The Commissioners Court of Knox County has declared war on careless dumping of trash and dead animals on highways and county roads in the county. The situation is getting out of hand, according to the court, and prosecution of offenders is one way of stopping the prac-

"Our highways and roads are fast becoming a public dump said County Judge Carl Patterson, in launching a drive to stop the practice. "We are asking the co-operation of our citizens in stopping the practice, but unless it is stopped, offenders will be prosecut ed under the law." he added.

County roads and highways are becoming an eyesore, with carcasses of animals and trash pitched out wherever handy. A section of the penal code covering this offense is published elsewhere in this issue, quoting the law and the penalty.





Art. 695. Whoever shall leave the carcass of any animal which died in the actual possession of such person, on any public road or highway or within 550 yards of such public road shall be fined not less than five nor more than one hundred dollars.

Art. 696. No person shall use or maintain any dumping ground or dump trash, refuse, debris or permit the same to remain nearer than three hundred yards of any public highway of the State of Texas.

Any violation of this act shall subject the offender to a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than two hundred dol-



### HEALTH LETTER

Dr. Geo. W. Cox. State Health Officer, today issued a warning against the danger of malaria following the heavy rainfall in Texas, which usually occurs during the spring and early summer months.

"Malaria will remain a mafor public health problem as long as breeding places are accessible to the female Anophe les mosquito," - Dr. Cox said. "Every householder should be sure that there are no tin cans, broken bottles, or other types of rubbish on his premises that will hold water and offer breeding places to this enemy of good health."

Dr. Cox pointed out that in our practice of mospuito control, we are sometimes like the man who locked the stable door after the horse was al ready stolen: we are content to wait until all our premises are swarming with mosquitoes before we bring ourselves into active warfare against these recognized agents of malaria transmission

Dr. Cox further stressed the importance of conserving the public health and preventing the spread of disease in our present crowded conditions, and he also emphasized the fact that malaria is one of the more debilitating diseases, often causing its victims to lose much time from his regular employ ment or from school attendance

Said Dr. Cox: "The best cure for malaria is prevention. Make sure your premises are free from any stagnant waters, in which may breed the female Anopheles mosquito that transmits the disease."

"Every pound of food eaten fresh from the garden, or preserved for use next winter, will release an equivalent amount of food to be shipped to the starving millions abroad," President Truman.

The survey indicates the public knows that in our economy profits are indispensable. And the majority regard 10% as a fair rate of profit in normal times. Many large businesses, including ourselves, would consider it a banner year if we could reach this figure. All these figures show that our
