

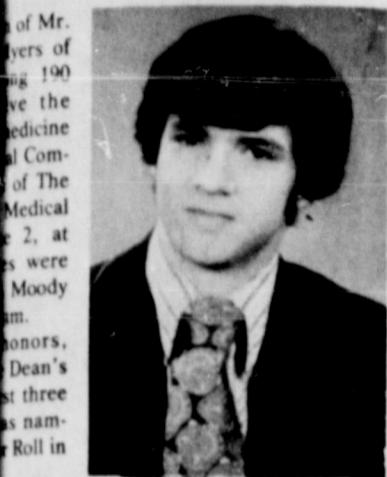

Rains, Some Damage Occur Over Weekend

Beneficial rains from moderate to heavy fell Saturday and Sunday nights in the area with some hail damage reported north of Knox City.

Replanting will be necessary on many acres that are unwatered, it was reported.

The wheat harvest, which had just begun last week, was halted due to the rain.

Benjamin reported three inches and amounts around Knox City varied from 1.40 to 2 inches.

Monday night rains produced some high water on highways in the Benjamin, Munday, and Seymour areas. Reports were that the highway was closed between Benjamin and Seymour and also between Munday and Seymour due to the high waters early Tuesday.

Light rain fell again Monday and Tuesday nights accompanied by small hail and high winds.

The storm warning signal sounded at 3:15 Monday night and again around 2:30 Tuesday night warning residents of the approaching clouds.

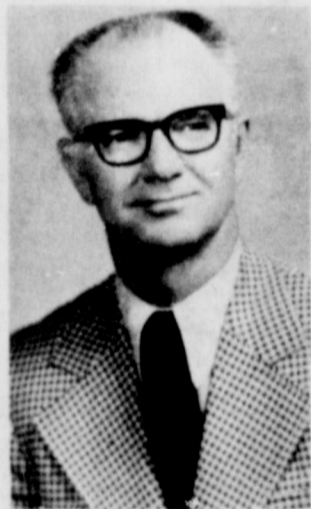
Employment Office Open in Munday

As project manager for the F-14 TOMCAT, he follows the plane from its actual production site at Grumman Aerospace Corporation in Bethpage, New York, to its future deployment aboard aircraft carriers scheduled for this fall. To become totally familiar with the aircraft, he recently flew on an F-14 test flight.

Despite his rise in the Navy to the rank of flag officer, and the successful progression of his career to his present position, Alvis has not forgotten Rochester and the First Baptist Church in which he was, and members of his family still are, very active. He recalls his school days at Rochester's elementary, junior, and senior high schools, his work with the Future Farmers of America, and even the day when he was out horseback riding with his fourth grade classmates, started to show off, and ended up on the ground with a broken arm. "The break was right in

the joint, and the doctor said it was going to take a long time for the bone to mend. For weeks I carried a bucket of sand back and forth to school to straighten that arm," he says.

Alvis fondly describes Rochester as a town of about 500, including cats, dogs, and newborn babies. He thinks of the residents as being "extremely hard working people, most of them involved in agriculture." He states that farming is such an important occupation in the area that agriculture and farm machinery handling were common courses taught in high school. His favorite memories of his school days, however, center around a woodworking course in which he actually made furniture. "That was very enjoyable," he says, "and I wish I could have continued it. I wouldn't dare attempt it today."

Like most of the Rochester students, all of Alvis' extra curricular activities centered around his father's farm. "Dad felt he fed and raised me, so that's where I worked, and it was hard work, too."

Upon graduation from high school, Alvis attended Texas A&M, majoring in electrical engineering, and it was while a student there that he enlisted in the Navy. He chose that particular branch of service, he claims, because of recruiting posters, and the fact that he had never seen the ocean. He had wondered about applying to the Naval Academy, but didn't know really how to go about it until after being in the Navy for a time, and consulting with his uncle namesake who lived in Abilene and was in law partnership with a local congressman. So while continuing his electrical engineering studies, now at Tulane University, he received an appointment to the Naval Academy. He graduated and was commissioned in 1949, the first full four year class to graduate following World War II. He went to sea on a destroyer following graduation and later entered flight training at Pensacola and Corpus Christi. After graduation from flight training, he was assigned to Night Fighter Detachment, Composite Squadron FOUR. He reported for instruction at the Naval Postgraduate School from where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Aeronautical Engineering, and continued his studies at the Oak Ridge School of Reactor Development, which gave him his Master of Science degree. His next assignment was with Attack Squadron 125. Follow-

ing attendance at Command and Staff School of the Naval War College, Alvis reported to Attack Squadron 212 where he served as maintenance and operations officer. Following that tour, he came to Washington to the Bureau of Naval Weapons, predecessor to the Naval Air Systems Command, and headed the Probes Branch in the Astronautics Program Office. Another degree, this a Master of Arts in International Affairs from George Washington University, was received prior to reporting as Executive Officer of Attack Squadron 112, where he later assumed command. During this tour he served off Vietnam aboard the carrier USS KITTY-HAWK, and was awarded the Bronze Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and the Navy Commendation Medal for extraordinary achievement in air strikes during thirty missions. He also received three Air Medals during this time. His combat tour was followed by further instruction at the Naval Nuclear Power School and Naval Nuclear Power Training Unit. He then reported as Executive Officer of USS ENTERPRISE during which time he received a second Bronze Star. In 1970 he assumed command of USS OGDEN and in 1971 became Commanding Officer of U.S. Naval Air Station, Lemoore, California. For exceptionally meritorious service in that capacity, he was awarded the Legion of Merit. He then reported to the Naval Air Systems Command as Director, Programs Division, until he was appointed F-14/Phoenix Missile Project Manager and selected in January of this year for promotion to his present rank.

As Alvis goes back over his Navy career, he cites his first squadron tour flying F4-U CORSAIRS, and his position as Commanding Officer of the Lemoore Air Station as the most enjoyable of his career. During his stay at Lemoore, he became very active in community affairs, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Navy League. His station was one of the stops for Operation Homecoming for the returned prisoners of war. "All jobs are fun, though. It just seems the higher up you go, the more responsibility, and after a while the responsibility outweighs the fun."

One of the most exciting events in his career occurred when he was forced to eject from his malfunctioning A-4 SKYHAWK aircraft. Fortunately, he relates, he bailed out over Clovis, New Mexico. "You know, you just can't beat Southwesterners for friendliness. That farmer was out in his field in no time, wanting to know if I was all right, while my plane was standing on its nose in his field. I tell you, for all the practice and training you get in ejecting from an aircraft, you never know what's going to happen until the real emergency occurs. Those pilots' parachutes are a lot smaller than the large ones the sky divers use."

His family has enjoyed Navy life too, and though they have never had a tour outside the continental United States, they certainly have had their share of traveling. From 1967 to 1971, the Alvis troop moved seven times - four of them from coast to coast, the other three trips up and down the coast. Alvis says it doesn't affect their four children, who seem to adjust marvelously well. Dayna is just 13, so they have their first teenager. Andra is 11 and a "typical grade school little girl." Scott, 10, and Grant, 9, are the two Little Leaguers in the family. Their luck for traveling outside the United States, other than a vacation in Hawaii, won't improve with their father's promotion, because they won't go with him when he leaves for Iran next month on business concerning the sale of his F-14 aircraft and the Phoenix missile to the Iranians.

When asked what advice he would give to the youth of Rochester who might consider the Navy as a career, Admiral Alvis was quick to respond. "The Navy offers a way of life in which you can certainly have all the responsibility in the world that you want if you are interested in responsibility and in getting things done and in influencing the lives of other people. The pay and security are not to be sneezed at - it allows you to live

comfortably and concentrate on your Navy work without wondering too much about how you're going to educate your children and that sort of thing."

Admiral Alvis seems to believe that if you work for the Navy, the Navy will work for you, and a mutual satisfaction will lead to an interesting career. It's obvious that this has happened in the case of Read Admiral John H. Alvis, and that even with his climb up the ladder of success, one of his highpoints still remains his visits back home to Rochester, Texas, where there still are to be found "the friendliest people in the world."

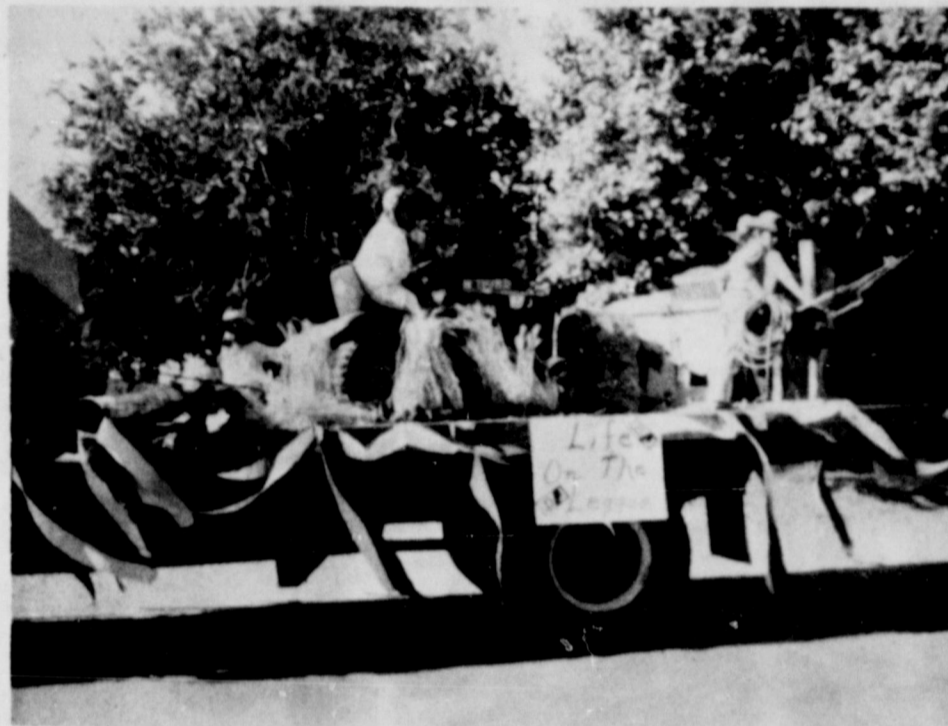
