## 1956-57 School Budget Less Than Last Year

The Knox City School Board adopted the school budget for 1956-57 after the public hearing Tuesday night.

The budget shows that the current operating expense is less than last year. Last year's expense was \$136,432.95 while this year's is \$131,841.55.

The total is broken down into the following: Administrative expenses \$13,486.00; instructional, \$96,915.55; school services, including transportation, \$8,780.00; operation of plant, \$9,100.00; maintenance, \$1,200.00; and fixed charges, \$2,660.00.

The board set the tax rate at \$1.50, with 50¢ going into a sinking fund for the retirement of bonded indebtedness and \$1.00 set aside for local operation.

Mrs. Kenneth Lankford was employed as 7th grade teacher. She replaces Mrs. Evelyn Nichols who resigned to teach at Rochester,

which is nearer her home. Mrs. Lankford recently moved to Knox City into a home on 7th Street which she and her husband purchased from the W. R. Blalocks. She is a graduate of Mary Hardin Baylor College and has taught 12 years. The last six years she taught the 7th grade in the Pampa schools.

Employed as bus drivers at Tuesday night's meeting were Geo. Davis, Steve Reyes, C. S. Woodward and Howard Hendrix. Hendrix will use his own car to transport Knox City's Negro high school students to Munday. The board adopted a policy of requiring bus drivers to present certificates showing they have passed a physical examination, signed by a medical doctor.

The board passed an order instructing the superintendent to take out public liability and property damage on all vehicles transporting children to and from school or any other school activity.

The superintendent was also instructed to take out a blanket insurance policy, student accident, covering every student in school at a cost of \$2.00 per student. Board members went on record as making it a policy of the school that the school pay it, and parents will not be called on to pay any part of the insurance. The money will come from the operating fund, Supt. Silk said.

A change in the building of permanent type cabinets in the new high school building was approved, with the agreement that the district be given credit by the contractors.

## Grid Practice for O'Brien Bulldogs To Begin Monday

Charles Yarborough, new athletic coach for the O'Brien School, wants to meet all hopefuls for the Bulldog team at the school Monday morning, Aug. 27 at 8 o'clock.

Coach Yarborough will arrive in O'Brien Friday to stay. His household furnishings have already been moved into a teacherage there.

Football practice will begin Monday, and a schedule for the workouts will be made at Monday's meeting.

First game for the Bulldogs will be Friday night, Sept. 7, when they are hosts to Oklaunion. Two more practice games are scheduled, at Odell Sept. 14 and with Guthrie at O'Brien Sept. 21. The first district game will be at Paint Creek on Thursday night, Sept. 27. Other conference games are: Vera at O'Brien Oct. 4; Weinert at Weinert Oct. 11; Mattson at O'Brien Oct. 25; Benjamin at Benjamin Nov. 1; and Goree at O'Brien Nov. 8.

The schedule has one open date, Oct. 18, which school officials would like to fill, Supt. Ray V. Stark said.

It will be noted that practice games will be held on Friday nights and conference games on Thursday nights.

## Former Greyhound To Try Out With McMurry Indians

ABILENE.—Bob Jensen, former Knox City High School athlete, is one of about 60 candidates for the McMurry College Indian football team, which opens fall practice Sept. 1.

Bob, who was reared in Knox City by his uncle and aunt, Mr. and Mrs. J. G. Robin, is a 1955 graduate of KCHS. He lettered three years at tackle for the Greyhounds, won all-district honors in 1953 and 1954, all-area in 1954, and was captain of the team.

Jensen was regional heavyweight champion in boxing, and also participated in basketball. He played freshman football at Texas Technological College last fall, winning a letter there before transferring to McMurry in the spring.

Jensen was also active in scouting in Knox City, attaining the rank of Eagle Scout. A physical education major at McMurry, he plans to coach after graduation.

The McMurry football team, facing a tough schedule, will be hard put to equal its record of last fall when it won eight and lost only two games, for the second best grid record among Texas colleges and universities.

The McMurry schedule includes Abilene Christian College at Abilene Sept. 15; West Texas State at Canyon Sept. 22; Texas A & I at Abilene Sept. 29; Midwestern at Abilene Oct. 6; New Mexico A&M at Las Cruces, N. M., Oct. 12; Corpus Christi at Abilene Oct. 20; Howard Payne at Brownwood Nov. 3; North Texas State at Denton Nov. 10; Chattanooga at Chattanooga Nov. 16; and Southern State (Ark) at Abilene Nov. 23.

## Second Phase of Soil Bank Plan Starts

Secretary of Agriculture Benson has set in motion machinery to start the second phase of the soil bank plan—called the conservation reserve program. Under the plan, some crop land will be shifted to grass, trees or water uses for periods up to 15 years.

Phase one of the soil bank plan, taking some basic crops out of production in return for government payments on a year-to-year arrangement, already has begun. This is called the acreage reserve program.

Phase two also is designed to reduce farm commodity surpluses. But the payments, around \$10 an acre plus some cost sharing for conservation practices, will be smaller and the land will be out of production from 3 to 15 years.

Any farmer can participate in the conservation reserve, even this year, Benson said, if he enters contracts with the department on or before Oct. 15. For 1957 the deadline is March 15.

A department spokesman said comparatively few farmers are expected to join the conservation program for 1956. To be eligible their land must not have been used this year for crops, grazing, or hay that is cut.

But over the long run Benson hopes that from 20 to 25 million acres of land will go into the conservation reserve.

"Farmers interested in qualifying for this year's conservation reserve program should get in touch with their county agricultural stabilization and conservation committee soon," Benson said.

## Farm and Ranch Notes

Crockett Wheat, a new hard red winter variety developed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the U. S. Department of Agriculture, is almost certain to become a major wheat variety for the North Central and High Plains areas of Texas.

In Texas and regional trials over the past six years, it has exceeded the yields of Wichita and other early varieties from two to four bushels per acre, while its test weight has been equal to the best.

Crockett has a greater resistance to rust than the earlier varieties and a milling quality second only to Comanche, which is considered the standard for comparison.

Two fields of Crockett foundation seed will be grown in Knox County next year, and local varieties will be compared to other varieties such as Early Triumph, Concho and Wichita.

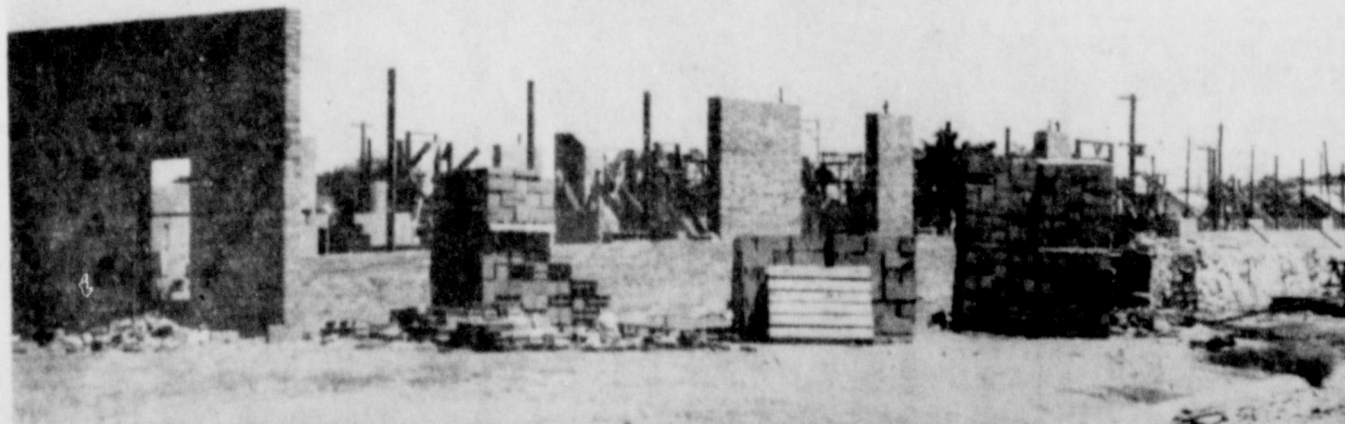
Surviving Cannedy are his wife, four sons, five daughters, his mother, four brothers and two sisters.

## Student Manager Of Football Team Attends Injury Clinic

The clinic, for high school and college trainers, was held at Hardin-Simmons University. Student trainers and coaches from all over the state were present.

During the two day course a number of college trainers, as well as physicians, discussed all types of injuries that might be sustained on the football field.

If absentee voting is any indication, voting in the "run-off" primary will be considerably lighter in Knox County Saturday than in the first Democratic primary July 28.

According to Mrs. Zena Waldron, county clerk, 85 absentee ballots were issued, compared to 115 in the first primary. Up to this morning about 70 of the ballots had been returned. Other voters who have received ballots have until Saturday to return them, Mrs. Waldron said.

Except in Precinct 3, there are only two races on the ballot in Knox County—for Governor and Attorney General. In Precinct 3, the Gilliland and Truscott area, a run-off between C. A. Bullion and J. B. Eubank Jr. for county commissioner is expected to draw out almost the total voting strength of the precinct.

Bullion, present county commissioner, and Eubank, former county judge, tied with 112 votes each in the first primary, and will be vying Saturday for the 72 votes polled by Homer A. Martin, third man in the primary race.

Over the state as a whole, the races between Ralph Yarborough and Price Daniel for governor and Tom Moore and Will Wilson for attorney general are expected to draw a fairly heavy vote.

The campaign for governor has been hot, with charges and counter charges being hurled by the candidates. But for some reason less partisan interest has been evident locally than in 1954, when Yarborough and Allan Shivers were the candidates.

## O'Brien Faculty One Teacher Short

The O'Brien School needs a sixth and seventh grade teacher to complete its faculty, Supt. Ray V. Stark said Wednesday.

Mrs. Charles Reed, who was employed by the board of trustees recently, notified the superintendent that she will be unable to teach the full term.

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FRIDAY ONLY  
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**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1**  
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of Texas, to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; and that the total amount of land to be sold by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); providing that the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the issuance of the Veterans' Land Fund, pending for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. One such appointive member shall be well versed in finance. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature, and such shall make such appointive members shall be as fixed by law. The compensation for said members shall be as may be prescribed by the Legislature. The Veterans' Land Board may have not to exceed Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such fund shall be created by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and under such terms as may be prescribed by law or as may hereafter be provided by law, or provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest, not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent Unemployment Funds, and the Permanent School Funds; such bonds to be issued as needed. In the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board designated as Section 49-b, which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for an offense of which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty, and 'AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty.'"

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11**  
proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another Section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows:

"Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has been fined or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty, and 'AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment granting power to the Legislature to grant aid and compensation to persons who have paid fines or have served prison sentences under the laws of this State for offenses of which they were not guilty.'"

Sec. 3. The Legislature shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be Voted on at an Election to be Held on Nov. 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney at law appointed by the judge of the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney at law."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney at law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines the above provision for voting for and against the Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machines in such manner that each voter shall vote on the machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations; providing for the necessary election and form of ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamations and publications.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 2. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1936**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this amendment shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November 1924, or any existing legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the State and school districts, and shall in no one (1) year exceed the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for any such person; and provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service; but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund."

"The Legislature may authorize all moneys coming into such fund to be invested in bonds or other evidences of indebtedness of the United States, or of this State, or any county, city, school district, or other municipal corporation or district of this State; or in such other securities as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that no recipient of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other State pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other State pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1924, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1936, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment empowering the Legislature to revise the existing Teacher Retirement System and to broaden the benefits to employees of public schools, colleges, and universities supported wholly or partly by the State, authorizing that the State's contributions for such purposes shall equal contributions by such employees and providing that they do not exceed six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such employee by the State or school district or the sum of Five Hundred Four Dollars (\$504.00) for each year for any such employee, regulating the eligibility of such employees for retirement benefits and prescribing the manner of investing money accruing to the retirement fund."

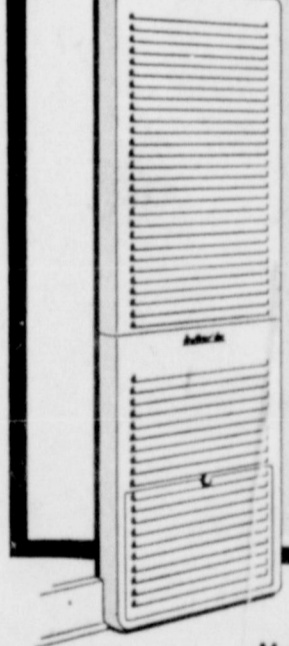
