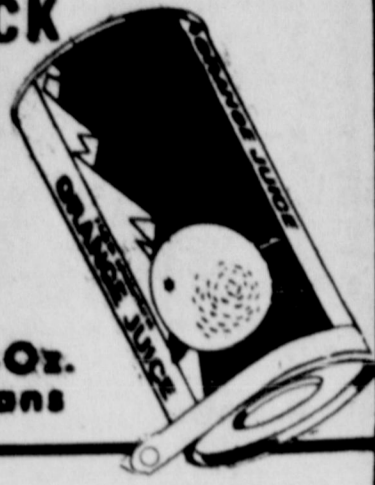

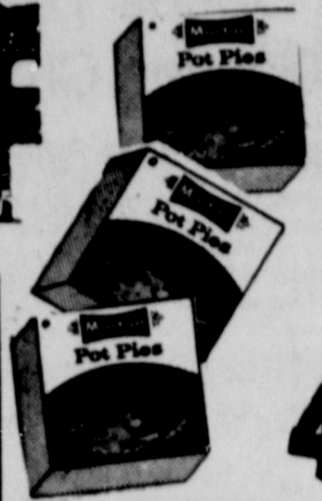

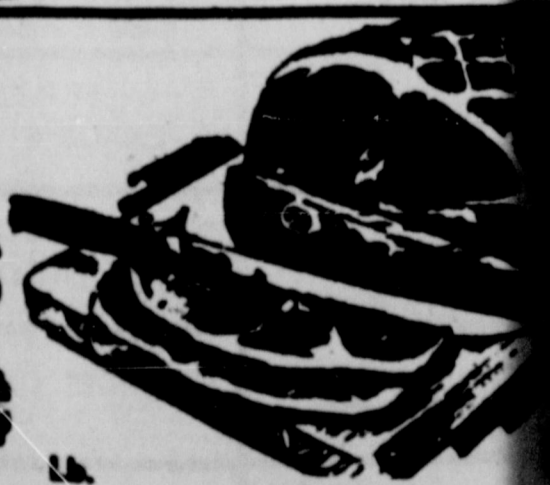

Faster Payment On Medicare Claims

People covered by Medicare medical insurance can assure faster payment of their claims if they make sure their correct claim number is on the claim form. About one of every three delays in payment of Medicare medical insurance claims is caused by use of a wrong claim number or omission of the number entirely.

The claim number identifies a claim for Medicare payment on bills for medical services. If you put a wrong claim number -- or don't enter a number -- on a 'Request for Medicare Payment' form, a search for your correct number is necessary. The search can delay your payment.

If itemized bills are sent in with a claim, the claim

number also should be written on each separate bill. The claim number appears on the health insurance card issued to everyone covered by Medicare. The number has nine digits and a symbol, such as A, B, F2. The number, including the symbol, should be copied onto the designated blank on the form.

Payment can also be delayed when medical bills are submitted without 'Request for Medicare Payment' forms, or when claims are sent to the wrong address. The form is available at most doctors' offices and at any social security office. Claims should be sent to Medicare, Group Medical and Surgical Service, P.O. Box 22147, Dallas, Texas 75222, the organization that handles Medicare medical insurance payments for medical services provided in this area.

If a doctor and patient agree the doctor can be paid directly by Medicare. If the patient submits the claim, the Medicare payment goes to the patient.

DPS Accident Report Given

The Texas High Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Knox County during the month of August, 1974, according to Sergeant J.W. Garner, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no persons killed and four persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1974 shows a total of 28 accidents resulting in no persons killed and ten persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1974, shows a total of 542 accidents resulting in 30 persons killed and 314 persons injured as compared to August, 1973, with 586 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 328 persons injured. This was 44 less accidents, six more killed, and 14 less injured in 1974 at the same period of time.

The 30 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1974, occurred in the following counties: seven in Palo Pinto; three each in Potter, Wheeler, Crosby, and Lubbock; and one each in Armstrong, Childress, Deaf Smith, Hardeman, Hemphill, Parmer, Jack, Lamb, Stonewall, Wichita, and Wise.

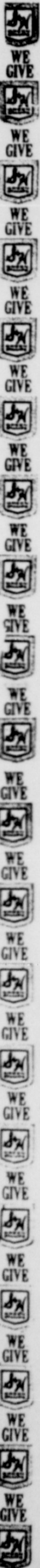
