Castor Beans Ready For County Farmers

County Agent W. C. Pall meyer said this week that Knox County farmers may pick up their castor beans, for planting, at Baker Castor Bean Co.

Pallmeyer urged farmers who plan to plant the beans to pick up their seed as soon as possible, so as to get choice seed.

The county agent reported that almost 1,000 acres in Knox County will be planted to the bean this year. A new harvester will be available, and will be handled through the PMA office in Knox City.

Planting time is from middle of May to the latter part of June, Pallmeyer said. The planting seed at Vernon will cost 15 cents per pound.




