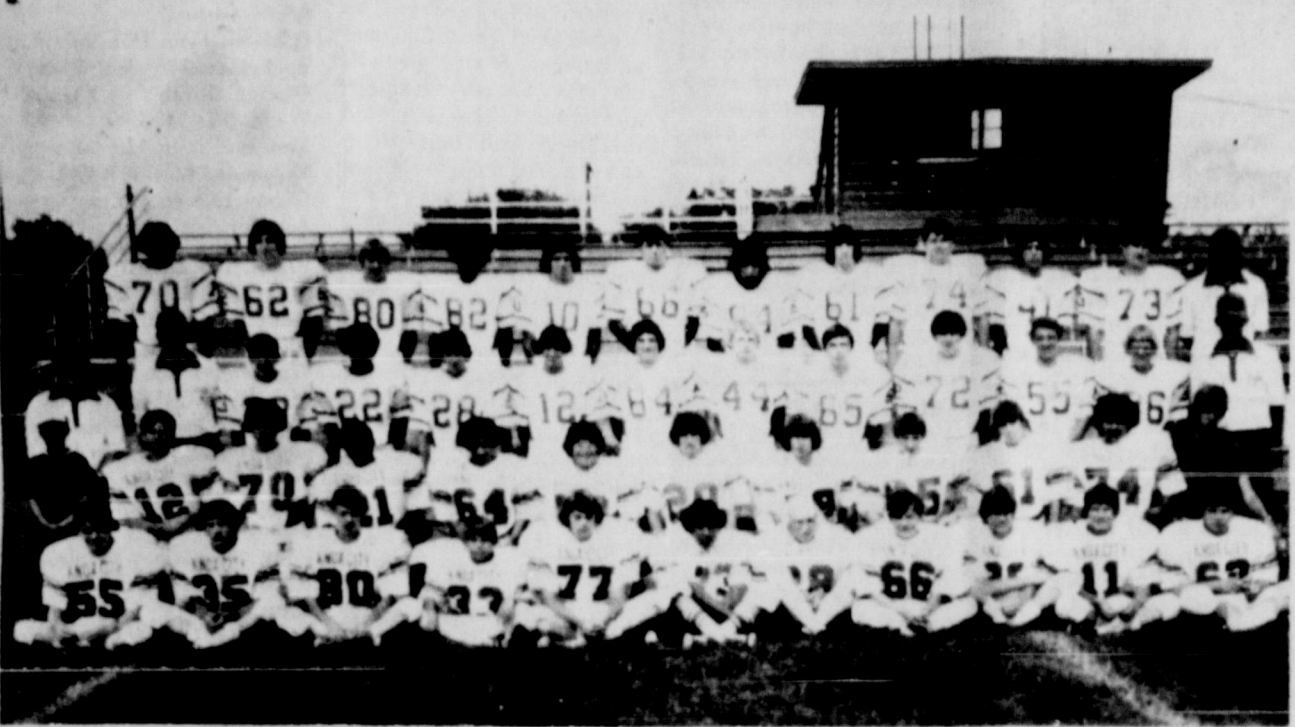

Heatly Is Named To Budget Board

AUSTIN - Representative Bill Heatly of Paducah has been appointed to the Legislative Budget Board by House Speaker Bill Clayton. Heatly is one of the four House members who will serve on the LBB until January of 1977.

He has been active in the appropriations process for many years, being a longtime member of both the LBB and the House Committee on Appropriations.

Every two years, the Legislative Budget Board reviews appropriations requests submitted by all state agencies. With the aid of a professional staff, the LBB closely considers these requests then recommends a comprehensive state budget to the legislature.

Area Senators Named To Legislative Council

AUSTIN - Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby today announced his appointments to the Legislative Budget Board and the Texas Legislative Council.

To the Legislative Budget Board: Senators Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells and W.E. (Pete) Snelson of Midland, both reappointed. In addition, the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee Senator A.M. Aikin Jr. of Paris, and the chairman of the Senate State Affairs Committee William T. (Bill) Moore of Bryan, also serve on the LBB.

The Legislative Budget Board, of which Hobby is chairman, was created to study the state's financial needs prior to consideration by the Legislature each session.

Hobby appointed five senators to the Texas Legislative Council, including Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls, Kent Hance of Lubbock, Grant Jones of Abilene, Bill Meier of Euless, and John Traeger of Seguin.

The TLC was created to investigate the functions and problems of various state agencies and offices, make studies for the legislative branch, and make recommendations to the Legislature.

American Flag Is On Phone Directory

General Telephone company of the Southwest is making a unique contribution to the observance of the nation's 200th birthday in the form of a special telephone directory cover featuring a painting of the first "official" American flag.

The bicentennial directory symbolizing the observance of the nation's 200th anniversary will be delivered to telephone customers in Aspernont, Benjamin, Goree, Haskell, Knox City, Munday, Rochester, Rule, and Weirter. Deliveries began August 29, according to G.F. Kehoe, Customer Service Manager.

The flag design was painted by artist Stevan Dohanos, noted for his paintings of historical subjects and his illustrations of contemporary American life.

Kehoe said the flag depicted on the directory was

adopted by the Continental Congress in 1777 and is spread over the front cover in a hanging position. The legend "1776-1976 the 200th Birthday of Our Country" is the only printing appearing on the front cover. The information usually appearing on the front is shown on the back of the directory.

In addition to the regular information found on the inside front cover is the language of the Act of the Continental Congress under which the flag was created along with explanatory text. A brief biographical sketch of the artist also is included on the inside front cover.

Burial was in the Vera Cemetery.

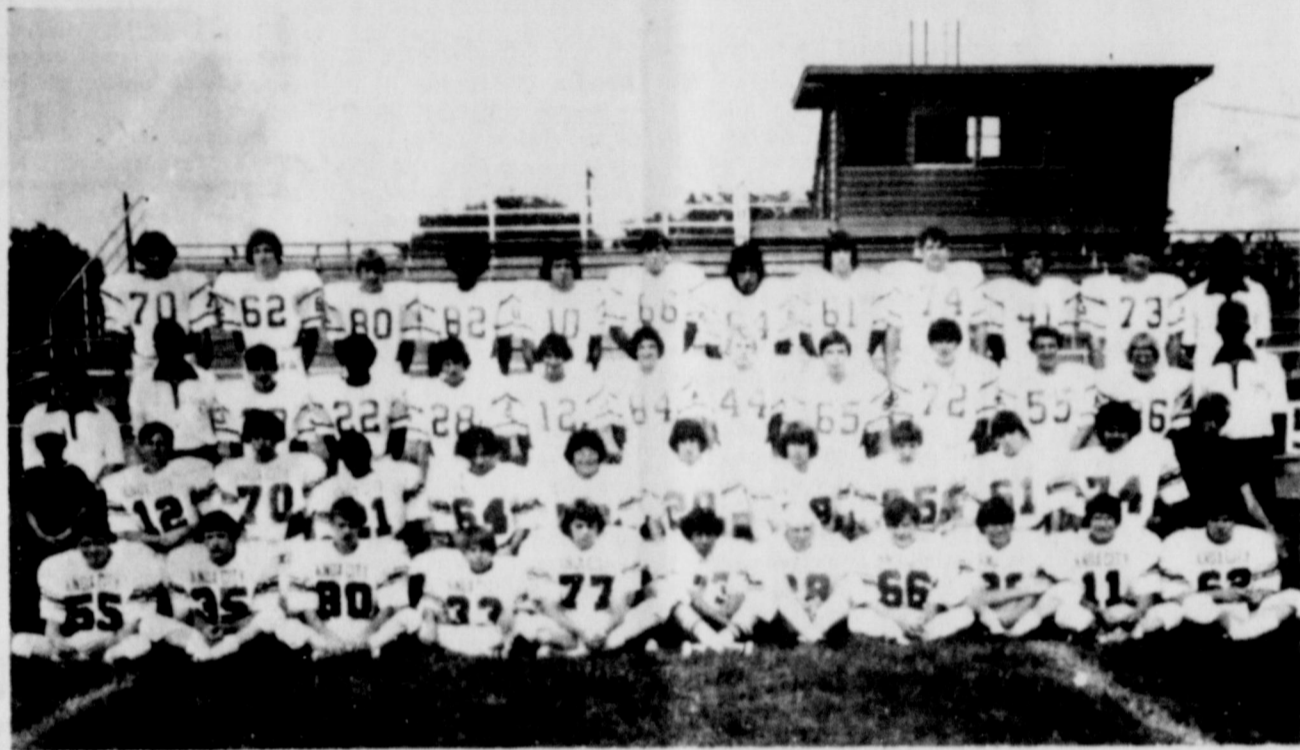
Mr. Bratcher, 79, died Wednesday in a Seymour hospital after a long illness.

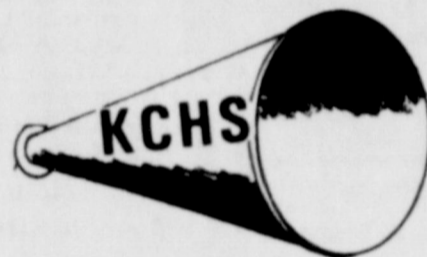



Scholarship Program Set For 1976 Seniors

"Bicentennial Seniors," a nationwide \$250,000 scholarship program for high school seniors who will graduate with the Class of 1976, is being launched this month by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

One national winner will receive a \$10,000 scholarship and 102 state winners will receive \$1000 grants under the program.

Winners will be selected first locally, then on a state-wide level. Two graduating seniors will be chosen in each state and the District of Columbia. Each of the 102 winners will also receive an all-expense-paid trip to Williamsburg, Virginia, from January 16 through 19 to attend seminars and hear noted speakers discuss educational and social issues facing this country today. The national winner will be selected during the Williamsburg conference.

Students taking part in the "Bicentennial Seniors" competition must demonstrate an understanding of America's past and possible directions for the future and an involvement in the social and community issues faced by Americans today.

Soil Fertility Defined

The production of any portion of land is dependent upon the chemical nutrients that are found in the soil. The most common being nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium. These nutrients mix with water and move to the root zone of a plant. The abundance of the nutrients in the soil is known as soil fertility.

For a soil to be fertile, it must have a structure that will enable air, water, and nutrients to pass through it. The structure of the soil is very important in attaining plant growth. The size and shape of each soil particle is important to the general make-up of the soil structure. Air and water must be able to move freely through the soil if the potential fertility that is essential for plant growth is to be used.

The soil is a complex substance formed by living organisms, soil bacteria, fungi,

one-celled animals, plant roots, and many other animals such as ground squirrels and snakes. They all help maintain the soil structure as well as the fertility. We can see that soil fertility and maintenance for productivity depends as much on living plants and animals of the soil as upon the existence of inorganic minerals within the soil.

The cycle of breakdown and decomposition of plant and animal waste, which will circulate minerals back through the soil, is due largely to the work of soil bacteria and fungi. In some soils the minerals are maintained through the action of nitrogen-fixing bacteria. These bacteria take nitrogen from the air and convert it into soil nitrates. If some form of these activities are not going on within the soil, it will become infertile.

To maintain a healthy soil structure a minimum amount of tillage is required. Soil structure can be broken down by heavy compaction with successive tractor trips over the land. Soil organisms living near the soil surface can be destroyed by high soil temperature. A cover, mulch or some type of crop residue needs to be left on the soil surface to maintain moisture and a moderate soil temperature. Weeds should be controlled with herbicides. A limited amount of tillage, proper management of residues on the soil surface and use of herbicides for weed control will assure a healthy soil structure. A soil test will indicate if the soil is low in plant nutrients. Commercial fertilizer can be applied, or a soil building legume such as guar, peas, vetch, and alfalfa can be grown to supply the needed nutrients.

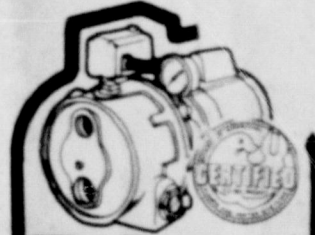

Retirement Bonds Are Now On Sale

WASHINGTON - The Department of the Treasury has placed on sale U.S. Individual Retirement Bonds. They are specifically designed for investment by persons who lack coverage by any other retirement plan. The Bonds are issued pursuant to the provisions of the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974.

They are sold at face value in denominations of \$50, \$100 and \$500. Interest accrues at the rate of six percent per year, compounded semiannually, and is payable upon redemption.

Individual Retirement Bonds may be purchased from any Federal Reserve Bank or Branch, or directly from the Treasury Department. They may be registered in either single ownership or beneficiary form, in the names of natural persons only. Individual Retirement Bonds are nontransferable; they cannot be sold or used as collateral.

The new Bonds permit persons, who work for employers unable to finance a pension plan, to set aside a portion of their annual income—up to a yearly limit of \$1,500, or 15 percent of gross income, whichever is less—for retirement. The amount set aside annually is deductible from gross income for federal

income tax purposes. Because they are designed to be used for personal retirement, the Bonds carry certain redemption restrictions. During the first year after issue, they may be redeemed without interest or penalty. They may be cashed, with a tax penalty, until the owner reaches age 59½, after which the Bonds may be redeemed without penalty. The Bonds may, however, be cashed without penalty, at any time until maturity, for the purpose of changing investments. In addition, they may be cashed without penalty before age 59½, in cases of disability. The maturity date is the first day of the month in which the Bond-owner reaches age 70½, or five years after the date of the owner's death, whichever is earlier. Both principal and interest are reportable for federal income tax purposes, at time of redemption or maturity.

Complete regulations covering the Individual Retirement Bond may be found in Treasury Department Circular, Public Debt Series 1-75.
