

ALLS CAME TUMBLING DOWN--More major improvements are underway in Knox City as one of the town's oldest buildings, the Knox County Lumber Co., plans expansion as well as demolition. Knox City's 55 per cent federal funding grant was for \$16,940. Congressman Purcell's office said Monday the Knox City grant is to partially fund a \$10,800 project including new aeration ditch, final clarifier, chlorine contact chamber and fence at existing facilities.

Lone Star Gas Co. Asks Increase In Local Rates

(June 1, 1972)--Lone Star Gas Company today asked the City of Knox City to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 5.01 per cent to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

The application for rate increase listed increased cost of

buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency.

"In addition," stated Guy T. White, manager of the Seymour distribution office, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies.

The gas cost adjustment portion of the application placed before the City Council today," continued White, "will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assure our customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately \$0.41.

There are two ways to claim medical insurance Medicare Part B Benefits.

One is to let your doctor handle it. If you and he agree he may file with Medicare and the insurance payment will be made directly to him. This way you do not need to submit a claim. Just sign the "Request for Medicare Payment" form which is available at your doctor's office. He will then complete Part II of the form and submit it to Medicare.

The other method is for you to apply to Medicare and have the insurance payment made directly to you. You need not wait until you have paid the bill to apply. Just have your doctor complete part II of the "Request for Medicare Payment" form, or give you an itemized bill. Then you complete Part I of the form and send it in. If Part II of this form was not completed by your doctor, be sure to include his itemized bill.

Your social security office will be happy to help if you need assistance. A representative of the social security district office in Vernon is as near as your telephone. The number of the Vernon office is 532-8046.






