Teachers Will Begin In-Service August 16

With the arrival of the month of August, the beginning of a new school year looms just around the corner! And this year, following the July 10 referendum, O'Brien and Knox City Schools will merge for the 1976-77 term. The merger will become permanent subject to the approval of voters in the August 14 election, school officials said.

Teachers will report for in-service on Monday, August 16, at 8:30 a.m. in the high school library at Knox City, according to Principal Bill Holcomb. The teachers will be in Monday on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and then will report back to Knox City and O'Brien for registration on Friday, August 20. Classes will begin Monday, August 23.

Pre-registration already has been held at both O'Brien and Knox City, but Mr. Holcomb explained that inevitably, there are always some necessary changes to be made at the last minute each year.

Kindergarten through fifth grade will register August 20 at 1:00 p.m. in their rooms and Mrs. Mary Jo Lankford will be there to help those who need directions.

The sixth, seventh, and eighth grades will register that morning at 9:00 o'clock at O'Brien.

High School registration will be in Knox City and Mr. Holcomb asks that all freshmen be in the English room at 9:00 a.m. Seniors will register

at 10:30 a.m., juniors will register at 1:00 p.m., while sophomores will register at 2:30 p.m.

Mr. Holcomb explained that officials will do their best to keep the schedules on time.

He also asks that kindergartners through eighth graders bring their parents or guardians if possible as there will be some important forms to distribute and sign that are usually handed out the first day of school, such as the Age, Grade, and Residence forms, free lunch forms, and students' release forms. He said that if there were any questions, these could be answered at this time.

Parents of fourth and fifth grade boys and girls also need to be reminded that they need white shorts, shirts, and socks to suit out in for physical education classes. Coach Jerry Lowrey will coach the boys and Coach Steve McElhane will be girls' coach.

Bus transportation between the O'Brien and Knox City Schools has been worked out satisfactorily, Mr. Holcomb said.

City Traffic Signs Now Being Replaced

The City of Knox City is now in the process of replacing traffic signs and city officials are urging that motorists drive with caution, especially when two signs may appear in the same site, one reading "Yield" and the other one "Stop."

The city recently entered a program for sign replacement which will bring the city into compliance with the Department of Transportation's "Manual of Uniform Traffic

Control Devices." The project is in cooperation with the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, Office of Traffic Safety. Upon completing the installation of stop and yield signs, the Federal Highway Administration will reimburse the city for the cost of the traffic signs only, while the city must pay for the posts and must be responsible for the installation of all signs.

While this project is underway, city officials would like to remind residents that conflicting signs will be only a temporary situation and to be cautious. The city will complete the project as quickly as possible, so that there will be as little confusion and inconvenience as possible.

City officials also pointed out that Avenue B and Avenue D will be through streets from State Highway 222 (the Munday highway) to North Fifth Street. Most intersections will have yield signs replacing the stop signs, they explained.

Deadline For Fair Royalty Nears

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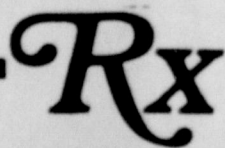

The Warrens met in the Grace community, probably at a dance in one of the homes as that was the major entertainment of the community. Mrs. Warren's father, Jody Tackitt, was an oldtime fiddler and played for country and cowboy dances for many years around Grace and Guthrie.

Mr. Warren explained that he went with Mr. Tackitt to help do the playing. He had a banjo that his father bought for him in 1907, and in fact he still has it and reports it's in good condition.

Mrs. Warren said they did their courting in 'horse and buggy' days and were married August 10, 1911, while sitting in the buggy. King County Judge Tobe Lynn performed the ceremony and Mr. Warren laughingly recalled that he, being some-

what excited at getting married, drove away without paying a fee for the ceremony. However, he learned later that his new father-in-law had taken care of it after the newlyweds had gone.

Mr. Warren came to Knox County from Evant, Coryell County, Texas, and arrived in Munday on the first Monday in September, 1910. He rode in a wagon, trailing his buggy behind the wagon. He came on to the Grace community northwest of Knox City near King County line to a farm his father had purchased in August, 1909. This farm has been his family home since that time.

There was no bridge across the Brazos River when Mr. Warren came. Later, when a bridge was built, he and the late Finis Walker hauled the first two bales of cotton across the bridge. He also remembers that the mules had to have a little extra persuasion to step out on the bridge's wooden flooring.

Mr. Warren carried the mail by buggy between Benjamin and Grace, twice a week, in 1915-1916 for \$17.00 per month. During rainy weather, he had to travel by horseback. The mail service was discontinued in 1917.

Mrs. Warren, the former Gladys Tackitt, was born in the Tackitt's 'dug out' home in Guthrie in King County and moved with the family first to Knox City, then to the Grace community in her early childhood.

A lover of horses, Mrs. Warren had her own horses for many years and continued to ride until the middle 50's when they lost the last family horse and did not replace him.

She enjoys crocheting, knitting, sewing, and gardening and always has flowers and house plants.

She and Mr. Warren are very active and stay busy maintaining their lovely farm home, caring for a few cattle and chickens.

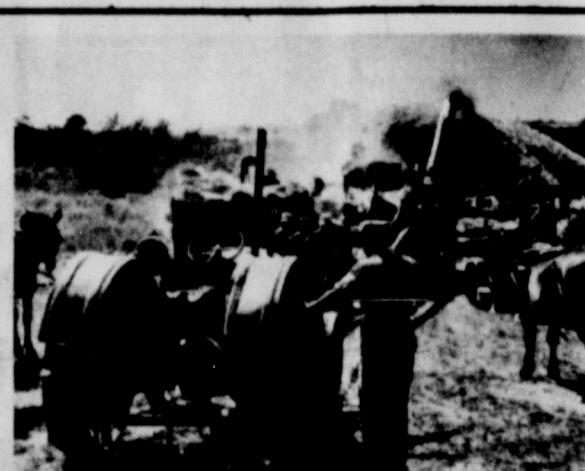

The decision on whether or not you're physically or mentally disabled under the social security law is made by doctors and other disability experts in Austin at the Division of Disability Determination," he said.

To be eligible for disability payments, most workers need at least five years of work covered by social security in the 10 years before their disability began. For workers disabled before age 31, the requirement ranges down to one and a half years of covered work, depending on age.

"You can get more information about the social security disability program and the SSI program by calling or writing any social security office," Beisner said.
