Dynamics Of Selling, Study Course Is Being Offered Here, April 18-21

Dynamics of Selling, a special sales training course, has been scheduled for Knox City, starting April 18, 19, 20 and 21. This was announced this week by Bob Harrison, Knox County Retail Merchants Association.

This course is made possible by the Distributive Education Program of The University of Texas and the Texas Education Agency and will be presented in four two and one-half hour sessions, Monday through Thursday, starting at 7:30. Meetings will be held in American Legion Hall.

D. W. Thomas, sales management training specialist from the University, will conduct the course. He has had broad experience in personnel administration and retail selling.

"Indifference on the part of salespeople is responsible for 68 per cent of customer turnover," explains Mr. Thomas. Because the salespeople are not selling as well as they can, they seem indifferent to the customers," he added. Mr. Thomas's course places

Vandalism Ruins Private's Auto

Constable Leroy Davis was called at approximately 10:15 p.m. Thursday night when Jackie Acosta notified the constable that his car had been vandalized and burned.

Davis said the windshield was broken in two places by a large instrument such as a hammer on the driver's side and that both windows were also broken on the left hand side of the 1962 Chevrolet Super Sport.

Someone apparently poured gas on the engine and set fire to the car. It failed to burn the car too badly, however. All the wiring and a large blister on the hood amassed damages between \$200 and \$300 Davis said.

Cancer Drive Planned Monday

According to Mrs. Paul Clayton, Knox County Chairman of the Cancer Crusade, the 1946 Study Club will sponsor the door-to-door house calls for your donations to the Cancer Fund next Monday night, April 18, beginning at 6:00 p.m.

The volunteer will come to your door with two vital messages: 1) How to best protect your life from cancer; 2) An appeal for much-needed funds. The Society seeks these funds not only to carry on at present levels but to enlarge its research, education and service programs and give us more effective control over cancer.

The cancer problem is big. It involves all of us. Cancer is impartial when it attacks. But the cancer problem is not at all as gloomy as it was a few years ago. Modern science and education have made great inroads on the disease. There are 1,400,000 Americans alive today, cured of cancer. A quarter of a century ago there were only 260,000.

Twenty years ago only one out of four stricken with the disease was saved. Now it is one out of three. It could be one out of two, that is, if all of us exercised necessary precautions. This is why education is so important—people must know the facts and be persuaded to act in time. Action requires a health checkup by a physician every year and being constantly on the alert to cancer's seven danger signals.

Research is most important. The lives of half of those who develop cancer depends on future research. The American Cancer Society needs more research funds to support more of the projects recommended by the distinguished scientists who are on its Research Advisory Council.

So when an American Cancer volunteer calls, "open your doors and your hearts and your minds."

D. W. Thomas Speaks To Lions



Guest speaker for the Knox City Lions Club was D. W. Thomas of the University of Texas and the Texas Education Agency who is conducting a sales training course in Munday this week and another one for Knox City beginning April 18 through 21 of next week.

Bob Harrison introduced the speaker to the club and told the group that the courses Mr. Thomas was teaching would be held here at the American Legion Hall at 7:30 p.m. and would cost only \$3 for the entire four courses.

Mr. Thomas began his talk by explaining his profession and informing the group on some of the bad pitches of salesmanship a lot

of salespeople were using to the detriment not only to themselves but for the product they were trying to sell.

"Dynamics of Selling" is one of the courses offered and Mr. Thomas said he thought the field was "wide open" for salespeople in every walk of life. He explained that everyone had a job of selling and listed ministers, morticians, teachers, veterinarians, dentists, etc. as a few who had enrolled in the course and who needed it.

Distributive Education he said, was an elective subject in a lot of schools and said students between 16 and 17 were some of the best salespeople.

He said the course is a public service program by the Extension Service of the University of Texas and in a poll by experts they had found:

Why do customers leave town? In a national average they have discovered that 30 per cent leave home to trade because of the local salespeople's indifference... that they just don't know their product whether it be service or merchandise.

assistance or high pressure selling. Mr. Thomas said he didn't think a salesperson worth his salt unless he had a "complete turmoil inside to make a sale, to want to make a sale, and yet on outward appearances be cool and calm."

33 per cent leave because of the service they do not receive or an error and delay in service. Fourteen per cent leave because of high prices and 13 per cent do not like the personnel.

Other bad impressions a lot of salespeople acquire is that they do not leave a good impression at first. He said a customer had his mind made up about the person who was trying to sell him something in the first 10 seconds of their meeting.

He illustrated a way to begin a sales pitch, and he also said a good selection was necessary and that 80 per cent of all goods were sold to women.

Another failure of salespeople was that few knew their product very well and were not able to tell a potential customer all the good phases of their product.

Also what benefits the customer would derive by buying their product. "In other words if your product doesn't have something better than its competitor there is very little use in one buying it from you," he pointed out.

To conclude his talk Mr. Thomas said real selling is going down the drain and we need to save it.

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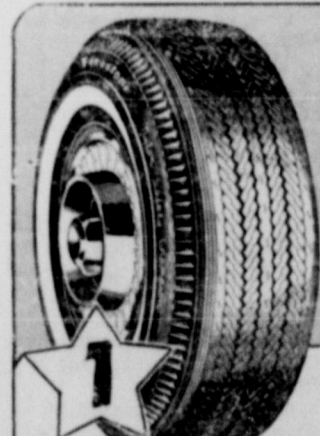
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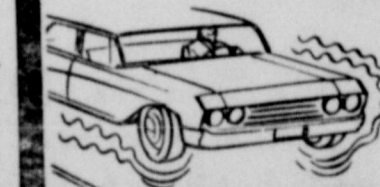

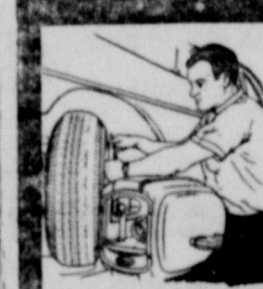

Some Veterans Have Until 1976 To Get GI Loan Under New Loans Bill

Veterans with more than 180 days of active military duty discharged from the service since January 31, 1953, have at least until March 3, 1976, to complete a GI home or farm loan under the new GI Bill, the Veterans Administration pointed out today.

The new law, bringing to veterans of the post-Korean period GI loan privileges hitherto available only to veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict, carries its own minimum deadline of ten years after the actual signing of the bill on March 3, 1968, Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco said.

A maximum eligibility date of 20 years after discharge from the qualifying active service is also in the law. Veterans discharged because of service-connected disabilities will have the maximum 20-year entitlement.

Between those minimum periods, individual veterans will reach the termination of their eligibility according to the following formula:

Add ten years to the date of the last discharge from active service plus one year for each three-month period of that service.

The veteran must hold a discharge other than dishonorable. If released because of a service-connected disability, the service time may be less than the stipulated 180-plus days period.

The new law also benefits those servicemen who remain on active duty after completing at least two years of service. They may obtain VA-guaranteed loans while still in the armed forces.

For a post-Korean veteran or serviceman, VA may guarantee a home loan made by a private lender up to \$7,500 or 60 per cent of the loan, whichever is less.

For a farm real estate loan other than for the acquisition of a home, the guaranty may not exceed \$4,000 or 50 per cent of the loan; and for non-real estate farm loans, the guaranty may not exceed \$2,000 or 50 percent of the loan.

This means that a lending institution will receive the Government's guaranty which is intended

to be in lieu of a down payment or to reduce the down payment which the lender normally requires.

The maximum amounts of entitlement apply to each person who qualifies under the new law. In other words, an individual who is eligible as a serviceman will not gain additional entitlement when he is released or separated from the service; further, an individual who can qualify as a post-Korean veteran and who later serves for 181 or more days will not receive additional entitlement for the later periods of service.

Loans may be for the purchase of homes; to make alterations, repairs or improvements in homes already owned and occupied; to purchase farms or farm supplies or equipment to obtain farm working capital; or to refinance delinquent indebtedness on property to be used or occupied by the veteran as a home or for farming purposes.

The new GI Bill offers only guaranteed loans to post-Korean veterans and servicemen; insured loans are not authorized for such veterans and servicemen. Also, business loans are not authorized for individuals who qualify under the new GI Bill.

VA direct home loans will be available only for the purchase of homes and farmhouses in areas where such loans have been authorized. The maximum direct loan possible has been raised from \$15,000 to \$17,500.

There is no maximum on the amount of a guaranteed loan.

All loans made or guaranteed by VA will bear interest at five and one-half percent.

Under the new law, a one-time non-recurring fee, not to exceed one-half of one percent of the loan amount must be paid to the VA before a guaranty certificate may be issued or before a direct loan is made. However, it may be included in the loan, but it cannot increase the maximum direct loan above \$17,500.

MISCHIEF IN MIND

"There is no law," said Oliver Wendell Holmes, "against a man's intending to commit a murder the day after tomorrow."

But suppose the man still has mischief in mind when the day after tomorrow comes. And suppose he aims a gun at his intended victim and fires a shot. Then, even though he misses, he has indeed committed a crime: attempted murder.

Evil intent, by itself, is never a crime. Our jails would overflow if we punished every person who, however fleetingly, intends to cheat, slander, rob, or assault somebody else. There must surely be 1,000 clenched fists for every thrown punch.

Not so active preparation necessarily a crime. The man who puts matches in his pocket, with arson in mind, is not yet guilty of attempted arson.

At what stage does unpunishable preparation turn into punishable attempt? Where is the "point of no return?"

One test is the "specialness" of the preparation. A man who acquires special-purpose printing plates may be more clearly committed to the crime of counterfeiting than the man who acquires general-purpose ink.

Another test is the nearness, both in time and space, of the crime itself. The man two days away from a murder, in Holmes' example, still has time to cool off. A man planning a burglary in another city may yet change his mind before arriving at the scene of the crime. The law makes due allowance for a chance that either prudence or conscience will bring his effort to a halt.

But when the preparation is unmistakably evil, and when the victim is put in imminent danger, the law says a criminal attempt has been made — even though no actual harm is done.

For example, a cook who mixed poison into her employer's
