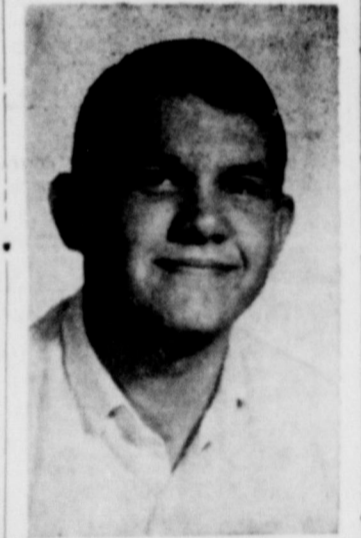

## Cotton Classing Report From Munday

The Munday Cotton Classing Office, of the U. S. Dept. of Agri., classed almost 12,000 samples during the week ending December 9. This brings the total for the season to over 68,000 samples, according to A D Peebles, in charge of the office.

Consumer and marketing service statistics for the week show grades averaging lower than the previous week. About 60 percent of the cotton was in the Light Spotted grades; 30 percent in the Spotted grades and 6 percent in the tinged grades. Leading grades for the week were Middling Light Spotted, 19 percent; Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, 38 percent and Strict Low Middling Spotted 38 percent. Thirty-five percent of the cotton was reduced in grade because of bark or grass during the week.

Peebles said staple length averaged a little shorter than the previous week. The range was as follows: 7-8 inch and shorter, 2 percent; 29-32, 35 percent; 15-16, 58 percent; 31-32, 3 percent and 1 inch and longer, 1 percent.

Micronaire readings, a measure of fiber fineness and maturity, were lower this week. About 27 percent of the cotton was in the 3.4 or lower range; 65 percent in the 3.5-4.9 range and 7 percent 5.0 and higher.

Volume of cotton selling increased during the week, as some farmers finished harvesting and turned their attention to marketing their crop. Cotton division summaries show prices steady to slightly lower, with prices mostly ranging from 30 to 65 points above loan value for Light Spotted grades. Spotted grades generally brought a little higher premium than Light Spotted grades. Average selling prices during the week for the predominate grades were Mid Lt Sp. 15-16, 18.75 cents per pound, Sim Lt Sp. 15-16, 17.80 cents and Sim Sp. 15-16, 16.20 cents per pound.
