A 1977 graduate of Clyde High School, he joined the Navy in January 1978.

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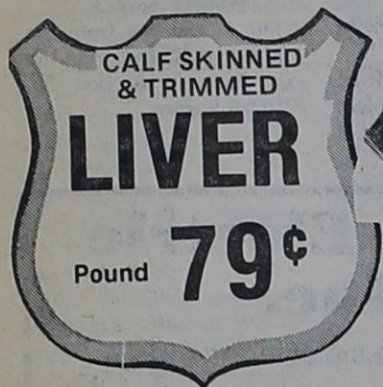

24, Victoria CSL Survey 336. Other venture is Colvin Hayes and Associates, Dallas No. 1 Maggie Schaf-frina, et al.

Having a proposed depth of 1,999 feet, it is located two miles north of Baird on an 80-acre lease.

Site is 150 feet from the south and 200 feet from the east lines of Section 95, BBB&C Survey.

Who are the Directors of the Chamber of Commerce to say that the City of Baird is "Dying a long agonizing death", and why should we citizens move out, to please the C of C? Now about the unrest about which the C of C writes first off, I just can't believe that any C of C board of directors in any place in the U.S.A. would write a letter like the one published in the Callahan County Star. I have always been led to believe that the C of C in any City was to build and improve public relations not tear down and certainly not to agitate unrest, also I feel that it the Directors are so upset and dissatisfied that they are the ones that should move, not the citizens, like they suggest.

The Directors also mentioned "Four businesses have closed" but what they didn't say is that these five new businesses have opened: Baird Electric, The Looking Glass, a new laundry and meat market at Big Country Grocery, Allsup Grocery and Service Station, and a Phillips 66 Service Station. You would mention that Baird Auto Repair has moved to a much larger location, to better serve the citizens of Baird.

The above mentioned business people must not view death the same as the C of C. Perhaps the C of C directors are not aware of the fact two thirds of our power is now being furnished by W.T.U. and that City employees are working as fast as feasible to finish their work so that when W.T.U. is ready to tie in the last one third every thing will be in readiness, another thing the rates were recently reduced, and I feel sure there is another reduction to be made as soon as it is financially feasible especially after the total tie in is made which is to be real soon. On the other turn around situation, I feel that the Directors of the C of C should be the very first to turn around and get on the right track.

The Telephone situation: You say the Telephone Co. says the poles are not in compliance with the code, our poles and lines are in compliance, but what they are saying is that if you tax payers will pay out about \$75,000.00 you can get your electric lines up high enough to be out of our way so we can put our lines on your poles and then the Telephone Co. can be in compliance. Thanks to our City Officials for not donating my tax money to the Telephone Co. As I have been paying monthly for years for these promised improvements.

I would like to comment

on some of Mr. Rockey's letters to the Editor: He often uses the word "CLIQUE". Webster dictionary defines a Clique as a group of person united for some common purpose, (usually sinister) A coterie; a ring--Webster again, defines SINISTER, as inauspicious, unlucky; evil; ill-omened; corrupt; dishonest; on the left side. Surely Mr. Rockey must not know the meaning of the word, or he wouldn't have the audacity to call our elected government a "CLIQUE". I also fail to understand why since he does not live

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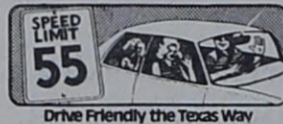
Students Produce Own Traffic Safety Filmstrip

Fourth grade students in Joann Vestal's class at Baird Elementary school have produced their own colorful filmstrip on traffic safety with materials provided free of charge by the Traffic Safety Section, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. In "The Safest Show on Earth", class members

create their own illustrations for a full color, sound filmstrip exploring key aspects of passenger, bicycle and pedestrian safety. The Traffic Safety Section makes available to the school all necessary materials without cost for "The Safest Show on Earth." After the students finish their illustrations, the

drawings are processed into a filmstrip by Media Intensive Learning Corporation, designers of the program. The filmstrip is returned to the class originating the drawings, along with a lively soundtrack cassette narrated by children. Both the filmstrip and the cassette become the property

of the school. A study of more than 15,000 students in Texas by the Southwest Educational Development Laboratory has shown that participants in "The Safest Show on Earth" registered a 10 percent gain in knowledge and a 25 percent increase in positive traffic safety attitudes.

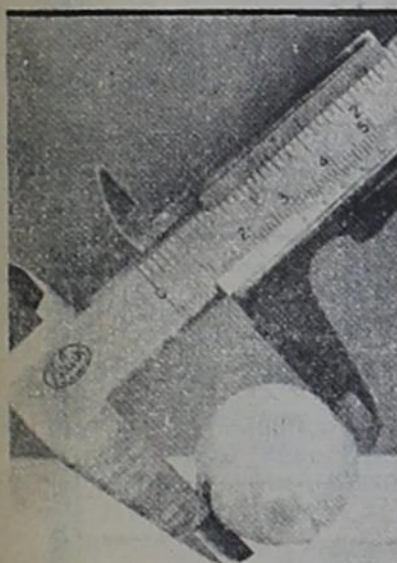

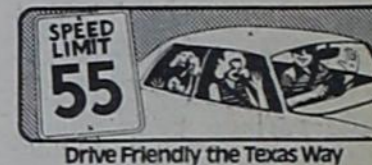

Prominent Americans in all walks of life are being asked to share with the Postal Service letters from their experience that have preserved memories, shaped opinions, and lifted spirits, the three themes to be stressed during Letter Writing Week. The results of this survey will be made available during the week.

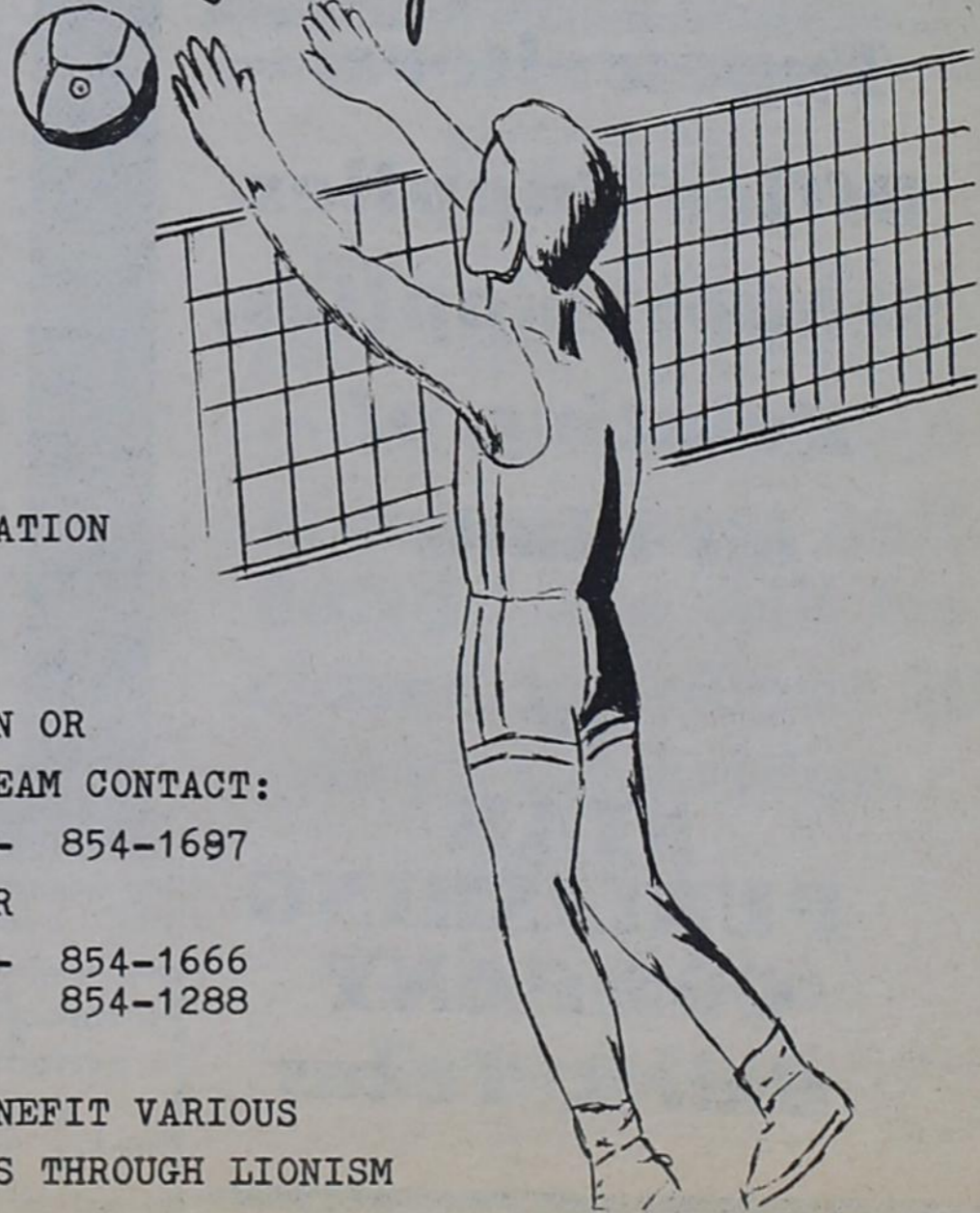
