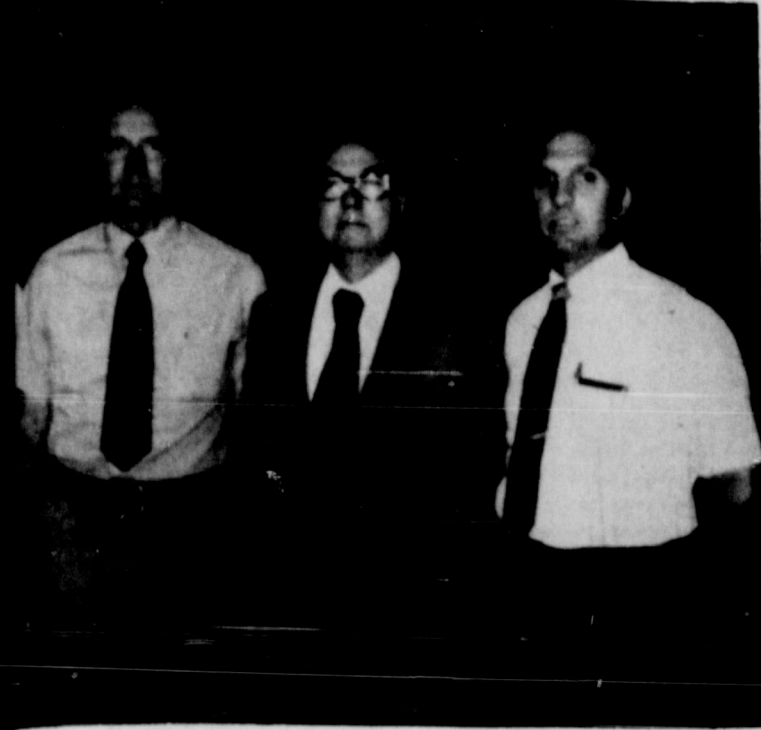

Requiem mass for Tommy S. Quintana was held at the Santa Rosa Catholic Church Tuesday at 10:00 a.m. Father Bartholomew Landwermeyer of Rhineland officiated. Rosary was said Monday at 7:30 p.m. in the Santa Rosa Catholic Church.

Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Quintana, 28, died Sunday at 4:10 a.m. from a gunshot wound at the home of Luciano Quintanilla where he was visiting.

Man's Dies

Investigating officers were Knox County Sheriff H.C. Stone, Deputy Sheriff James Redwine, Constable LeRoy Davis, and Justice of the Peace Guy Bradley.

Bradley ruled "self-inflicted accidental death" in the Sunday morning shooting.

Born November 18, 1945, in Knox City, he was employed by his brother at the Quintana Fina Station. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

Survivors include two sons, Tommy Jr. and John Paul, both of Hobbs, N.M.; two daughters, Kathryn Marie and Yolanda, both of Hobbs, N.M.; two brothers, Joe and Tony, both of Knox City.

Moisture content was 15.75 and the load weighed 18,130 pounds.

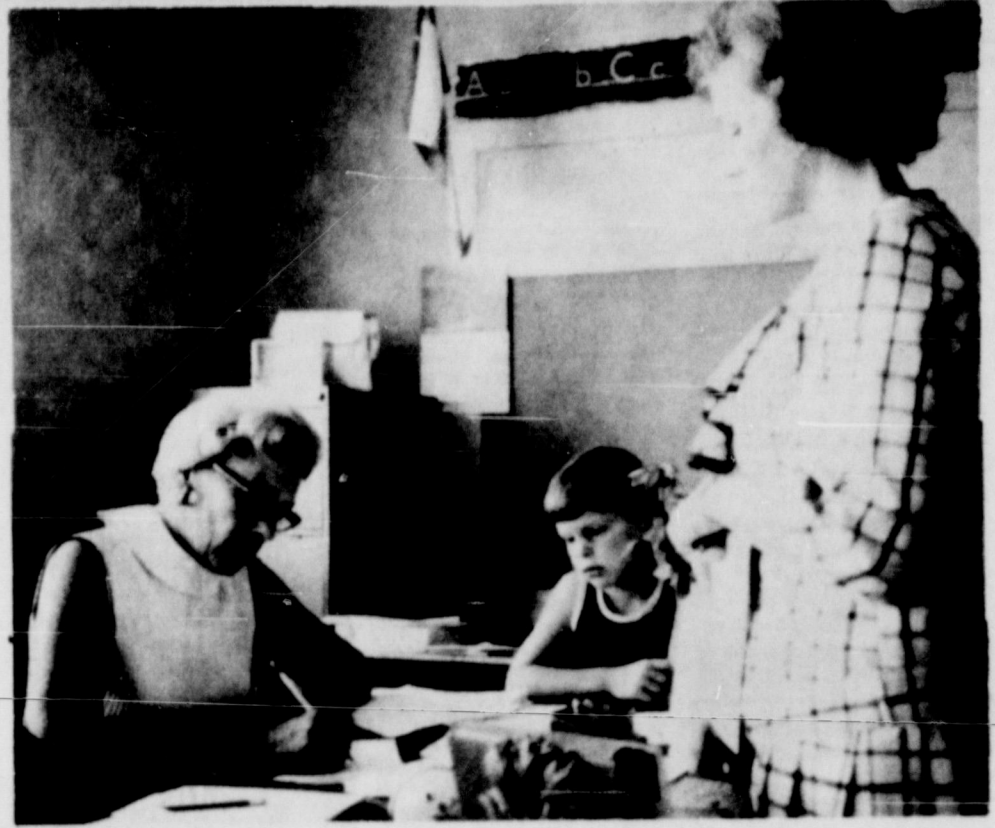
Farmers Grain Company received its first load of milo Thursday, August 8, grown by Gene Hester on the Johnston farm.

KC Schools To Participate In School Lunch Program

Knox City Schools will take part again this year in the Texas Education Agency's School Lunch Program.

At the beginning of school, each student is given a letter telling about free breakfasts and lunches and a form to be used if the family wants to apply for them. Because of this program, every school child is guaranteed at least one warm, balanced meal a day, and by being better fed, is more able to learn at school.

Using the following income scale as a guideline, families may want to apply for free school breakfasts and lunches for their children. Families who are suffering from unusual hardships are also eligible for the free lunch and breakfast program, and are urged to take advantage of it. Hardships might include unusually heavy medical bills or one or both of the parents being unable to work.

Each student who is receiving free meals at the close of school can begin school receiving free meals, until the new applications are processed.

All records of the School Lunch Program are confidential. No student knows who is receiving free lunches. Each applicant is advised by letter whether his application has been approved or not.

Guests To Appear Weekly On Lubbock TV

Two weeks ago a story in the Knox County News that Gwen Hewitt and her husband, Lloyd Maines, had been named on a weekly Get Down Country television show every 5:30 p.m. over

KSEL, Channel 28, in Lubbock. On that particular Saturday, July 27, most of the program was not seen due to the impeachment proceedings underway by the House Judiciary Committee. However, the program was televised the next Saturday, August 3, and

co-host Don Caldwell invited the girls at that time to join the program as regulars.

Caldwell, formerly of Slaton, who owns and operates Don Caldwell Studios at 1214 Ave. Q in Lubbock, and co-host Don Turner, vice-president and production manager of KSEL, began the weekly show last April. Sponsored by the House of Alexander in Lubbock, the show features country-western artists. Mr. Caldwell explained that in addition to the regular performers, several guests also appear each week.

One of the guests who is appearing frequently these days in Levealand's Terri Sue Newman who fronted the Ray Price Show in Lubbock August 2. The 20-year-old singer released her first record nationwide on June 25. The recording, on Cinnamon Records, features "Teachin' the Teacher" and "One". Charles Addington, band director in Whitharral, who served with Don Caldwell as Miss Newman's manager, wrote "Teachin' the Teacher" which was recorded at Don Caldwell Studios in Lubbock while veteran Nashville songwriters Jerry Foster and Bill

Rice are responsible for the flip side recorded in Nashville.

The very versatile Miss Newman began singing at the age of four years and in addition to her vocal talent, plays the piano, electric bass, and flute. She not only writes, but also produces records. Terri Sue, five feet four with red hair and green eyes, has a low, soulful voice according to Caldwell, her personal manager. He described her "a female Charlie Rich" because "she is an extremely soulful singer."

Another regular on Get Down Country is Cecil Caldwell (no relation to Don). Bobby Albright and his Boot Hill Express, who record for Warner Brothers, also appear frequently with vocalist Debbie Bartow.

A former regular, Liz Lawson, who is being replaced by Gwen and Stacy, is moving to El Paso in the near future. She is currently being considered by several major record labels and a release is expected by January, according to Caldwell.

Gwen and Stacy are now in the process of finishing a gospel hymn album and oc-

asionally on the Get Down Country program will sing one of the hymns from the album, which should be released within the next few weeks.

Lloyd Maines, producer of the show and general manager of Don Caldwell Studios, is a very capable steel guitar player and assists in recordings at the studio as well as with the music for "Get Down Country".

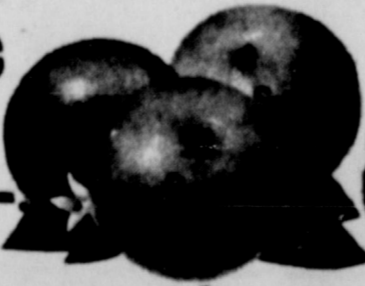
