Free Chest X-Rays To Be Made Tuesday

Mrs. B. B. Campbell, chairman of the chest x-ray drive, asked the full cooperation of every civic and service club and every business man in Knox City when the mobile x-ray unit makes a visit here next Tuesday, August 5.

Service clubs have appointed men to help unload the equipment, and women to help list those who take the x-rays.

Mrs. Campbell asked business men to insist that their clerks take advantage of the free chest x-rays and to instruct their clerks to remind customers to have their x-rays.

The unit is being brought here at the request of Knox County doctors, with the cooperation of the Knox County Home Demonstration Clubs.

Allen, Trainham To Be in Run-Off In Precinct 2

The only run-off in Knox County in the second Democratic primary will be in the Benjamin, Vera and Brock communities, where Ernest Allen and W. W. Trainham are candidates for the office of Commissioner of Precinct 2.

Allen was high in the four-man race, receiving 190 votes. Trainham received 150, W. T. Hamilton 84, and Collins Moorhouse 72.

Frank Hill Elected County Judge

Frank Hill of Benjamin won a term as county judge of Knox County Saturday by defeating L. A. Parker, present commissioner of Precinct 2. The vote was Hill 1,290, Parker 1,164.

Mr. Hill had served as deputy sheriff of the county until he resigned to make the race for the judge's office. He will reassume his duties as deputy until about January 1.

Knight Re-elected Without Run-Off

O. L. (Pete) Knight, County Commissioner of Precinct 1, was returned to office for another term Saturday with a substantial majority over two opponents.

Knight received a total of 619 votes in the Knox City and Sunset boxes, while Raymond L. Wilhite received 80 and Joe Simmons 30.

WASHINGTON OFFICIAL TO ANSWER FARMERS' AND RANCHERS' QUESTIONS

Michael J. Gavin, U. S. Undersecretary of Labor, will speak, and answer questions in Haskell Monday, August 4. He will discuss with growers how legally to obtain and use Mexican national workers under the U.S.-Mexico migrant labor agreement.

The meeting will be held in the American Legion Hall. It is being sponsored by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, the Texas Cotton Ginners Association, the Trans-Pecos Cotton Association and the El Paso Valley Cotton Association. It will begin at 1:30 p. m.

Buddy Bumpas, Jr., Knox County Tax Assessor-Collector, was returned to office Saturday by a substantial majority over his opponent, W. C. Glenn.

The county totals were Bumpas 1,935, Glenn 527. The Knox City east box gave Bumpas 380, Glenn 82, and the west box, Porter 71, Chamberlain 63.

Funeral Services Held Monday for H. T. Rader, 77

Henry Thomas Rader, 77, a resident of Knox City for 14 years, died Sunday in the Knox County Hospital after suffering a stroke at his home Saturday morning.

Funeral services were conducted Monday at 10:00 a. m. from the Knox City Church of Christ with Stanley Shipp, minister of the church, officiating.

Rader was born in Hanshaw, Tenn., and moved to Texas in 1885, settling in Williamson County. He moved to Haskell County in 1906, and from there to Knox City, where he was a farmer before retiring in 1949.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, Irene Rader and Mrs. Barney Grissom, both of Knox City; one son, Robert Rader of Knox City; two sisters, Mrs. A. A. Gaunt and Mrs. L. L. Bean of Rochester; three half-sisters, Mrs. Zoille Thomas and Mrs. E. C. King of O'Brien and Mrs. Mary Hill of Stigler, Oklahoma; and two half-brothers, John Rader of O'Brien and Joe Rader of Spade.

Pallbearers were J. T. Cypert, Raymond Wilhite, Lynn Tankersley, Charles Reed, Charles Reeves and Cornelius Stephens, all of Knox City. Named honorary pallbearers were W. W. Hyde, Tom Cummings, Earl Watson, Salem Hutchinson, Fred Harrison and Jack Culp.

Jones Re-elected District Attorney

Roy A. Jones of Paducah was re-elected district attorney of the 4-county 50th judicial district Saturday over J. C. Patterson, Knox County Attorney.

Official tabulation of the Knox County vote gave Jones 1,404, Patterson 969. In other counties the vote was as follows:

Cottle, Jones 1,177, Patterson 521; King, Jones 101, Patterson 44; Baylor, Jones 1,220, Patterson 827.

Knox City's east box gave Jones 249, Patterson 200, while the west box gave Jones 88, Patterson 42.

Oil Notes—

No official potential test has been made as yet on the Deep Rock Oil Corp. No. 1 J. G. Hawkins, four miles east of town, and operators are awaiting installation of a pumping unit.

The Signal Exploration Co. rig has moved from the Hawkins well one location west, and has set surface casing on the Mid-Continent Petroleum Corp. No. 1 George Buchanan.

The Fair Foundation No. 2 George Hardberger was completed as a flowing well this week in the North Knox City Palo Pinto Reef field. The reef was topped at 4,210 and bottom of the hole was 4,285.

No rig has been moved in as yet for the Oil Associates No. 2 Myrtle White, a location announced recently. The test will be one location east of the company's Myrtle White No. 1, which had a substantial oil show at 2,310 feet. The No. 1 was abandoned because operators were unable to squeeze off salt water, after drilling through the formation. Baker Drilling Co. of Pampa is contractor for the No. 2.

Other new locations announced recently for the Knox City area includes the Thomas D. Humphrey No. 2 Mary A. Bush, southwest of town, and the Jones, Anderson and Ward No. 1 H. Kempner Estate, six miles west of town. This location is four miles northeast of the Katz field.

PRECINCT CONVENTIONS HELD SATURDAY

A full delegation from Knox County is expected to attend the County Democratic Convention to be held at Benjamin Saturday at 2:00 p. m.

Delegates elected at the precinct conventions held Saturday were as follows:

East box: Roy Baker, J. W. Tankersley, E. L. Park, J. J. Denton and C. W. Stephens. Alternates are J. H. McGee, J. S. McBeth, C. Bohannon, Joe Reeder, Jr., and B. B. Cochran.

West box: L. W. Graham, J. Hawkins, Carl Chafin. Alternates are J. C. McGee, E. B. Shaver, Sr. and James Dutton.

Both groups instructed the delegates to vote as a unit. It was also voted to submit the names of Baker and Park as delegates to the state convention to be held in Amarillo Sept. 9.

MANY OFFICIALS ELECTED WITHOUT OPPOSITION

Sheriff Homer T. Melton, unopposed candidate for re-election, polled more votes than any other candidate on the ballot in the Democratic primary Saturday.

Melton received a total of 2,099.

Williams; County Attorney, T. W. Bullington; County Treasurer, W. F. Snody; District Clerk, Mrs. Opal Harrison; Justice of the Peace, W. L. Robnett, and Constable, LeRoy Davis.

All except Kimbrough and Bullington were candidates for re-election.

Funeral Held In Lorenzo Sunday for Mrs. J. H. Dutton, 83

Funeral services were held at the First Methodist Church in Lorenzo Sunday for Mrs. J. H. Dutton, age 83, who died Friday in a Dallas hospital.

Mrs. Dutton was the mother of the late John Dutton, long-time city secretary of Knox City, who died June 4, 1951. She had lived in Lorenzo since 1940, moving there from the Union Grove community near Knox City, where she had lived since 1908. Her husband, John Henry Dutton, preceded her in death Feb. 28, 1944, at Lorenzo.

Survivors include three sons, Albert L. Dutton of Muleshoe, Andrew J. Dutton of Muleshoe and Loy V. Dutton of Lubbock; and three daughters, Mrs. J. H. Ingraham of Alexandria, La.; and Mrs. A. J. Hendon and Mrs. O. R. Howard of Lorenzo.

Write-in Candidate Leads in O'Brien Weigher Race

S. J. Reeves, Jr., who staged a write-in campaign for the coveted office of Public Weigher of Precinct 7 in Haskell County, received 78 write-in votes Saturday to make him high man in the seven-man race.

Lincoln Bolin Defeats Lefevre For Public Weigher

Lincoln Bolin polled 381 votes Saturday to win a term of office as public weigher of the Knox City precinct.

The incumbent, Earl P. Lefevre, who had held the office one term, received 335 votes.

An erroneous report from the Knox City east box late Saturday night made it appear that Lefevre was the winner, but a careful check by election officials proved otherwise.

OLD AGE PENSION CHECKS TO BE INCREASED \$5.00

Beginning with the month of October, Old Age Assistance checks and Aid* to the Needy Blind checks will be increased \$5.00 above the present authorized amounts.

The increase is permanent, and was made possible by legislation recently enacted by the federal government, providing for release of these funds to the states.

In those cases where an individual is concurrently receiving Social Security compensation and a supplementary check through the State Welfare Department, the State Welfare check will not be increased, if the check coming from the federal government incorporates the \$5.00 increase.

It will not be necessary for anyone to write the State office in Austin, or to contact the local office in Munday, since the increase is automatic and will be included in the October warrants.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 55
Proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 50a, providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Scholarship Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine; providing that such students shall agree to practice in rural areas of this State; providing certain restrictions and limitations; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 50a which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 50a. The Legislature shall create a State Medical Education Board to be composed of not more than six (6) members whose qualifications, duties and terms of office shall be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall also establish a State Medical Education Fund and make adequate appropriations therefor to be used by the State Medical Education Board to provide grants, loans or scholarships to students desiring to study medicine and agreeing to practice in the rural areas of this State, upon such terms and conditions as shall be prescribed by law. The term 'rural areas' as used in this Section shall be defined by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1952, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon, for in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for the establishment of a State Medical Education Fund from which grants, loans or scholarships may be made to students desiring to study medicine."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

H. J. R. No. 35

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 56

Proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to authorize cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide insurance for employees; providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to the qualified electors; and providing for proclamation and publication by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 61 to read as follows:

"Sec. 61. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to enable cities, towns, and villages of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance risk for all employees; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the said municipalities and for payment of the costs, charges, and premiums on policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages;"

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Workmen's Compensation Insurance for employees of cities, towns and villages."

Each voter shall mark out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

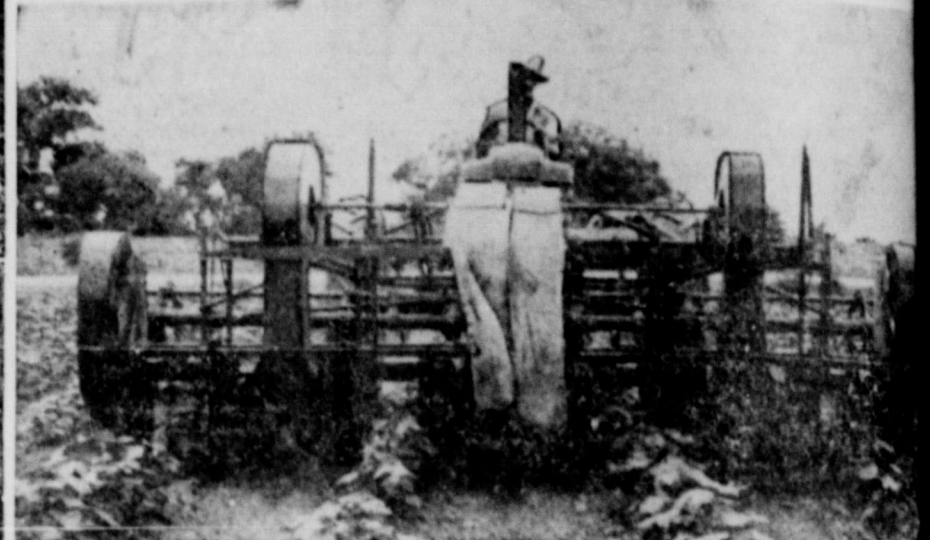

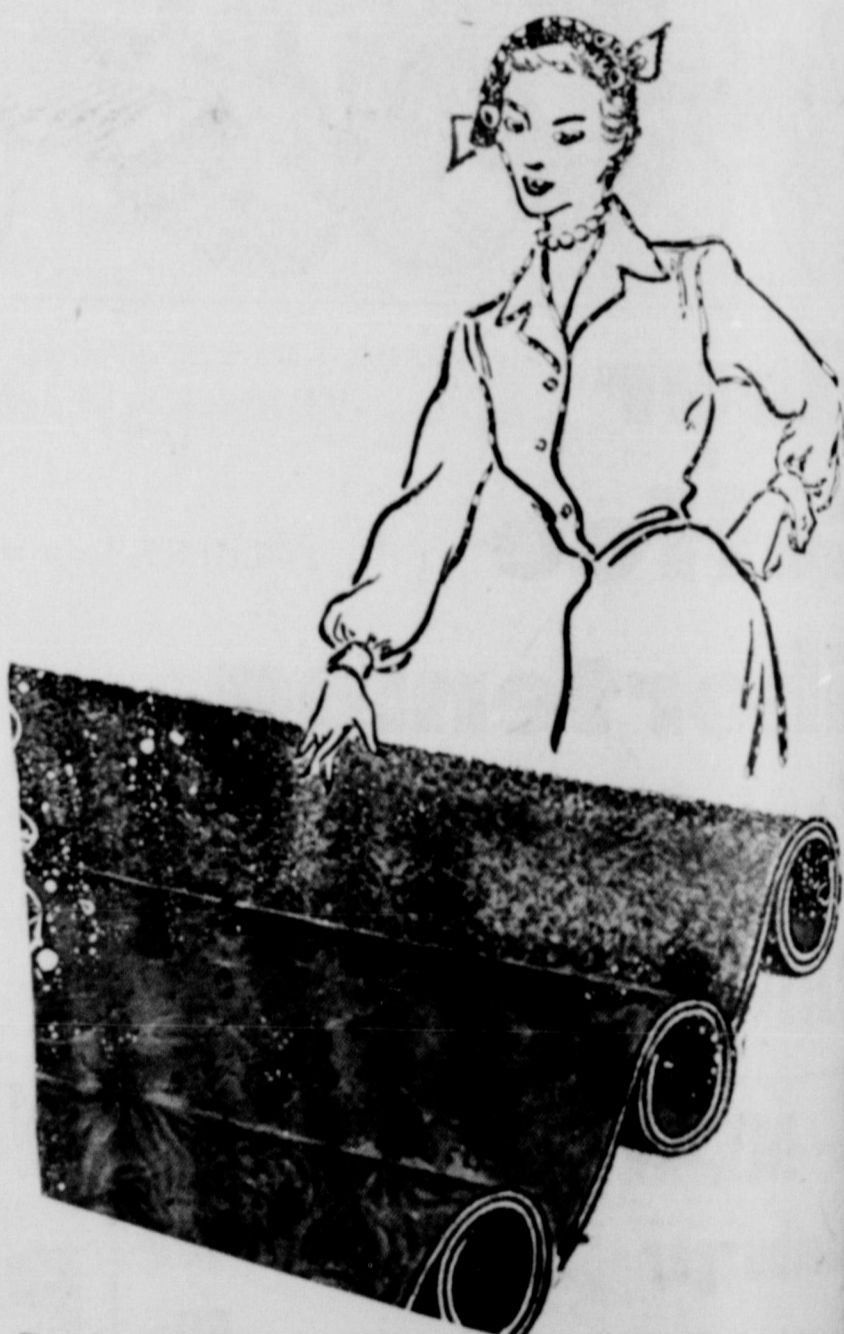
