Five new teachers have joined the Knox City School faculty this year. They are Bill Holcomb, Charles Zachry, Mrs. Judy Burnett, Sam Nichols, and Ron Adams.

Bill Holcomb is the new principal of the Knox City Schools. He is a former Rochester resident and graduated from Rochester High School. He received his B.S. degree from Sul Ross State University at Alpine and his M.E. from Our Lady of the Lake College in San Antonio.

Mr. Holcomb has taught physical education, American History, world history, health, and business law. He has coached

football, baseball, and track, and prior to moving to Knox City, Mr. Holcomb was head football coach at John Jay High School for five years, and Athletic Coordinator in District 31 4-A.

While coaching at Medina Valley High School at Castroville, Texas, Mr. Holcomb had two district football championships and four regional baseball championships.

Mr. Holcomb and his wife, Demetra, are parents of a daughter, Daveine, who is a second grader in Knox City Elementary School. The family attends the First Baptist Church.

Charles Zachry, a native of Potosi, Texas, is teaching in the resource room in Knox City High School.

A graduate of Eula High School, Mr. Zachry received his degree from Abilene Christian College.

Mr. Zachry, who previously taught at Pearsall, is a member of the Church of Christ.

Mrs. Judy Burnett, who will teach English in grades 8, 10, and 12, and American History in high school, is a former resident of Knox City. She and her husband, Knox County Attorney Jobby D. Burnett, and their six month old daughter, Christine, now live in Munday.

A graduate of Midwestern University with a B.S. in education, Mrs. Burnett also attended Texas Tech University and Central Michigan University at Mt. Pleasant, Michigan.

Sam Nichols, who will coach girls basketball and teach health, and his wife, Judy, moved to Knox City from Loop, where he was girls' head basketball coach. He has also been Physical Education Director at the Abilene YMCA where he gave instructions in swimming, basketball, volleyball, and gymnastics.

Coach Nichols was Sports Director at KNIIT Radio in Abilene for four years where he gave sports newscasts and did play-by-play reports of high school and college football and basketball games.

A native of Abilene, Coach Nichols received his B.S. from McMurry College in 1972.

Teaching mathematics at Knox City High School this year is Ron Adams, who taught at Celeste last year.

## Boys Ranch Site Possible

Knox County is being considered as a possible site for one of ten Texas Boys Ranches to be established during the coming year, according to Supt. Kenneth Roberts of Benjamin.

Roberts and Benjamin Mayor Vernon D. (Butch) McCaules, along with several other interested persons, were in Lubbock recently to talk to officials of the organization in regard to locating in this area; and plans are presently underway to hold a meeting next Monday night at 8:30 o'clock in the Courthouse at Benjamin to discuss details of the proposal.

Texas Boys Ranch is not sponsored by any specific agency, organization, or group. It was organized in January, 1973, by a group of Christian men who saw the need for a home for boys who were homeless, neglected, dependent, and delinquent. It is duly chartered under a set of by-laws approved by the State Welfare Department. The Ranch is governed by a Board of Directors made up of members who have a desire to serve boys and are appointed by the existing board of five men, elected at the first meeting.

The original program calls for ten boys with expansion up to one hundred boys within five years.

The basic concept of Texas Boys Ranch is to house the boys in cottages which will house ten to twelve boys and a couple that will serve as Cottage Parents.

Supt. Roberts expressed his hopes to the News that a number of interested persons will be in Benjamin for the August 27 meeting.

## Prominent Businessman, Landowner Buried Sunday

Mr. May, 76, died Saturday at 2:00 p.m. in the Knox County Hospital after a brief illness.

Born December 3, 1896, in Bosque County, he moved to Rule at the age of seven. He married Easther Norman, May 25, 1919, in Rule. They moved to Knox City in 1931 where they owned and operated the J.T. May Variety Store for many years. He was also a landowner in Haskell County.

Mr. May served in the U.S. Army during World War I. He was a member of the First Baptist Church and a member of the Board of Deacons. He was also a Mason. He was a member of the Lions Club, was commander of the American Legion Post and had served on the School Board.

Survivors include his wife, Easther; one son, A.D. May of Rule; one brother, George May of Sweetwater; three sisters, Mrs. Ora McCullough, Mrs. E.O. Morgan, and Mrs. Lina Bills, all of Rule; two grandsons, Dr. David May of Abilene and Randy May of Rule; one granddaughter, Susan Lefevre of Aspermont and one great-granddaughter, A son, Wallace, died in 1952.

## Boll Weevil Spraying Contract Awarded

From the Texas Department of Agriculture were met with officers of the Boll Weevil Association for the purpose of awarding a contract for the spraying of approximately 25,000 acres of cotton.

The requests for bids by other counties were so great that no bid was allocated.

Contract was awarded Clarence Fisher of the Hamlin Flying Service and application of the chemicals should begin about the middle of September on five to seven day intervals. Fisher's bid was \$1.34 per acre.

The Texas Department of Agriculture representatives said that the Knox County Boll Weevil Association's percentage sign-up within the 25,000 acre area, was one of the best cooperative efforts they had seen. They said the producers were to be commended for working together in this group effort to increase net income from cotton in Knox County.

Checkers began making a check of the cotton fields for

weevils this week and will continue until the third spraying.

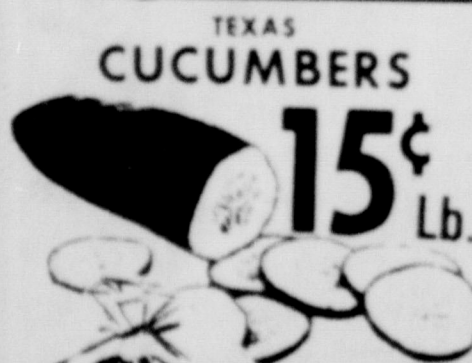

## School Meals Increase

School officials report that due to rising costs, it will be necessary for the price of school lunches and breakfasts to increase as of Monday, August 27. Breakfast will be 20¢ for all students and 30¢ for adults.

Kindergarten through 4th grade students will pay 45¢ for lunch; 5th grade through high school students will pay 50¢ and adults 60¢.

This year, as in preceding years, free lunches will be offered under the free lunch program. Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within the scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free lunches for their children.

The lunch program requires that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. Forms on which to apply were sent home with each student, and additional copies are available at the principal's office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year.

Information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility, school officials said. The principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling, he may make a request either orally or in writing for a hearing to appeal the decision. Superintendent W.R. Baker has been designated as the hearing official. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. A complete copy of the policy is on file in the superintendent's office.

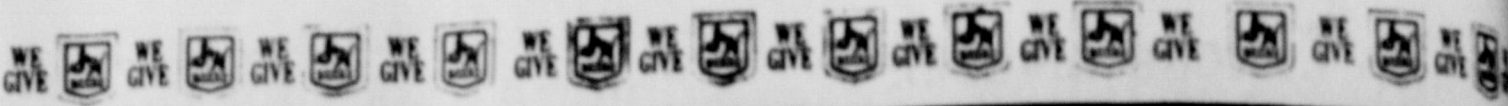

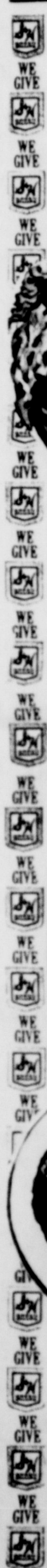

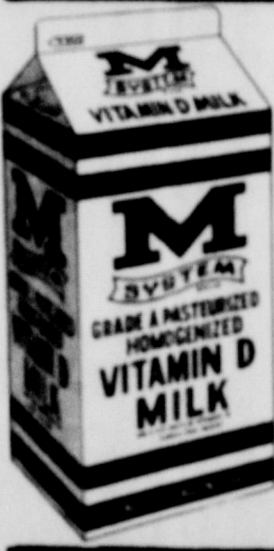
