrs. Mona Cook of Dallas, Mrs. George Rowlett of Gillette, Wyoming, and Mrs. Andy Norrid of Amarillo.

Mr. Hudson's parents are the late Mr. and Mrs. Ike Hudson, longtime area residents.

Record Of Earnings Speeds SS Benefits

All residents of Knox County who file claims for social security benefits will be asked to furnish a record of their 1967 earnings and a statement of their expected earnings for 1968.

Edwin S. Draughon, social security representative for Knox County, states that farmers and other self-employed persons will be asked to submit a copy of their 1967 Federal income tax return when they file their claims. Applicants who worked as employees should furnish their copy of Form W-2 for 1967.

Evidence of 1967 earnings, according to Mr. Draughon, is needed in figuring the monthly benefit amount. The first check can be speeded up if this evidence is submitted when the claim is filed.

Applications can be filed with Mr. Draughon at the City Hall in Knox City, Texas.

Your family is not drinking enough milk, according to recent government surveys. Try a different angle to insure they have enough calcium.

Nonfat dry milk may be included in a number of mixed dishes without ever being detected. Meat loaf, macaroni and cheese, cream soups, mashed potatoes and cooked cereal are just a few examples.

Use it without reconstituting and check the package for specific instructions.

Nonfat dry milk costs substantially less than fresh fluid milk, too. The powder can be kept on the shelf for a long time and requires little storage space.

Evaporated milk is another economical product which can be used in a variety of ways. The unopened cans have the advantage of requiring shelf rather than refrigerator space and, like nonfat dry milk, may be kept for fairly long periods of time without deterioration. Once the can is opened, it should be refrigerated.

Evaporated milk is made by removing a little more than half of the water from whole milk, so it can be successfully used in puddings and other desserts, in cream soups and cream sauces, in scrambled eggs and in baked goods.

Remember to use half as much milk as the recipe calls for and to add an equal amount of water. In these days of high prices, it might be a good idea to explore these money-saving ways with milk.

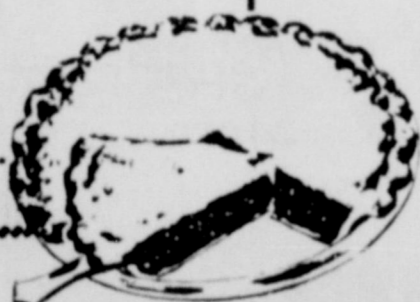

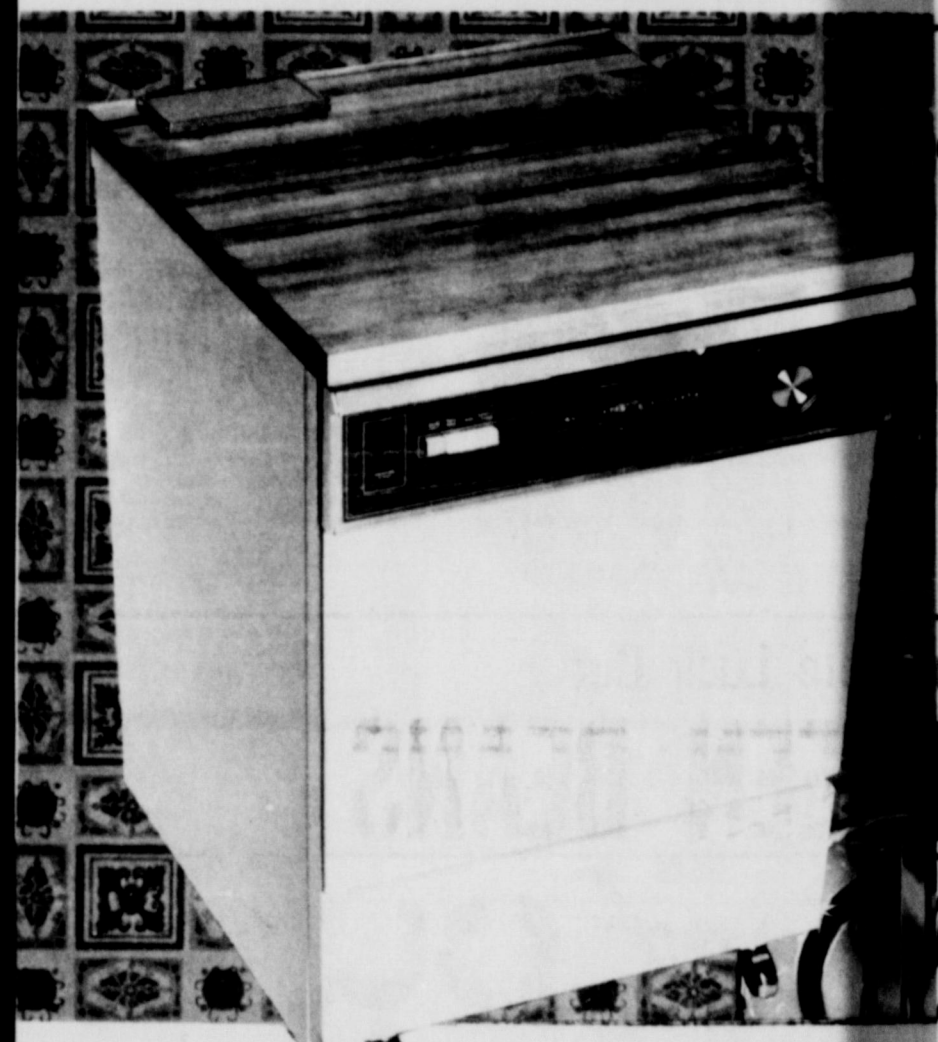


