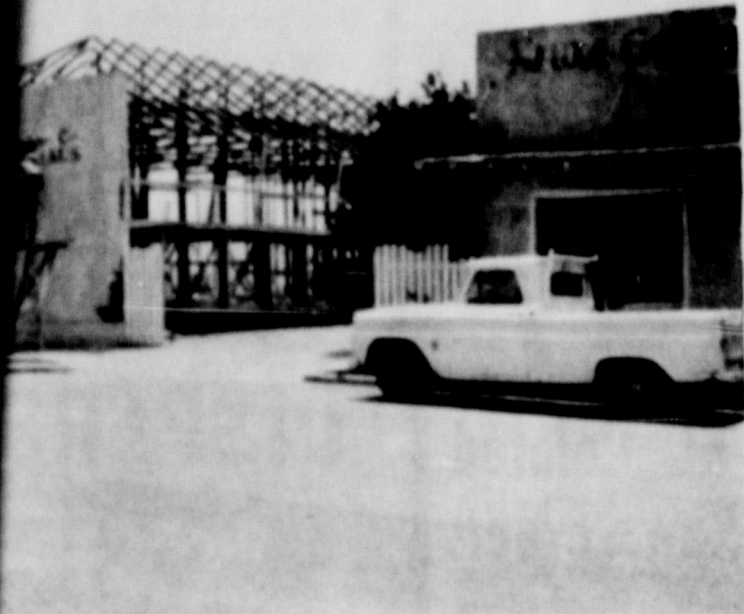

## Balch Wins Runoff In 50th District Judge Race

Knox City turned out a larger percentage of voters last Saturday than many other precincts over the county, and even though the local voters gave District Judge Joe Reeder Jr. strong support, several other precincts within the county with light turnouts failed to produce enough votes to overcome his opponent for the 50th Judicial District seat, R.J. (Judson) Balch of Seymour. Seymour had two local contests of interest to voters as well as the District Judge's race, and a heavy turnout was noted there Saturday. Baylor County gave Balch 110 to Reeder's 43.

The 50th Judicial District is composed of King, Gottle, Baylor, and Knox Counties and complete returns from the four counties Saturday night showed Balch as winner by a scant 43 votes, with a total of 2,032 for Balch and 1,989 for Reeder.

Balch, 36, is a native of Matador but has lived most of his life in Seymour. Reeder had a slight lead over Balch in the May 6 primary. A third candidate, D.J. (Bill) Brookreson, also of Seymour, forced the runoff. Reeder had been appointed in October last year to fill the un-

expired term of Judge Lewis M. Williams, who retired after 31 years as 50th Judge. Reeder is a former county attorney of Knox County and district attorney for the 50th District. In other races Saturday, Knox County voters favored Sanders 772 to 663 for Yarborough for the Democratic nomination as U.S. Senator; Briscoe 1080 to 370 for Governor; Connally 732 to Hobby's 703 as Lt. Governor and Calvert 876 to Wilson's 509 as Comptroller of Public Accounts. Votes by precincts are noted elsewhere in the News.

## Local Boys Delegates To Boys State In Austin

Austin, June 7—The thirty-six State sponsored by the Department of Texas and held on the campus of The University of Texas, got underway today as 840 high school boys from all parts of Texas, and one from Mexico, began registration, Gil Moody, Department Commander, announced. Among those registering from Knox City were Leslie Fitzgerald and David A. McGaughey. Leslie is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Alton Fitzgerald and David's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Allen McGaughey. Both boys will be seniors in fall. They were co-sponsored by the local American Legion and Lions Club.

Following registration, each citizen was assigned to one of two political parties, the Nationalist or Federalist. Each citizen then functions as a member of his party, he attends to precinct, county and state conventions and votes in its primary. Boys State helps to develop civic leadership and pride in American citizenship. This program arouses a keen interest in the detailed study of our government. These civic work-government, and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year. In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing". The program takes an added significance this year as the vote is extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category. Highlights of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol on Tuesday morning where onehundred Boys State Official will be given an opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day. Boys State enrollment this year brings the total to 16, 619 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

Davis III 906 Eksperson Building, Houston, Texas 77002, applicant, seeks a permit from the Texas Water Rights Commission to amend Permit Nos. 2172 and 1914, located in the D.G. Burnett Survey Nos. 2, 3, 4 and 17, Abstract Nos. 5, 13, 20 and 21, respectively, Knox County, Texas, four and three-fourths (4-3/4) miles southeast of Benjamin, Texas, as follows:

(1) To increase the imposing capacity of Lake Davis, authorized under Permit No. 1914, on Dutchman Creek, tributary of Brazos River, Brazos River Basin, from 4477 acre-feet to 5395 acre-feet;

(2) To increase the imposing capacity of Lake Catherine, authorized under Permit No. 2172, on an unnamed tributary of Dutchman Creek, from 1759 acre-feet to 2084 acre-feet;

(3) To increase the rate of diversion from the two reservoirs (without an increase of the annual appropriation therefrom in the amount of 2000 acre-feet from Lake Davis and 373 acre-feet from Lake Catherine) from a combined rate of 20.8 cfs (9490 gpm) to a combined rate of 33.8 cfs (15,000 gpm); and

(4) To construct various connecting channels, levees and pump sites, all being more fully set out in said application.

Applications Nos. 2091-A and 2396-A were accepted for filing by the Texas Water Rights Commission on May 15, 1972, and a hearing thereon will be held by the Commission in the San Houston State Office Building at Austin, Texas, on June 27, 1972, at 10:00 a.m. Those opposing the granting of said application should file written protests with the Commission and the applicant at least five days prior to hearing date, giving their reasons therefor and such other information as is required by Commission Rule 305.2.

## Two Ways To Claim Medicare Benefits

There are two ways to claim medical insurance (Medicare Part B) benefits.

One is to let your doctor handle it. If you and he agree he may file with Medicare and the insurance payment will be made directly to him. This way you do not need to submit a claim. Just sign the "Request for Medicare Payment" form which is available at your doctor's office. He will then complete Part II of the form and submit it to Medicare.

The other method is for you to apply to Medicare and have the insurance payment made directly to you. You need not wait until you have paid the bill to apply. Just have your doctor complete part II of the "Request for Medicare Payment" form, or give you a Remized bill. Then you complete Part I of the form and send it in. If Part II of this form was not completed by your doctor, be sure to include his Remized bill.

Your social security office will be happy to help if you need assistance. A representative of the social security district office in Vernon is as near as your telephone. The number of the Vernon office is 532-0345.
