

Smith said.

Major diseases and estimated loss due to their effect on yield were bacterial blight, 7.31 percent; root rot, 3.18 percent; verticillium wilt, 3.06 percent; seedling diseases, 3.0 percent; seed-ling diseases, 3.0 percent; and boll rots, 0.92 percent. Other diseases causing losses were root knot nematodes, fusarium wilt and ascochyta blight.

These average figures don't give the true picture because in areas where diseases struck the

areas where diseases struck the hardest losses ran into ruinous figures, pointed out Smith. For example, root rot was estimated to have caused a 25 percent loss in the Central Blackland area. Seedling diseases were especially damaging in the Lower Rio Grande Valley and in some North Texas areas.
