Mrs. C. C. Hoge Named Knox County's Outstanding Older Citizen

At the Tuesday noonday luncheon of the Knox County Retired Teachers Association, held in the Knox City Community Center, Mrs. C. C. (Elbbie) Hoge of Knox City was honored as Knox County's Outstanding Older Texan for 1975.

Mrs. Hoge was nominated by Mrs. Jewell F. Lea for her past and present contributions she has given our society, and the honoree will join a list of other older Texans throughout the state as well as persons throughout the nation, who are being recognized.

The event, sponsored by the Knox County Retired Teachers Association, included the presentation of Outstanding Knox County Senior Citizen Award by Knox County Judge Sam E. Clonts.

Requirements were that the nominee must be at least 65 years old and have lived in Knox County for at least six years.

Noting that there are more than a million Texans who are 65 or older, Mrs. Ottis Cash, president of the Knox County RTA said local activities focus on the way older citizens affect both "our heritage and our horizons—by enriching our heritage and setting an example for reaching horizons."

Mrs. Hoge, who came to Knox City as a bride in 1911, has always been active in church, community and county activities.

A member of First United Methodist Church, Mrs. Hoge has taught both in youth and adult classes, and has been active in the women's work of the church, serving on the local, district, and conference levels.

As long as there was a Parent-Teacher Association in Knox City, Mrs. Hoge was a very active member. She was instrumental in obtaining WPA lunchrooms for the schools and in securing the necessary equipment.

Mrs. Hoge is a charter member of the Knox City Study Club which this year celebrates its Fiftieth anniversary. She was a member of the Home Demonstration Club for many years and is currently serving as reporter for the Knox City Garden Club. She is a member of the Knox County Retired Teachers Association and the State and National Retired Teachers Associations, having held many offices in these organizations in the past. Adults Complete GED Classes

The Adult Education Classes have been completed for Knox, Haskell, and Stonewall Counties and have been termed a success by the Administration and class instructors. One hundred sixty-nine enrolled and fifty passed their GED tests.

The Knox City Adult Basic Education classes were taught by Mrs. Louise Kemletz and Mrs. Joanne Delgado. The classes met for four and one-half hours twice a week for six months. Twenty-nine students enrolled, some of whom were senior citizens.

The students had varied purposes in mind when registering. One reason was self-satisfaction to be able to help their school-age children; another was to increase their own skills for the purpose of passing their General Education Equivalency tests so they could receive their High School Equivalency Diploma from the Texas Education Agency.

In Level III, those preparing to take their GED test, showed much interest and expressed a desire after their test (GED) to enroll in some Vocational Classes or Trade School to increase their skills. Much Needed Rain Falls During Week

As residents watched the dark heavy thunderclouds last Thursday, heavy rains began falling about 2:00 p.m. that afternoon and through Friday morning had produced 2.97 inches, according to the Plant Materials Center, located four miles northwest of town.

According to reports, a large tree was uprooted on the Howard Word farm, five miles north of town, evidently the results of a small twister.

No other damage was reported, however.

As of noon Wednesday, a total of 4.79 had been recorded at the Plant Center. Stanton Brown reported the League Ranch Headquarters southeast of Benjamin had received a total of 4.27 as of Wednesday morning.

John Chilcoat, who lives on the Ross Ranch west of Benjamin, reported approximately seven inches had been received before Wednesday morning's rainfall.

Wednesday morning, varying amounts of .70 to three inches were reported southeast of town while O'Brien reported approximately five and one half inches for the week and Lee Smith, west of town, received six inches during the week.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF O'BRIEN, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING METHODS FOR DUMPING IN THE CITY OF O'BRIEN DUMP GROUNDS; SETTING OUT WHAT MAY OR MAY NOT BE DUMPED IN SAID DUMP GROUNDS; AND PROVIDING THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATION THEREOF, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH,
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'BRIEN, TEXAS: Section 1. That from and after the passage of this ordinance, it shall be unlawful for any person to dump anything refuse any place but the pit, that is provided, in the said dump grounds.
Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to dump any dead animal carcasses, any motor vehicles, any tree limbs or any part of the tree that will not go into the pit, or any article that is too large to go into the pit.
Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn anything in the dump grounds.
Section 4. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined any amount not to exceed the sum of Two Hundred Dollars, \$200.00, and each violation shall constitute a separate offense.
Section 5. All ordinances and parts of ordinance in conflict herewith, are hereby expressly repealed.

Dates Announced For Pecan Tree Spraying



A second application spray time is suggested from June 4 to June 7. Cool weather has delayed and scattered emergence of the adult pecan nut casebearer adult moth which makes two applications to obtain a high percent control.

Persons who have applied spray applications earlier will want to consider one or two other applications, in these dates, Collier said.
