

Eskimo Ivory Carving

One of the most widely followed professions in the Far North is that of the ivery curver, and it is not only an inbut a pastime as well, filling of the long evenings of the lengthy Arctic winter. The Eskimos have pever uttained the perfection of the Chinese artisans, due partly to the greater crudity of their methods and the fact that they use the martiy to vory of the walrus instead of that of the elephant, but some of their produsia show ure of artistry.

The stock articles which the Eskinos manifecture are bends, cribbage tourds, napkin rings and crochet needles. They are made, usually, from the outer portion of the wairus tusk, as the interior is a bony aubstance, mottled in appearance. The most prized articles are furnished from wairus ivory dug up from where it has lain for ages and become semi-fousiblized.

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
