Louise died Friday morning, October 9th, her 16 birthday. She had been ill some 21 days but had been confined to her bed only about 12 days. She had typhoid fever.

Funeral serevices was conducted Saturday morning from the Methodist church. Reverend B. J. Osborn pastor, was assisted by Reverned W. D. Green, Baptist pastor. The church was a bower of beautiful flowers and 18 lovely girls, friends of Louise made the arrangement and carried the flowers. The church was filled to capacity with relatives and friends, many finding only standing room. Reverend Osborn made an impressive service, relating the comfort and jey that is theirs whose loved ones die in Jesus.

From the church the body was carried to the Odd Fellow Cemerary and tenderly laid to rest.

Louise was born in Asher Oklahoma, October 9, 1920. She and her mother moved to Knox City in 1933 when she entered the Knox City school. At the time of her death she was classified as a Junior and had been selected to take an active part in the various school activities.

She was converted and joined the Methodist church in 1930 being at that time only ten years old. She lived true to her conversion being steadfast in all she knew and believed to be right. Louise was a modest girl, gentle, kind and even tempered. She was cheerful always and possssed that virture of being able always to forgive those who wronged her. She could easily make allowances for the short coming of others.

Because of these many fine qualities she quickly and unquestionably won and held friendships.

Louise is survived by her mother, Mrs. Lillian Phillips, two brothers, J. J. O'Brien. She is also survived vere given. by a grandmother, Mrs. R.K . Shaver and a ohst of other relatives.


