As of January 1, 1966, 522 voters had registered. As of January 1, 1967, 686 people had signed up, making a total of 164 more registered voters thus far.

Deadline for the free registration is the same as it was under the poll tax-January 31. Every person of voting age (21 and over) who expects to cast a ballot, must register, except those who were 60 years old or older on Jan. 1,






