After several attempts, he was able to summon help, but Mrs. Lummis had succumbed. They await further word from the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Lummis (Mrs. Lummis is the former Lucille Stephens), who flew to Brussels to be with their son.

City Election Sat. Draws Good Turnout

Two contested races for councilmen in Saturday's election, plus a write-in candidate for the office of mayor, were probably responsible for the large turnout of voters in the city election with 263 persons casting their ballots. School and hospital elections were unopposed.

Re-elected as mayor was Buddy Angle with 179 votes, while write-ins amounted to 78 for Vernon Bridges.

Incumbents Henry White with 184 and Carl Shelton with 155 were also returned to office for two year terms. Tom Campbell received 116 votes in his bid for the two-year council seat.

Winner of the one-year term on the council was incumbent Paul Clayton with 129. His opponent, Phil Dudney, tallied 124.

In the school trustee election, incumbent John L. Grindstaff Jr. received 194, Allen McGaughey 199, and Oscar Mangis 193.

Henry J. Jones was returned to the Knox County Hospital District's board of directors with 165. He was also unopposed.

Clifford Cornett received 150 votes as county school trustee.

Fruit, Pecan Meeting Set

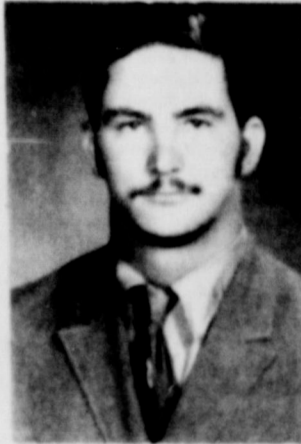

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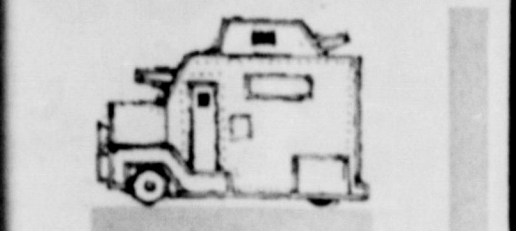

Allen King Speaks On Minimum Tillage

About 40 persons were present to hear Allen King, conservation agronomist for the Soil Conservation Service, speak on minimum tillage, a new planting concept which is becoming popular throughout the United States. The program, sponsored by the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, was held in the Masonic Fellowship Hall.

King told the group that the minimum tillage method offers many advantages including less labor, lowers production costs, conserves moisture, may improve yields, makes double cropping easier, and reduces erosion. King showed slides of minimum tillage equipment and results following its use.

Wesley Robbins, from the local SCS office, showed slides of past year results on the Lloyd Waldrip, Philip Homer, and Billy Mitchell farms located near Knox City. Results were good on these farms where minimum tillage plantings were used on both dryland and irrigated crops.
