# Farm & Ranch -

The week of July 23-29 has been proclaimed National Farm Safety Week by President Lyndon B. Johnson.

The President in signing the proclamation emphasized "Agriculture remains America's first and most important industry. It supplies food for our people and many millions throughout the world, and a vast measure of the raw materials used in the making of other products."

"Therefore, whatever diminishes or impedes the efficiency and productivity of our farmers is detrimental to men and women everywhere."

The objective of the National Farm Week is to draw attention to the safety problems of farm and rural people and suggest ways to prevent accidents on the farm, in the home, and on the highways.

"Disabling injuries and the resultant economic losses are at an all-time high. Not only is a personal hardship involved, but we as a nation cannot tolerate the drain on our rural manpower and economic vitality in this time of critical world food needs."

Leon J. Ruben, manager of the National Safety Council Farm Department points out:

In view of this costly loss of economy and the tragic loss of life, President Johnson makes this plea to America's farmer and their families:

"I urge all persons who live on farms and those persons or groups allied with agriculture, to respond as applying full energy to the ongoing task of reducing accidents at work, in homes, at recreation and on the highways."

The first day of the 24th Annual National Farm Safety Week emphasizes a "Reverence for Life," County Agent Herman H. Collier points out.

With over 8,000 farm residents killed and 740,000 injured last year in accidents, it is time for farm residents to take time to be careful. Be Safety Conscious.

Everyone should be thankful if they have had no serious farm accidents but they should be alert to, and aware of, the ordinary hazards of daily life. They should be prepared for the unexpected, know what to do in an emergency and heed all safety suggestions, and correct all hazards when they are found.

Farmers are urged to remember that Farm Safety Week is the time to stop accidents which can cost you money, time, suffering or even your life. Have a "Reverence for Life" and get to insure the safety of yourself and others.

Area horse owners should be on the lookout for equine encephalomyelitis, sleeping sickness of horses during the summer, especially the middle and late summer. County Agent Herman H. Collier warns.

There is no specific cure, but vaccination prior to exposure will protect the horse for one year.

Since the disease is prevalent during the middle and late summer, now is the time to vaccinate to insure immunity during the danger period.

Equine encephalomyelitis is an infection of birds, but man and horses are susceptible to the same viral disease. The Culex taralis mosquito is attributed with causing the greatest spread of this disease to both man and animal.

Incubation of the disease in the horse is from one to three weeks.

and may be accompanied by a fever, loss of appetite and dullness. Early symptoms are hypersensitivity, restlessness, and blindness. Extreme depression may follow, and the horse may stand with his head hung low apparently asleep.

In more advanced cases the horse may lie down and be unable to eat or drink.

Vaccination consisting of two injections seven to ten days apart, may provide protection for uninfected animals if losses of horses have begun to occur.

For more information concerning the disease, contact your local veterinarian. Collier suggests.

Iron chlorosis has been showing up in many lawns and ornamental plants throughout Texas. Symptoms, according to County Agent Herman H. Collier, are generally a yellowing of the green foliage due to failure of chlorophyll to develop normally.

The chlorosis occurs in susceptible plants where and when iron is not available to them, adds the county agent. This lack of iron may be due to a deficiency or to the iron being unavailable because of alkaline conditions.

In either case, iron supplied by ferrous sulfate or iron chelates will be beneficial.

Ferrous sulfate can be applied as a foliar spray at the rate of two teaspoons per gallon of water, plus a spreader-sticker. A teaspoon of household detergent can be used as the spreader-sticker. The county agent says the spray should be applied in the late afternoon to avoid leaf burn and should be repeated in about 10 days if the yellowing persists.

The iron sulfate can also be applied to the soil as a fertilizer. Apply to trees and shrubs in holes made in a circle just inside the spread of the branches.

**PROMPT FILING IMPORTANT**  
"Filing social security claims promptly has never been more important than it is now," Edwin Draughon, social security manager in Vernon, said today.

"While benefit claims may be retroactive for a year or more, the enrollment period for medical insurance is greatly restricted, he said.

Protection under the doctor bill part of medicare can start on the first day of the month you attain age 65 only if you apply for it in one of the three months before the month you reach 65.

"This restriction, incidental, does not apply to hospital insurance; it applies only to medical insurance," he added.

The first enrollment period set by law covers seven months; the three months immediately before the month of attaining age 65, that month and the three months immediately thereafter. However, if the application is filed in the month of attainment or later, the effective date is postponed one to three months.

If application for medical insurance is not filed during the first enrollment period, protection cannot be obtained until the next general enrollment period, which will be the last three months of all-numbered years. Premiums for these delayed enrollments will be higher, and coverage is not effective until July 1 of the following year.

Even though the applicant is still working, a claim for hospital and medical insurance can be approved whether or not any retirement benefits can be paid. Moreover, with the increase in allowable earnings, many applicants will receive some cash benefits as soon as a claim is filed.

Information and help in preparing the necessary application forms may be had from the social security office at 1728 Fannin in Vernon, or from the Social Security representative who comes to this area.

Did you pay a household worker a total of \$50 or more during April, May, and June? If so, a social security tax report is due by July 31, according to Edwin S. Draughon, manager of social security in Vernon.

All housekeepers, cooks, maids, babysitters and other household employees are covered under the social security program, Mr. Draughon stated. Anyone paying such a person \$50 or more in cash in a calendar quarter must

The film is introduced by Vice President Hubert Humphrey and is narrated by E. G. Marshall. This is a story about a Medicare beneficiary and his family and an important event in their lives—an event which will happen more than once in most families.

As the story unfolds the viewer will see how Medicare benefits can protect almost everyone who is 65 years of age and over. Vice President Humphrey sums up the importance of Medicare by emphasizing how it safeguards the right of older Americans to enjoy their retirement income without the threat of unexpected bills for illness always hanging over their heads.

file a tax report with Internal Revenue Service. An envelope form 942 is available at any social security or Internal Revenue Service Office for reporting the earnings.

Each employer is responsible for paying both the 4.4 percent paid by the employer. All tax reports for the quarter ending July 31 must be submitted by July 31.

It is of great importance to the employee that these returns be filed. The quarterly reports give the worker credit under social security which he needs to receive retirement benefits or disability payments. Since medicare is now in effect, these reports are even more important because beginning next year workers must have coverage under social security to be eligible for hospital and medical insurance protection.

In addition to domestic employers, Mr. Draughon also reminded other employers that their regular quarterly reports are due by July 31 and that there is a penalty for late filing.

Mr. and Mrs. Z. I. Smith returned to Knox City July 13 after being in Chicago for the recent four-day convention of Lions International.

They made the trip via Santa Fe Railway, arriving in Chicago Tuesday a. m. July 4. The Smiths stayed at the Palmer House Hotel, which was convention headquarters. Fifty-three thousand delegates and their wives attended the meet.

Business sessions were held each of the four mornings at Chicago stadium and shuttle buses carried the Lions Club delegates there and back to the hotels. The opening day parade began at 9:30 a. m. on July 5 and lasted until 3 p. m. More than 70 bands, drum and bugle Corps, baton twirlers entries of approximately 40 floats, marchers in native costumes of Lions Nations, stilt walkers from Colorado clowns and Miss America, Jayne Anne Jayree were in the gigantic parade.

One of the most spectacular programs was the presentation of Flags of the Nations of Lionism, according to Mr. Smith. Lions Clubs established in 137 nations or geographical locations were represented and the event was narrated by 2nd vice president David A. Evans of Texas City. The Lions heard welcome addresses by Illinois Gov. Otto Kerner and Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley. Reports were given and a commemorative stamp was put on sale that night by Deputy Postmaster General F. C. Belen to honor the Lions for their efforts for peace through the Peace Essay Contest.

Highlights of Thursday's session was an address by Secretary of State Dean Rusk. That afternoon, the delegates were at White Sox Stadium to see the major league baseball game between the Chicago White Sox and the Baltimore Orioles. Thursday night's program was presented by the incoming president from Puerto Rico. The show was beautiful and interesting, according

to the Smiths, with stage shows, music, dancers and all sorts of acts. Each year the show is given by the country or state from which the new president comes.

Friday began with a Key members' breakfast. A Lion who has secured two or more members is given a key. During this breakfast, wives of the delegates attended a fashion show at the Conrad Hilton Hotel. Mode's were wives of the past International presidents. Friday night's International show saw such well known entertainers and commentators as Herb Shriner, Rosemary Clooney, Martin Agronsky of CBS and Ray Sherer of NBC.

On Saturday the Texas delegates met and went together to vote in a block. Dr. Bob McCullough of Tulsa, Okla. was elected 3rd vice president, a key spot and the convention concluded at noon.

The Smiths toured Buckingham Fountain, an old tourist attraction, the Field Museum of Natural History, viewed Chicago from the observation deck on the 40th floor of the Prudential building, rode the subway and took a boat trip up the Chicago River and out on Lake Michigan.

They returned to Fort Worth where they were met by their daughter, Miss Judy Smith and their son, Kelton and also by Mrs. Clara Smith, Z. I. Smith's mother. They visited in Fort Worth with Mrs. Z. I. Smith's mother, Mrs. Nomah Francisco before returning home.





### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON IRS SERVICE

Q—My daughter is working as a sales girl this summer to earn money for college. If she makes more than \$600 will I lose my dependency deduction for her?

A—If your daughter is under 19 or is a full-time student you will not lose your dependency exemption for her just because she earns \$600 or more during the year. As long as the other dependency tests are met you may continue to claim her.

If she does earn \$66 or more, or has taxes withheld, she must file her own return.

Q—I won the \$75 prize given each year to the outstanding history student. Is that taxable for me or my parents?

A—Unless you had to perform a specific action to win the prize such as write an essay or give an address, the prize would not be considered taxable.

Q—I just opened a gas station and have to file employment tax returns on which I must show an employer identification number. Can I use my Social Security number as my employer identification number?

A—No. If you are liable for business taxes you must obtain an employer identification number even if you have a Social Security number. Your Social Security number should be used on your individual income tax return and not on business tax returns.

To get an employer identification number use Form SS-4 available at local IRS and Social Security offices. This number must be shown on all business returns as well as Schedule C of your individual return.

Q—I've been asked to bring in my records on charitable deductions. I made some sizeable cash gifts last year. What can I bring to prove these?

A—A statement from the receiving organization which indicates the amount and date of the gift and identifies you as the contributor will be helpful in substantiating the contribution.

#### TAX MAN SAYS

If you are worried about your heirs owing an estate tax on your property when you die, here are the rules: An estate tax return must be filed if the fair market value of your property is more than \$60,000 on the date of your death. However, the community property laws usually allow the estate to be worth \$120,000 in community property since each spouse is entitled to a \$60,000 exemption. Remember these rules apply only to Federal estate tax and not to Texas State Inheritance Taxes.

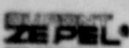
