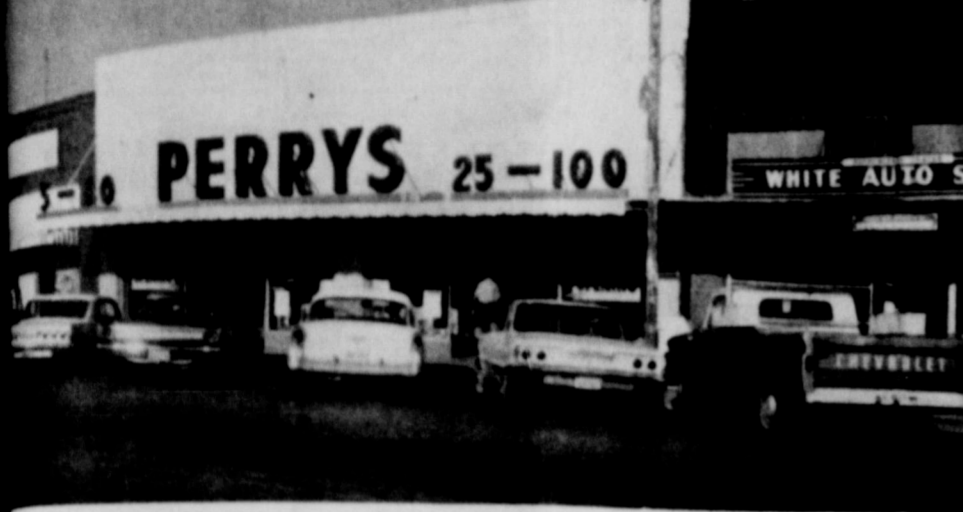

HOG CHOLERA ADVANCES

will advance to Phase 3 National Hog Cholera Program August 1, 1969. The Animal Health Commission announced.

Hudman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service Specialist at A&M University said Phase 3 is a continuation of immediate reporting of cholera outbreaks and rigorous inspection of brooding and feeding flocks.

herds will be guaranteed premises depopulation of healthy animals. A federally inspected plant, diseased animals will be eliminated on the premises by burying, burning or incineration under supervision of veterinary veterinarians.

also provides an in-home payment due to an outbreak. The in-home payment is shared equally by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

indemnities for infected animals will be \$100 per head for purebred, inbred and crossbred and \$80 a head on other animals. The specialist examines the animal. Payment will be limited to the value of the animal. Live swine present on the premises. Hog cholera should report sick animals to local veterinarians for payment if cholera is present.

males were vaccinated before July 1 of this year, Hudman said.

SCALE INSECTS

Euonymus and other evergreen plants are frequently damaged by scale insects and heavily infested plants are often killed.

Adult scale insects form a protective layer of wax over the body. Female scale insects never move from under the scale; however, the male continues to move about, eventually mates with the female, and dies. The female soon deposits her eggs and dies shortly thereafter. From the eggs small "crawlers" or nymphs emerge. The crawlers then search out a place to start feeding, thus expanding the infested area.

There are several generations of scale insects each year. Control of scale insects can be obtained by spraying plants with malathion, diazinon or dimethoate in summer oil mixed with water. Repeated applications should be made until the scale insects are dead.

This may be tested by running your finger over the infested stem or leaf; if you get a yellowish stain on it, the scales are still alive. If all you get are brown or white scales, the scale insects are dead.

come a pest, they can be controlled by the use of chlorodane, DDT or carbaryl (Sevin) dust or carbaryl spray. Apply dust or spray directly to feeding area. Commercially prepared baits are also available for control of these isopods. These baits should be applied in the early morning or late evening.

For information on pests attacking ornamental plants, obtain a copy of "Texas Guide For Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants" from the County Agricultural Agent's office.

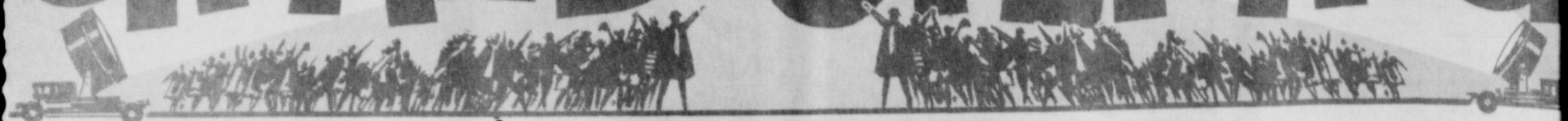

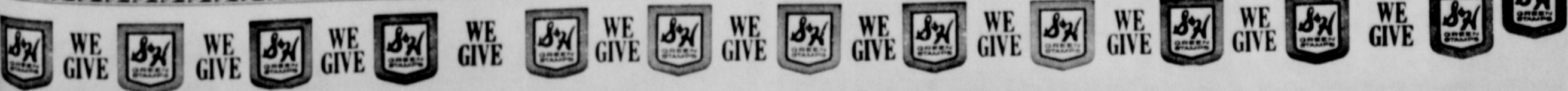

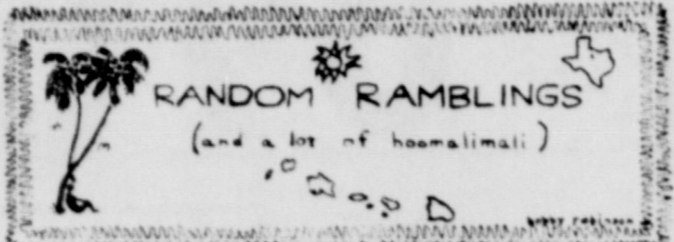

Hawaii's citizenry had been haggling for several months in an attempt to save their most famous landmark, Diamond Head, from having houses and high-rise condominiums constructed on its slopes. Their pleas had seemed to be stalemated when, last week the Honolulu City Council decided to buy all of the Diamond Head properties (less that which the government owns inside the extinct crater), including fabulous showplace homes on its lower slopes in one of the nation's most exclusive and expensive residential areas. The cost might range anywhere from \$9 to \$35 a square foot - an astronomical total cost of between \$13 million and \$58 million. They must want it awfully bad!

The University of Hawaii student health service director stated a day or two ago that hippies may be considered a health hazard. They'd best start taking baths and cleaning up a bit. Swimming in the ocean is not enough, it seems.

Early in the week Honolulu was shrouded by a thick haze which the scientists dubbed "vog" - volcanic fog - caused by the latest in a series of eruptions by Kilauea volcano on the Big Island (Hawaii). Tradewinds which normally blow from the northeast died down, and kona (southerly) winds blew the sulphur dioxide-laden fumes north from the scene of the eruption. Looking at the sun through that haze was like seeing it during a West Texas sandstorm. . . Why, we couldn't even see Diamond Head sticking out into the Pacific!

In the last 9 days thieves have swiped an estimated \$10,000 worth of cameras, jewelry, and money from cars belonging to unwary tourists who had momentarily left the car to grab

a look at some of the breathtaking Hawaiian scenery. A person isn't safe anywhere any more! Out close to the Air Station here - at Nanakuli Beach, a couple of sailors were attacked by four or five knife-carrying young toughs as they lay sleeping in a tent on the beach.

I noticed where violence on TV this year has meant death for a few shows, including "Wild, Wild West". It used to be one of my favorite shows until I got over here and had to watch black and white television. After being accustomed to viewing a color set for a couple of years, I found that black and white was boring. Now, isn't that something? . . . All TV shows over here are at least a week behind time because to transmit shows live from the Mainland would entail using the Lani Bird communications satellite overhead, at a fantastic cost of about \$20,000 to \$40,000 an hour for a color show. A new ComSat satellite put up at the first of 1969 is supposed to cut that rate by 3/4. Several NFL football games, as well as some other shows, are to be telecast live this season. Now, the stations must have video tapes of the shows flown over to Hawaii by commercial air liner. They're usually a week behind time . . . or two. . . Those Cowboys had better really sock it to their opponents this year! It'll be about time!

I saw that picture in the paper of the two new Lions Club Swimming Pool managers, Gail and Sue, and I was hurt. Dennis Anderson and I never got our pictures in the paper when WE ran the pool! I think I'll complain . . . to Lyndol Cypert . . . or Alton Fitzgerald.

"Melanie Meddles"

Several weeks ago, Mrs. Johnny Reid, homemaking teacher for O'Brien and Benjamin schools, held a Child Development Workshop for young mothers in Benjamin.

During the two days I attended I learned some good pointers to use with my children and will share them with you. It seemed as though the women who attended shared the feelings of Mrs. Stanton Brown, who thanked Mrs. Reid for holding the workshop, "At first I was sorry for you that more women didn't come, but now I'm sorry for the women who didn't come."

Mrs. Isla Corley, Special Education teacher at Carney School, spoke on some of the symptoms and solutions for our slower learning children. Mrs. Corley stated that a child's IQ potential is fixed before a child is four years old. And that potential if approximately one half of their mature intelligence. If you know children who have never been read to, reasoned with, played with, or even let voice an opinion, you can see what a poor advantage these children have. She also said that just as children learn to crawl before they can be taught to walk, children with poor hearing should have hearing aids by the time they are one year old so they can learn to babble at the proper time and be ready for words later.

Mrs. Charles Griffith and Mrs. Kenneth Roberts told of the importance of reading and books for small children. Did you realize that children enjoy being read to at the age of four months? Anything that rhymes and has big bright pictures will hold their attention. They said that children's books should have good illustrations on the same page as the dialogue, a definite story, not too many words for the children's attention and naturally, parents who will read to them regularly.

Curious George, Uncle Wiggily and Dr. Seuss books were named as books that have been proved to be children's favorites. You can teach use of encyclopedias to them at an early age. Give your children books for Christmas, let them take a copy of their favorite book

to a friend's birthday party. In the ladies own words, "Good literature is not taught, but it may be caught."

Mrs. Jeff Graham of Knox City told the women about educational toys for children. She said that although 70% of the parents of the world are concerned about food for their children, most of these same parents neglect their children's play.

I was reminded of a story I read that during the bombings of World War II, adults needed to tell over and over how they felt and how they reacted during the bombing. The young children couldn't talk about it, instead they played, what seemed to their parents gruesome games of war with their own guns, falling rocks and toppled buildings, as they acted out the reality of war, trying to understand it.

Every child needs years to just be a child. Mrs. Graham said that if you see your child playing airplane with a stick, don't run to town and buy him a toy plane. There will go his imagination, most of the fun and shortly, all that will be left is a broken toy.

Start small children out with big toys, big styrofoam building blocks, simple wooden puzzles. Give them toys that need to be felt, smelled, tasted, heard or inspected.

Mix up a batch of play dough, using 3 cups flour, 1 cup salt, 1 Tablespoon corn oil, a few drops of food color and enough water to get it to kneading consistency. This dough will stay pliable if stored in an airtight container; if children eat some of it, it won't harm them and what falls to the floor will dry hard and can be swept up. Another tip when they tire of playing with the dough or finger paint or puzzles, put them up for another special time, maybe once a week for each, then the kids won't tire of them and they won't get lost parts or be swept out by a mother in despair.

If you let your child "play" at washing dishes, sweeping, driving nails, vacuuming when they ask to, they will be learning and helping at the same time. If you ask, they'll tell you they are "working" and be

proud of it. Then Mrs. Reid concluded the workshop with her near-to-the-heart lecture on children's art. She believes very strongly in big crayons for small children, no color books to kill a child's creativity, big, big sheets of paper to draw on, never saying "What is it?" instead saying "Tell me about your picture." Using pictures drawn by the ladies' own children, she showed the way children's art normally progresses.

And there was more. If the opportunity of such a workshop is offered again, please come. *****
