Hunters Asked To Send In Bands

AUSTIN — Quail hunters are urged again this year to send in bands when found on birds they kill, according to the assistant executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. Many birds were released throughout the State this year from the State Game Farm near Tyler. All these birds have been banded.

The department is particularly anxious to get bands from any Coturnix quail killed by hunters. In this way it will be able to trace the movement of the birds.

Despite unseasonal weather conditions still remain very good for quail hunting with the opening of the general season Dec. 1, the secretary said.

He also announced that breeding stock of native bobwhite quail will be available for game breeders from the Tyler farm after Jan. 1. They will be available at \$3 per pair. Applications should be sent to the Game Commission in Austin.

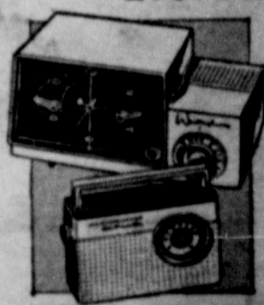

Premiums Will Be High At Fat Stock Show

The largest number of entries and the highest amount of premiums in the history of the Fort Worth show are expected for the 1960 Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, Fort Worth, W. R. Watt, president-manger, has announced. Total premiums for the stock show and rodeo will be nearly \$200,000. Date of the exposition are January 29 through February 7, 1960.

A breakdown on premium money includes open steers, \$4,264; breeding cattle, \$45,312 dairy cattle, \$5,090; sheep, \$6,003; and swine, \$8,407. Premiums in the junior show total \$13,110 and for the judging contests \$2,500. Poultry, rabbits and pigeons will compete for \$2,800. Horse premiums total \$29,150 plus entry fees.

Closing dates for various entries are cattle, sheep and swine, December 15, 1959; horses, January 1, 1960, with poultry, rabbits and pigeons on January 10. The 1960 premium list gives arrival and departure times for the various entries. A copy may be obtained by writing the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show, P. O. Box 150, Fort Worth, Texas.

New classes include the addition of carlot feeder steers and Appaloosa horses.

Thanksgiving Day Motorist Are Warned To Take Extra Precautions This Year

Thanksgiving Day weekend will be marked by the greatest highway travel upsurge since last Labor Day weekend, J. O. Musick, General Manager of the Texas Safety Association, predicted today.

"By auto, bus, train and plane thousands of Texans will be drawn by the magnetic power of this holiday to get 'back home' with relatives and friends who mean the most in their lives," he declared.

"No one figures he will become one of the holiday weekend traffic fatalities," the Safety expert warned. "Somehow accidents — especially those which bring death — always are events that occur to other people."

Musick pointed out that many cars on the road this weekend will be carrying full passenger loads. Family automobiles will be carrying father, mother and children — bound for a visit with grandparents. College students will be sharing rides back to the home town, many of them for the first time since they enrolled in school back in September.

The U. S. Bureau of Public Health, the American Medical Association, the national Safety Council and other groups, who believe in reducing highway deaths and injuries in spite of seemingly inevitable accidents are campaigning to get more people to install safety belts in cars", Musick said.

"A good proportion of fatalities in our traffic accidents today arise out of one-car tragedies in which victims are thrown from vehicles which have gotten out of control," he added. "Seat belts are being used increasingly by organizations operating fleets of cars, because their worth has been proved in preventing or minimizing injury in serious accidents. Although a majority of the public has been reluctant to secure and use these important safety devices

because of confusion as to their merits, those motorists who have them are sold on their value — not only as protection from lurching forward in case of sudden stop or accident, but as a means to more comfortable riding on long trips because fatigue is reduced. The imprudent decision of the majority of the driving public remains to be seen."

Musick also urged that travelers making trips over the Thanksgiving weekend "make certain their cars are in good condition, ready for any unusual weather changes which may develop."

He said he hoped the weather would be fine, but warned that motorists should always be prepared for the worst from now through February.
