## Day Tour To Be 13 At PM Center

The center serves Texas and Oklahoma and the public from both states is being invited to the event.

Harvey Davis, executive director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board,

will be the principal speaker. Tours will start at 11:30 a.m. Guided tours will be conducted through 70-acre center located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City, Thomas said. Selections to prove superior to other strains available are then released by conservation districts to commercial seed growers. These producers then grow seed and sell it to the public.

QB Club President Cliff Swain is inviting all parents of football players to attend as well as interested persons, men and women, regardless of whether or not they have children in school.

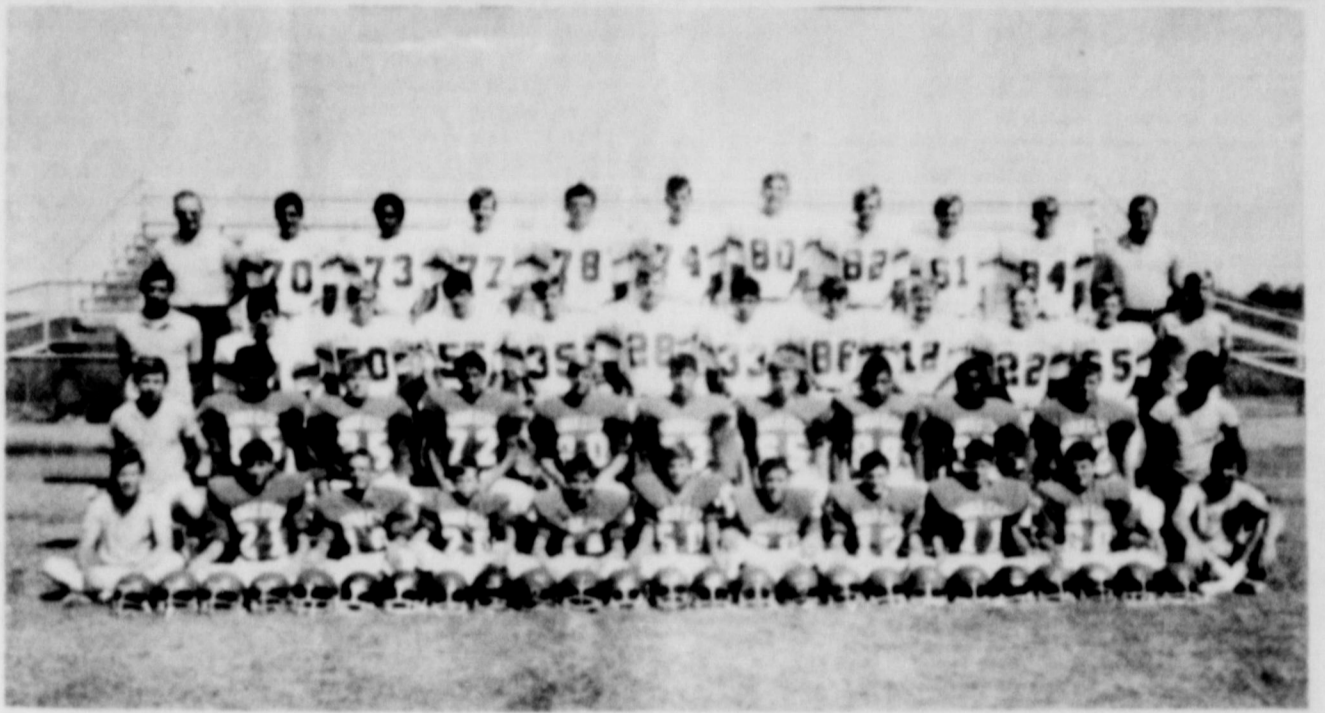
Coach Mullins said Tuesday night's meeting would be of special interest to the ladies and Cliff Swain said door prizes would be given.

## Hounds Travel To Rochester Friday For Season's Opener

The Knox City Greyhounds will see action Friday night when they travel to Rochester for the season's opener to begin at 8:00 o'clock. According to Coach Don Mullins, everything is "go" for Friday.

Fans can expect a hard-fought defensive game as both teams began shaping up on August 14. Knox City returns to its former district this year with six offensive and five defensive starters among 10 lettermen.

Coaches and team members will appreciate encouragement from fans at the opening games.

In the scrimmage last Friday night with the Hamlin Prod Pipers on the Greyhound field, the J. V. began at 6 p.m. and went against a much stronger Hamlin II or, as Coach Mullins explained, we should say 22. Hamlin had enough to play two teams while Knox City went both

ways with one team and substitutes. Considering the odds, the Knox City J. V. showed much progress over last week, the coach said. They defeated the Hamlin J.V.s 2-0. Dale Bloxham, Charlie Flye and Donny Skiles provided the backfield play while Mike Burkhart, Jerry Eaton, Rudy Hernandez, Donald Swearinger, Eddie Johnson, Rusty Grimsley, and Jimmy Lynn played up front.

Skiles and Johnson kept them off-balance with the passing game; while Bloxham and Flye picked up big yardage on the ground. Both scores came on long runs around the end. Coach Mullins said the Knox City JV's would travel to Haskell and scrimmage at 5:30 p.m. today (Thursday). Aspermont did not have enough to play a game; this week, he said.

The coach reported that the varsity did an outstanding job

defensively, with the exception of one play, against Hamlin's outside game. Hamlin never broke for a large gain all night, but scored on a long pass deep in the scrimmage. Knox City's offense sputtered at first, Coach Mullins said, but picked up momentum in the later stage.

Coach Mullins said that after viewing the film Sunday, the coaches found that Knox City made many more mistakes than were made Friday night. He said, "If we see from our all these mistakes, the Hounds will improve steadily each week. He said that they felt that our offense is way behind our defense, so this week they play to spend most of the time pitching up the offense, especially our passing game.

Those reported as scoring high on offense were Joe Huff 62 per cent, Roy Posey 48 per cent, Cliff Ray 55 per cent, Philip Newton 56 per cent,

Stanley Newton 70 per cent and Danny Woodall 76 per cent. On defense Cliff Ray scored 46 points, Rob Harrison 42, Bobby Reeves and Robert Taylor 32 each, Will Whiteley 29, David McGaughy and Stanley Newton 24 each, and Rick Hucker 20.

Coach Mullins also reported that the Knox City Junior High would play at Aspermont today (Thursday) at 6:00 o'clock.

## Catfish Farm Serving KC Area

Catfish Haven, Anson and Jones County's newest venture in catfish farming is now open for business and will serve this area through the local M System Super Market, according to Cliff Swain, manager of the Knox City store.

Don Ray Blankenship, co-owner of the enterprise, is manager of the M System store in Anson. Swain said the firm will

cater to special orders for fish trays and asked that any orders for such events be turned in at the local M System.

Two of the four ponds, which are located in the southwest edge of Anson, were stocked recently with a large supply of catfish weighing approximately two pounds. Four pounders are now being added.

The operation also includes a 57x38 processing house with facilities for the display of live fish in a small tank and for dressing the fish to be sold through the M System Super Markets. Sales at the farm will be by live weight only and those customers desiring to have the fish dressed will be charged for having them dressed.

The fish are fed daily with balanced food to insure the finest flavor.

The facility will provide "fun for all the family" making it possible for the customer to catch his fish, or they will be caught for the customer if he desires. Either way the customer gets fresh farm raised catfish without going a long distance.

**NOTICE AND INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS**

ITEM 1

1. Sealed bids will be received by City of Knox City, Texas hereinafter referred to as the "Owner", for performing the work as set forth in the Plans and Specifications attached hereto for Wastewater Treatment Plant improvements on or before 2:00 p.m., Friday September 22, 1972 in the city hall at Knox City, Texas, at which time said bids will be publicly opened and read.

2. All bids must be made in the blank form of the Proposal attached hereto.

3. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check or bidder's bond payable to the Owner for five per cent of the total amount of the bid. As soon as the bid prices have been compared, the Owner will return the check or bond of all except the three lowest responsible bidders. When the contract is awarded, checks or bonds of the two remaining unsuccessful bidders will be returned. The check or bond of the successful bidder will be retained until the contract and surety bond have been executed and approved, after which it will be returned.

4. Separate performance and payment bonds for public bodies such in the amount of 100 percent of the contract price with a surety company (corporation) approved by the Owner and the

Engineer, will be required for the faithful performance of the contract, and the bidder shall state in the proposal the name and address of the surety or sureties who will sign these bonds in case the contract is awarded to him.

5. The party to whom the contract is awarded will be required forthwith to execute the contract and surety bonds within ten calendar days from the date when the written notice of award of the contract is mailed to the bidder at the address given by him. In case of failure to do so, the Owner may at his option, consider that the bidder has abandoned the contract, in which case the certified check or bidder's bond accompanying the Proposal shall become the property of the Owner.

6. The Owner reserves the right to reject any and all bids or to accept any bid. Contractors Proposals shall hold firm for sixty days to allow the Owner to complete its financing arrangements and to secure necessary approvals for awarding contracts. Mutually agreed upon extensions of time, may be made, if necessary.

7. Before the award of the contract, any bidder may be required to furnish evidence satisfactory to the Owners and to the Engineer of the necessary facilities, ability, and pecuniary resources to fulfill the conditions of the said contract.

8. Prior to signing the contract, the Contractor shall submit on a form acceptable to the Owners and the Engineer, an overall construction schedule for the project. This construction schedule shall start with the proposed date of signing the contract, and the completion date shall be the date specified in the contract.

9. Bidders must satisfy themselves by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, by examination of the Plans and Specifications and requirements of the work and the accuracy of the estimate of the quantities of the work to be done, and shall not at any time after the submission of a bid dispute or complain of such estimate or assert that there was a misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of work to be done.

10. The Construction Contract and the Detailed Specifications contain the provisions required for the construction of the project. No information obtained from any officer, agent, or employee of the Owner on any such matters shall in any way affect the risk or obligation assumed by the Contractor or relieve him from fulfilling any of the conditions of the contract.

11. Proposals which are incomplete, unbalanced, conditional or obscure or which contain additions not called for, errors, alterations, or irregularities of any kind or which do not comply with the Notice and Instructions to Bidders may be rejected.

12. A bidder may withdraw any proposal he has submitted at any time prior to the hour set for the closing of the bids provided the request for withdrawal is signed in a manner identical with the proposal being withdrawn. No withdrawal or modifications will be permitted after the hour designated for closing bids.

13. For the purpose of clarification it is understood that the work to be done will probably be financed in whole or part by means of funds secured from the Federal Government, or others. The bidder hereby agrees to comply with all requirements of the Federal agencies, or others.

14. Computations of quantities that will be the basis for payment estimates, both monthly and final will be made by the Engineer.

15. The word "Owner" means the City of Knox City, Texas. The Owner will be responsible for payment in accordance with terms of the contract. The word "Contractor" means the person, firm or corporation to whom the award is made. Sub-contractors as such will not be recognized. The word "Engineer" refers to Ernest L. Andrews, P.E., Consulting Engineer, designated by the Owner as its engineering representative during the course of construction to make appropriate inspections and computations of payments.

16. Plans and Specifications may be obtained from the Engineer, Ernest L. Andrews, 2915

Santa Fe, Wichita Falls, Texas, 76209, upon a deposit of \$25.00. Full amount of deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications along with a fully qualified bid. Only one-half of the amount of the deposit will be returned to bidder returning plans and specifications if fully qualified bid is not filed.

17. Inspection trips for bidders will be arranged by the Engineer.

18. Notice of Requirement for Certification of Non-segregated Facilities: Bidders are cautioned as follows: By signing the contract for which these bids are solicited, the bidder will be deemed to have signed and agreed to the provisions of the "Certification of Non-segregated Facilities" as contained in the specifications for this project.

19. Notice to Prospective Federally Assisted Construction Contractors:

(A) A certification of Non-segregated Facilities, as required by the May 28, 1968, order (32 F.R. 7888, May 28, 1968) on Elimination of Segregated Facilities by the Secretary of Labor, must be submitted prior to the award of a Federally assisted construction contract exceeding \$10,000 which is not exempt from the provisions of the Equal Opportunity Clause.

**GUIDELINES FOR DIAPAUSE BOLL WEEVIL CONTROL PROGRAM**

The interest in diapause boll weevil control in many weevil-infested areas of Texas has been generated by extensive yield losses caused by this insect and the overall economics of cotton production. Though a rather wide choice of effective insecticides are available to growers, preventing excessive

weevil damage has become quite costly in many production areas of the state.

The increasing development of insecticide resistance in bollworm-budworm populations can not be overlooked as an important factor supporting diapause boll weevil control. The seriousness of the bollworm-budworm resistance problem demands that we take a very close look at the entire cotton insect control program in each area of the state.

The cotton fleahopper and boll weevil are the two key cotton pest species which often determine the need for and extent of insecticide applications to bollworm or tobacco budworm

control. We must have effective means of preventing economic fleahopper and boll weevil damage which, at the same time, will not aggravate or precipitate a bollworm-budworm problem. Diapause boll weevil control is one means of preventing economic boll weevil damage by using insecticides at a time in the season when resulting worm buildups are of no, or at most minimal, significance.

If properly planned and carried out, diapause boll weevil control offers the following advantages when compared to conventional, in-season weevil control:

1) The cost of insecticides

and applications can often be reduced.

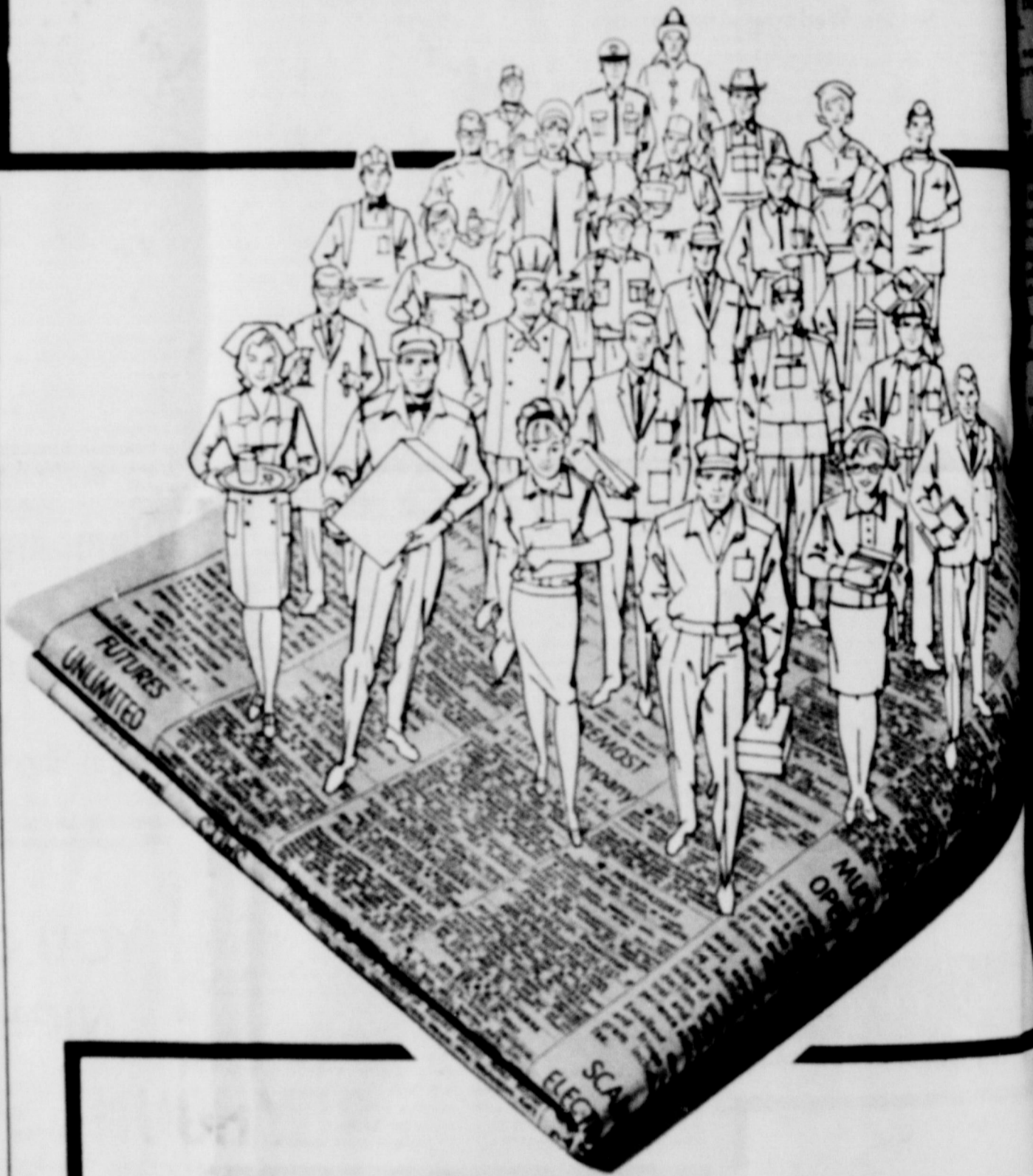
2) Other pest problems, particularly bollworm and tobacco budworm, are commonly reduced and may be eliminated due to the establishment and development of parasite and predator populations in the absence of previously required in-season boll weevil control applications.

3) Adverse weather does not commonly influence the effectiveness of diapause weevil applications as markedly as it does late season weevil control applications. This is due to a more flexible length of time between applications in a diapause program.

**Get Tax Break for Child Care**

(Dallas, Texas)—Employee taxpayers with child care expenses may get a bigger tax break in 1972 according to W. T. Coppinger, District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas.

The Revenue Act of 1971 has greatly liberalized the deduction for the care of children, disabled dependents and disabled spouses. Beginning in 1972, taxpayers with adjusted gross incomes of \$18,000 or less may be able to deduct up to \$400 per month for household and dependent care expenses. The deduction is reduced 50 cents for each dollar of income over \$18,000. For example, a taxpayer with an adjusted gross income of \$20,000 would be limited to \$1,800 (the maximum annual deduction of \$4,000 less one-half of \$2,000).

To qualify, a taxpayer must be employed and provide over one-half the cost of maintaining a household for a dependent child under 15, a disabled dependent of any age, or a disabled spouse.

For the first time household expenses incurred to permit the taxpayer to be gainfully employed may also be deducted. For example, amounts paid for the services of a maid, cook or other domestic help can qualify.

Expenses incurred outside the home for the care of a child under 15 (or, for example, in a day care center) may also qualify. However, expenses outside the home are limited to \$200 a month for one child, \$300 for two children or \$400 for three or more children. However, these expenses shall not include educational expenses incurred for a child in the first or higher grade.

If a deduction is claimed for the care of a disabled dependent, the deduction must be reduced by the amount by which the total of the dependent's adjusted gross income and any non-taxable disability payments he receives exceeds \$750. In the case of a disabled spouse, the expenses must be reduced by non-taxable disability payments.

As under the old law, a deduction may not be taken for payments to anyone who could be your dependent.

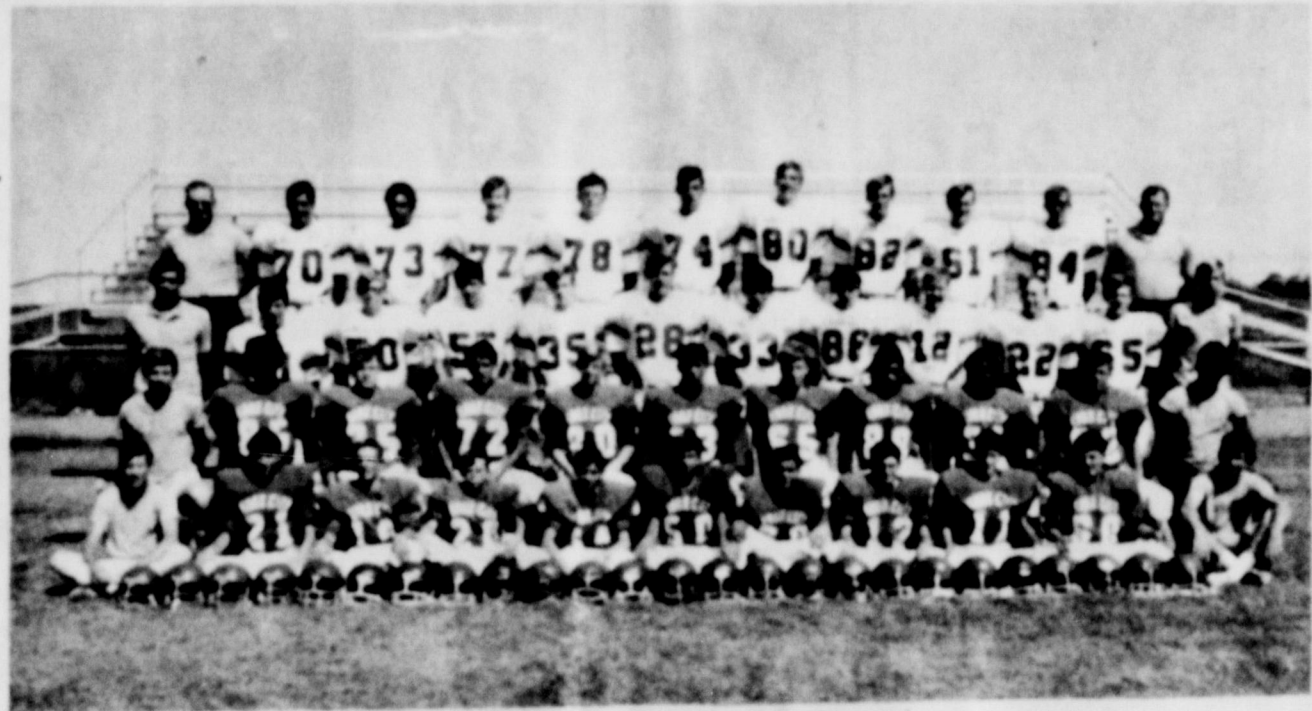

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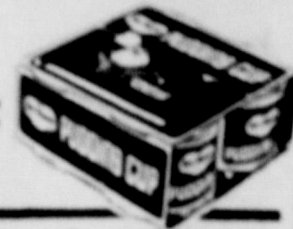

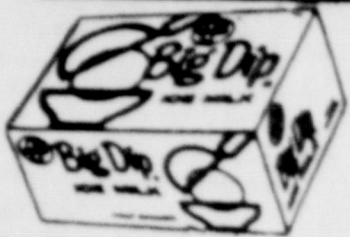

## Retension Reservoir Plans Underway

An Environmental Impact Study on the salt water retaining reservoir is now underway west of Truscott. The reservoir will be built on Bluff Creek.

Mike Risinger, SCS soil scientist at Knox City is helping in the development.

Thirteen professional ecologists headed by a team from West Texas State University in Canyon are studying the site and collecting data, for the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

A similar study is required for each Corps project to insure the project will provide more benefits than detrimental effects. Anthropologists are collecting artifacts that they can date and identify the Indian cultures of the site area, before the sites are covered by water. Botanists and biologists are collecting data on plant and animal life. Soil scientists and geologists are studying the soils and geology. Ecology specialists will assemble the raw data in a report which will determine the feasibility of the structure, according to Risinger.

The purpose of the dam is to stop salt water pollution of Lake Kemp, Lake Diversion, and Lake Texhoma. Each of the lakes receive their water from the North Wichita River.

Risinger notes the salt source which pollutes the river and these lakes is upstream from the dam site.
