PLANS FOR FARM AND RANCH CREDIT SCHOOL ANNOUNCED

COLLEGE STATION. — Down to earth farm problems which daily face bankers as they handle farm loans will get top billing at the second annual Farm and Ranch Credit School for Commercial Bankers. The school, scheduled for the period from December 7-10, will be held in the Memorial Student Center on the campus of Texas A & M College.

According to Tyrus R. Timm, professor of agricultural economics and program chairman, the school is sponsored by the School of Agriculture under the leadership of Dean C. N. Sheppardson. Activities begin with an informal gathering on the evening of December 7 and concludes at noon on the 10th.

The changing agricultural picture in Texas plus the drought which is well into its third year in some sections of the state has brought many serious problems to the farm loan business, but, says Timm, bankers as well as leaders of other credit agencies are to be commended for the positive steps being taken to overcome these obstacles.

Credit, points out the professor, is a mighty important and necessary part of most farming and ranching operations. Also, farm and ranch loans make up a sizeable share of the business of hundreds of Texas banks. Last year, he says, 158,915 Texas farmers and ranchmen borrowed \$571,923,000 from 851 commercial banks in the state for carrying on their agricultural enterprises.

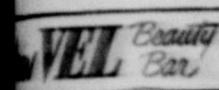

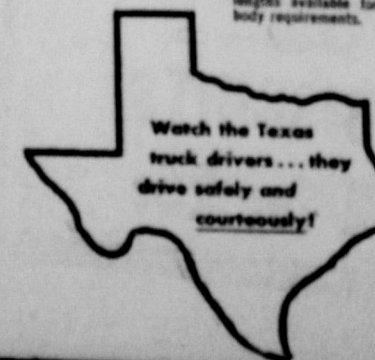
