The Knox City Greyhounds pounded the Rule Bobcats Friday night 40-0.


The Hounds scored in the quarter, when Al Bateman carried the pigskin across the goal line on a three yard run. Quarterback Joey Swain kicked the extra point.

One of the highlights of the day's events was the address by guest speaker Paul Kramer, director of the Texas Forest Survice.

Mr. Kramer explained to the group, "We are concerned with the solution of land use problems that are becoming increasingly apparent, not only in Texas, but in all of the other states. Our burgeoning population and the increased affluence of our people in terms of both time and money have created awkward confrontations in terms of land use. They must be solved if we are to continue to reap the bounty of this great land of

Conservationists in the Soil Conservation Service in Texas and Oklahoma and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department met at the center Tuesday, September 17, where range, agronomy, and biology conservationists observed plants being grown there for use in the two states.

After making evaluations of the plants, they divided into committees to determine priorities for plant material production for the different conservation uses during the coming year. Following the field review, plants and rhizomes, produced at the center for use in shoreline plantings on watershed structures to control erosion caused by wave action, were allocated. The conservationists also determined what plants or seeds will be collected at the field offices in the two states and sent to the Center for initial

Visiting dignitaries included John Arnn, state resource conservationist of Temple, Fred Fortney, state resource conservationist of Stillwater, Okla., Arnold G. Davis, regional plant material specialist of Fort Worth, Robert Lippert, plant material specialist of Manhattan, Kansas, along with other conservationists.

The Knox City Center was established in January, 1965. The original long-term lease from Tom R. Campbell was for 60 acres of irrigated land. Ten additional acres were added in 1970 for the propagation of plants for shoreline erosion control.

On September 7, 1967, the center was officially named the James E. "Bud" Smith Plant Materials Center by See FIELD DAY Pg. 7

Donald A. Williams, who was then administrator of the Soil Conservation Service.

Although the primary area of service of the Knox City Plant Materials Center is Texas and Oklahoma, the work done here is coordinated with that being done throughout the Great Plains states and in other parts of the country. This center continues the work started by former SCS nurseries and plant materials centers in the search for better plants and better ways of handling them.

DPS Accident Report Given

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eight months of 1974 shows a total of 28 accidents resulting in no persons killed and ten persons injured.


The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1974, shows a total of 542 accidents resulting in 30 persons killed and 314 persons injured as compared to August, 1973, with 586 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 328 persons injured. This was 44 less accidents, six more killed, and 14 less injured in 1974 at the

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




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
