

### Heatly Opposes **New Constitution**

State Representative W.S. "Bill" Heatly of Paducah said today the proposed new State Constitution would create more problems than it would solve and urged Texans to vote against all eight propositions on the November fourth ballot.

'We do not need a full-time legislature." declared Heatly. "I think that would cost the taxpayers just about as much, on a proportionate basis, as our full-time Congress. And that really is what Proposition 1 on the ballot would mean.

Proposition 2 would abolish our Court of Criminal Appeals and force the Supreme Court to hear appeals in both civil and criminal cases. That can only result in slowing down the judicial process.

You can go down the list. and if you study each proposition carefully, you will discover that this entire rewrite of the Constitution is designed to reduce the people's control over their State Govern-

"I always have had great faith in the legislature, but I don't have as much faith in any group of 181 people as I would have to have in order to vote for this proposed Constitution. And even if I did trust the present Legislature with all of the massive powers this Constitution would give to it. I would have to balk when I realized that the complexion of the legislature can be changed by the voters



### Nine Accidents Occur In Sept.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of September, 1975, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this


These crashes resulted in no persons killed and five persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first nine months of 1975 shows a total of 52 accidents resulting in no persons killed and 17 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for September, 1975, shows a total of 551 accidents resulting in 29 persons killed and 314 persons injured, as compared to September, 1974, with 471 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 213 persons injured. This was 80 more accidents, 12 more killed, and 101 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.

The 29 traffic deaths for the month of September, 1975, occurred in the following counties: Six in Wise; three each in Donley and Moore: two each in Archer, Floyd. Lynn, and Gray; and one each in Jack, Lamb, Lubbock, Wichita, Young, Castro, Potter, Sherman, and Wheeler.

# Group Asks Defeat Of Constitutional Revision

AUSTIN--The chairman of Citizens to Preserve the Texas Constitution says the campaign to defeat constitutional revision in the November 4 election is gaining ground rapidly with the help of Governor Dolph Briscoe.

State Senator Peyton Mc-Knight of Tyler said the Governor's decision to oppose all eight propositions on the ballot "came after his own carefull analysis which convinced him the present Constitution is far better than the revised version written by the Legislature.

Citing reports of voter apathy, McKnight called upon Texans to familiarize themselves with the issues and vote next Tuesday.

"I believe that most people who study the proposed new constitution will vote against it." he said. "But if a voter hasn't had time to examine every controversial provision. then I think he or she should play it safe and keep our present Constitution by voting no."

In expressing his opposition to the new charter, Governor Briscoe pointed out that Texas has a low per capita tax burden and is the only industrial state without an income tax. He said that annual sessions of the Legislature, as proposed in Proposition One on the ballot. would make it more difficult to hold the line on new taxes and would lead us down the road to a state income tax.'

Briscor added: "I do not believe that we should move even a small step in the direction of patterning our state government after the federal government, where Congress is in session the year round, accomplishes very little, where accomplishments are slow to come by and where spending is completely out of control."

Proposition Two, revising the judiciary article, has drawn fire from many lawyers because it would put both criminal and civil case appeals in the Supreme Court and would give the Legislature broad new authority to change the election process for judges. Presiding Judge John F. Onion, Jr., of the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals says the overall effect of the revision will be to "intensify the traffic jams in our courts, instead of alleviating them.

Other provisions in the new constitution automatically restore voting rights (and the right to hold office) to exfelons without any administrative or judicial proceeding. abolish the \$80 million annual ceiling on welfare, restore the ad valorem tax for the state building program which the voters recently decided to end, and allow cities and counties to incur greater public debt without voter approval (which McKnight calls 'the little New York" provision).

The Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association and numerous other organizations are opposing the new constitution. The Texas Association of School Boards is against the finance article (Proposition Five), which State Comptroller Bob Bullock describes as "a spook which will haunt us many years." The Texas Association of School Administrators opposes both the finance article and the education article (Proposition Four). McKnight declared: "The

WHITE GRUBS DAMAGE WHEAT STANDS

If you have wheat dying in spots of your field and have not found out the problem. there is a possibility white grubs are eating the plants root system below

Phillip Bruggeman and I examined a field of his two miles southeast of Rhineland October 27 and found this to be the problem. Phillip stated that he had another field showing the same symptoms. He plans to replant spots where the stand is severely damaged.

White grubs are one life cycle of the June beetle and there is no good control after the crop has been planted. These grubs usually do not destroy stands over entire fields, but can do so in areas of the field and may cause lesser damage wide spread

#### TEXAS BRUCELLOSIS AGREEMENT MAY BE CANCELLED

Since an intensified coop erative federal-state effort to protect both human and animal health from brucellosis or Bang's disease has not been fully accepted by Texas, the nation's leading cattle-producing state may suffer several consequences.

The Texas Animal Health Commission recently rejected certain proposed changes in rules which would require branding of cattle exposed to infected animals and a negative brucellosis test of cattle moving into Certified Brucellosis Free areas in the state. The rules changes were recommended by industry representatives and veterinary officials of all 50 states and approved by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Because of the state's refusal to tighten brucellosis regulations, the USDA has informed the Texas Animal Health Commission that federal funds to fight brucellosis in cattle may be withdrawn. In addition. Texas cattle may be placed under federal quarantine to prevent the spread of the disease to other states. Texas counties also would lost Modified-Certified and Certified Brucellosis Free status. Additional testing would be required in order to ship cattle interstate. The action to remove federal brucellosis funds would become effective January I. 1976, when a cooperative a greement with Texas for brucellosis eradication would be terminated unless remedial steps were

As a result of the bruce-Bosis eradication program begun in 1934, more than 99 per cent of the nation's cattle are now free of brucellosis. However, the one per cent still infected causes millions of dollars in losses to the livestock industry through abortions, breeding problems, weakened offspring and reduced milk production. The disease may be passed from animals to humans as undulant fever.

Currently the annual expenditures to eradicate brucellosis in Texas amount to \$3.7 million, \$2 million of which is for indemnities paid to owners of infected cattle and \$650,000 for cooperative agreements for herd testing. According to USDA figures. Texas had 3,083 cattle herds under quarantine on August 31. This is about one-third of the 9,452 infected herds identified nationally. The new drive for final eradication was prompted by recent increases the number of brucellosis-affected herds, primarily in the South. As a result, the USDA has given top






