

Drying methods include sun-drying, oven drying and sun (solar) heaters. Successful drying depends on enough heat to draw out moisture, but not enough to cook the food material. It's also necessary to have dry air to absorb released moisture and air circulation to carry off the moisture.

Sun drving was invented at the same time as agriculture. Man dried fish, meat and fruit to reserve them for another day

Today sun-drying for preservation is especially important to underdeveloped nations. In Turkey, yogurt made from cow or buffalo milk is sun-dried into a chalky powder that can be stored indefinitely

To this is added flour, bits of carrots, beans or pepper. Boiling in water reconstitutes it to produce a stew containing most of the original ingredients, except Vitamin C which sunlight destroys.

Although drying preserves food, it also affects taste--not always for the best.

Two fruits that do have agreeable flavors are prunes and raisins, which are dried plums and grapes.

Drying almost always causes some loss of nutritional quality. A few vitamins, particularly, tend to be destroyed or depleted by the light of sun-drving.

Fruits that may be dried include apples, apricots, berries, cherries, dates, figs, grapes, nectarines, peaches, pears, and plums

To maintain a healthy soil structure a minimum amount of tillage is required. Soil structure can be broken down by heavy compaction with successive tractor trips over the land. Soil organisms living near the soil surface can be destroyed by high soil temperature. A cover, mulch or some type of crop residue needs to be left on the soil surface to maintain moisture and a moderate soil temperature. Weeds should be controlled with herbicides. A limited amount of tillage. proper management of residues on the soil surface and use of herbicides for weed control will assure a healthy soil structure. A soil test will indicate if the soil is low in plant nutrients. Commercial



partment of the Treasury has placed on sale U.S. Individual Retirement Bonds. They are specifically designed for investment by persons who lack coverage by any other retirement plan. The Bonds are issued pursuant to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974

They are sold at face value in denominations of \$50, \$100 and \$500. Interest accrues at the rate of six percent per year, compounded semiannually, and is payable upon redemption.

Individual Retirement Bonds may be purchased from any Federal Reserve Bank or Branch, or directly from the Treasury Department. They may be registered in either single ownership or beneficiary form, in the names of natural persons only. Individual Retirement Bonds are nontransferable; they cannot be sold or used as collateral

The new Bonds permit persons, who work for employers unable to finance a pension plan, to set aside a portion of their annual income--up to a yearly limit of \$1,500, or 15 percent of gross income, whichever is less-for retirement. The amount set aside annually is deductible from gross income for federal



income tax purposes.

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



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The most recent anthrax deaths occurred in five herds in the Marlin-Bremond area of Falls and Robertson counties. These and adjacent herds have been placed under state quarantine.

There is no cause for alarm among livestock producers. Producers in the affected counties as well as those in neighboring counties should vaccinate their herds as soon as possible if they were not vaccinated back in the spring. Annual vaccinations against anthrax in March or April is advised in those areas where the disease has been confirmed, indicating that the anthrax organisms remain in the soil.

Livestock deaths from anthrax can be quickly stopped within eight days in almost all cases by prompt and proper vaccination with Sterne's strain vaccine.

SLEEPING SICKNESS DISEASE IN HORSES

Most Knox County horse owners are aware of a few cases of sleeping sickness discase in the area, but there may be a few who have not heard.
