## Held for Anderson, Pioneer

Funeral services for Mrs. Sam Anderson were held at 10 a. m. Sunday, October 15, at the Christian Church with the Rev. John Waddell, officiating.

Anderson died at 3 p. m. at her home after a long illness.

She was born Nancy Cooper in Caldwell County Sept. 1878. While young, she moved with her parents to Mississippi and later returned to Texas, settling in Lockhart.

After her marriage to Sam Anderson, they moved to Haslet in 1901. The following year they moved to a farm west of Knox City and lived there until 1905. Her husband, who died in 1926, was Knox City postmaster for 12 years.

Survivors include one son, Anderson of Knox City, postmaster and rural carrier of the local post, and two daughters, Mrs. Bredner of Knox City, and Mrs. Adams of Mineola; grandchildren, Joe Reeder, and Sam Anderson, of Knox City, and Mrs. Paul Sieck of Searcy, Pa.; and two great-grandchildren.

## Wichita Falls Man Fill Pulpit at Christian Church

Arthur F. Beyer, head of biology department of Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, will fill the pulpit at the 11 a. m. service of the First Christian Church Sunday, it was announced this week by the minister, Rev. John Waddell.

Dr. Beyer will be in St. Louis, attending the International Convention of Christian Churches which begins October 17 and ends through October 22.

Beyer received his education from schools in Ohio, and holds his Ph. D. from the Ohio State University.

Dr. Beyer is a very energetic and interesting speaker, probably a better speaker than most whom one hears from time to time, Rev. Waddell said.

Dr. Beyer is also Laymen's Sunday School superintendent at the local congregation and will preside at the morning service.

## O'Brien Man's Brother Dies

James Estes Yarbrough, brother of Charles Yarbrough of O'Brien, died on his 35th birthday at a veterans hospital in Houston.

Funeral services were held Sunday at the Corinth Baptist Church near Cisco.

Yarbrough was a veteran of 12 years service in the navy, stationed in Odessa, where he operated a shoe store, before becoming a merchant seaman.

Surviving are his parents, Mrs. Yarbrough and another brother, G. Yarbrough of Fort Worth.

## Plymouth Dealer to Show New Models

The new 1959 model Plymouth went on display today at Egenbacher Motors in Knox City and elsewhere over the nation.

New bumper-to-bumper and road-to-roof styling, new power plans which are said to operate 10 percent more economically, and a new series of luxury models head the list of innovations for the 1959 Plymouth, Egenbacher said.

The many changes in styling and engineering result from Plymouth's marketing philosophy that value is the most important single factor in the purchase of a new car. Among the "value" features are several which contribute to a total of some 10 percent greater economy of operation. There is a new three-stage carburetor, which with new manifolding reduces gas consumption in the middle speed ranges where most driving is done. A new rear axle gear ratio of 2.93:1 is available at no extra cost with the Torque-transmission. In tests, the new gear ratio resulted in gasoline savings as high as six percent.

Designers have given the new models a new appearance from front, side and rear, making the car look wider and lower. Super enamel, the new exterior finish, is standard on all Plymouths. It doubles the "high gloss" life and can retain a high gloss without polishing for up to 24 months under normal conditions. There are 14 body colors available, including 12 new shades.

The Knox City Greyhounds, feeling tall in the saddle after their victory over Chillicothe the previous week, lowered the boom on Throckmorton, 27-0, here Friday night in the 10-B conference opener for both teams.

Tomorrow (Friday) night the 'Hounds will be hosts to the Munday Moguls in their final practice game of the season. The remaining four games will be district contests, with the first two here and the last two away from home.

## Firm Building Four New Cotton Storage Houses

With approximately 85 percent of the cotton being gathered in the Knox City-O'Brien area going into the government loan, the Knox City Bonded Warehouse Co. is building four new storage warehouses near the railroad tracks in southwest Knox City.

One is already finished and filled with cotton, one is being completed today and two others are under construction.

The firm also has two old warehouses of 1,250 bale capacity each, both of which are filled.

The new houses, measuring 80x120 feet, have a capacity of 1,150 bales each.

J. M. Averitt, manager of the warehouse company, said there is enough cotton on Knox City and O'Brien yards to fill all the houses, and when their capacity is reached cotton will have to be shipped to other government storage points.

The area cotton crop is being harvested rapidly when weather permits. The Brazos Valley Gin in Knox City, operating two plants, has turned out 2,290 bales, while Paymaster has ginned 940 and the O'Brien Cooperative Gin, with three plants, has turned out 9,368 bales.

## Sam L. Favor, Early Day Officer, Dies Here Sunday

Sam L. Favor, 89, Knox City pioneer and former peace officer, died in the Knox County Hospital Sunday night.

Funeral services were held at the First Christian Church Tuesday at 3 p. m. with the Rev. John Waddell, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Knox City Cemetery under direction of Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home.

Mr. Favor was born Sept. 6, 1869 in Sedalia, Mo. He moved to Texas when a small boy and came to Knox City in 1907. He was the first city marshal after the town was incorporated in 1908. Later he held the offices of constable and justice of the peace, and was a deputy sheriff. He was also in the ice business a number of years.

Survivors include his wife; a son, Vance Favor of Quanah; three daughters, Mrs. E. R. Carpenter and Mrs. Alma Culwell, both of Knox City, and Mrs. Vivian Ferguson of Amarillo; four grandchildren and ten great-grandchildren.

## Funeral Held for George W. Solomon

George W. Solomon, 71, farmer of the Truscott community, died in the Quanah hospital Friday, Oct. 10, following a long illness.

Funeral services were held in the Truscott Methodist Church Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock conducted by Rev. Carl Hudson, pastor of the Crowell Methodist Church; Rev. Bill Hall, pastor of the Baptist Church at Gilliland; and Rev. David Stephens, pastor of the Truscott Methodist Church.

George Washington Solomon was born in Jack County, Texas, on October 30, 1886. He moved to Knox County in 1915 and had made his home in the Truscott and Gilliland communities from that time until his death.

Mr. Solomon was married to Miss Lillian Craig on Dec. 25, 1907. Twin daughters were born to this couple.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Zella Abbott and a grandson, Sammy Abbott, both of Odessa; a granddaughter, Mrs. Marilyn Lutich, of Phoenix, Ariz.; two sisters, Mrs. Bob Pickens of Spur and Mrs. Lucy Gynn of Truscott; two brothers, O. W. Solomon of Jacksboro and W. O. Solomon of Truscott.

## Four Area Towns Vote Water Bonds

The four towns comprising the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority voted Saturday for a \$3,800,000 bond issue for a multi-city water supply by an unofficial count of 623 vote for and 233 against.

Haskell, Rule, Goree and Munday voted for the bond issue to create a 25,000 acre foot lake on Miller Creek, about 12 miles east of Munday.

The North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority was created by the last session of the Legislature. Knox City, Rochester and Seymour were first included, but withdrew in previous elections.

Unofficial count of votes in each town Saturday was reported as follows: Haskell, 339 for, 73 against; Rule, 90 for, 85 against; Munday, 135 for, 20 against; Goree, 59 for, 55 against.

A meeting was to be held in Munday this week to canvass the votes and take action toward actual construction of the reservoir. W. R. Johnson, Haskell is president of the Water Authority board of directors, and Walter Coffman of Goree is secretary.

Overall enrollment in the elementary school is 369, Supt. Youngblood said.

The board approved an audit of the school's books. The audit, prepared by Bill Carrouters of Wichita Falls, will be published at a later date.

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## PETROLEUM—basic to the needs of our time

"It is estimated that on a national basis 5,314,000 'killer tires' are rolling daily on the streets and highways," Penman said.
