A reduction of fifty dollars on all models of Ford cars was announced Tuesday by Warren Brothers, following telegraphic advices from the factories at Detroit. This put the price of Fords lower than ever before. For instance the new Detroit price on the touring car, without starter, is \$298. With freight and war tax added, this places the Knox City price at \$375, as compared with the previous lowest price of \$395.

Depart From Girlish Frocks

Coming Winter May See Passing of Flapper Type of Dress, Writer Asserts.

Fashions are becoming more sophisticated. The flapper has met a formidable rival in the woman. So this winter, writes a fashion correspondent in the New York Tribune, may see the passing of the flapper type of dress.

All of the new styles show a strong tendency to depart from the juvenile types so prevalent during the past few years. They embody dignity and importance, two characteristics which of late years have been almost entirely lacking in dress.

The long skirt and the many variations of drapery now in use have helped to bring about these changes. The important part played by racy rather handicaps the amateur dressmaker. No more can she hope to be dressed in the height of fashion in the simple chemise frock which she made so easily. No she must include in her wardrobe gowns draped on classic lines.

The ways in which drapery has vacillated in the position that it shall take in regard to the dress is somewhat astonishing. It began by adorning the side of the frock. After assuming numerous other positions it now elects to make the front, the most important part of the gown.

Circular Effects Obtained.

Many think it comparatively easy to popularize a new style and that women are waiting to welcome anything new and striking in dress. This is not so. A real change in fashions is brought about very, very slowly. It is months, sometimes a year, after a style is shown before it is accepted even in a limited way. Take, for instance, the circular skirt. Two years ago designers put their best efforts into models with circular skirts in an endeavor to make this fashion popular, and during the intervening time the best creators of styles have from time to time tried to force them. But it is only this autumn that we see this type of skirt making real progress.

It is not unusual to see skirts that are plain and tight across the back with circular panels in the front and at the sides, thus making a compromise between the straight line and the circular.

While daytime dresses show fan-shaped godets and front drapings, there is a strong tendency toward really wide skirts for the evening.

Skirts are very long. Lanvin, always the exponent of youth in dress, makes her models longer than those of any other dressmaker in Paris. So we may expect to see the extremely long-skirted frock taken up by young girls. This always is favorable to the success of a fashion, because all women like to appear youthful, and the style that youth elects to make its own invariably becomes the prevailing mode.

Deviate From Bateau Neckline.

Designers are trying to do away with the popular bateau neckline, and in their endeavor have introduced several interesting outlines for the necks of dresses, among the most unusual being the one-sided effect. There is the deep V-shaped neck cut high at the back and extremely low in front. This type requires a gilet or modesty piece, as the French call it.

A new French frock in which the one-sided effect is exaggerated almost to the point where it becomes bizarre, is important, as it stresses the strong tendency toward one-sided effects in both neckline and sleeve. On one side

the dress is cut so high that it nearly forms a collar and slopes so far to the opposite side that it falls over the shoulder. The right side shows one long, tight sleeve, while there is no sleeve for the left side.

Another model emphasizing this tendency in dress is of pure Greek inspiration, the drapery falling in classic lines from the right shoulder. This is a Poiret model in rose, blue and white silk, with a very unusual trimming consisting of crocheted bands wrapping about the shoulders.

One-Side Trimming.

Hats as well as dresses have come under the influence of one-sided trimming. Some unusual trimmings appear. A lace scarf tied in a tailored bow on a plain velvet hat is quite out of the ordinary. Following in the

train of the long trailing scarfs used on hats during the past summer, the ends of this lace scarf fall to the wearer's knees. This is a simple type of hat but extremely picturesque and graceful.

Metal lace is far more popular in autumn millinery than it deserves to be, for nothing less practical is a hat trimming could well be imagined. Many of the high-crowned hats of the Second Empire period show one-sided trimmings in the form of birds or clusters of small feathers.

Great extravagance is apparent in the lavish use of fur trimmings on this autumn's clothes. Chinchilla and monkey head the list. Monkey in black is still a big leader, though gray and sable color will be much in demand. Narrow double fringes of monkey set together with a fancy braid are much used as a trimming.

There is every indication that many short capes will be worn—that is, cape collars nearly large enough to be considered wraps. It is in these pieces that the furrier shows his artistry in making patterns in one fur and filling the interstices with a second fur.

The New Coiffure

Hairdressing has always played an important part in the history of fashion. Today the coiffure and its appendages are receiving even more attention than usual. Aside from the fact that a woman's appearance is either made or marred by the manner in which she dresses her hair, there was found to be a keen reaction from the far-reaching bobbed-hair vogue. Indeed, it would hardly seem appropriate to combine the more dignified types of dresses and their lengthened and draped lines with anything but real dignity in hairdressing.

In Paris at the present time the fashion is to draw the hair back tightly to reveal the ears. For some time past even the woman who was the fortunate possessor of beautifully shaped ears was compelled to dress her hair so as to completely conceal them.

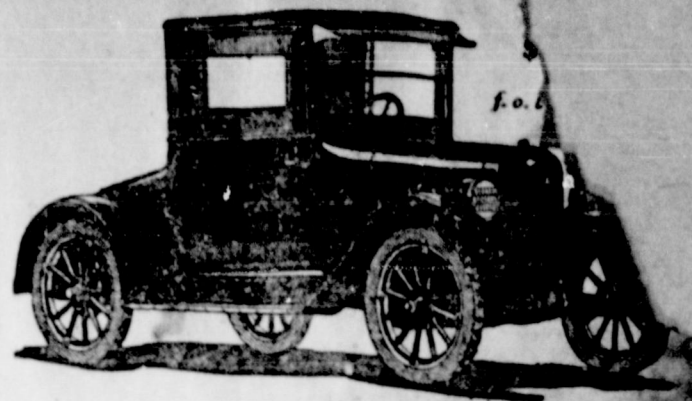
In the winter of 1921 this mode of hairdressing was affected by many smart women, particularly in Paris, but was not taken up very widely, nor with much enthusiasm. There is still

some doubt as to whether it will be generally accepted this year because it is undoubtedly a trying fashion.

Many women will not be willing to adopt this mode of hairdressing in the daytime, but will, aided by one of the new hair bands, find it quite attractive in the evening. These bands are made of tinsel-edged velvet leaves colored to match the gown, of rhinestones and velvet combined, of metallic brocades, silver lame, flowers and feathers, as well as all sorts of pearl, crystal and colored beads.

Occasionally the maker of the evening gown designs a headdress to accompany it. With the wide choice which obtains in the selection of hair ornaments and bandages and the opportunity of having a real artist create a suitable one, there is no longer any necessity for wearing anything inappropriate or unbecoming.

WORK OF REHABILITATION

There are more than 130,000 students enrolled under the rehabilitation division of the United States Veterans bureau, which makes it the largest trades and industrial school in the world. The students are scattered all over the country and are being trained in the leading colleges, commercial and technical schools, as well as on farms, in shops and in business establishments, and almost every vocation is included in the preparatory work which they are doing. Each man is taking the course in which his particular disability will not prove a handicap, or will inconvenience him in the least. It is the general impression that most of the men taking this rehabilitation training have suffered the loss of arms or legs, but as a matter of fact only a small percentage are amputations.

HAND WORK COACHES OF VARIED COLORS

of Printing Machine
Revolutionized the
Calico Industry.

System Adopted by Which Unlettered
Burmese Are Enabled to Recognize
Their Proper Compartments.

days before the printing ma-
chine was invented or even until its
invention, calico cloth was
printed by hand by the block method.
In this method the design was out-
lined on the surface of a wooden block,
the outlines were bounded by pieces of
brass or copper and the surface filled
in with felt to hold the color, and
sometimes designs of as many as
three or four colors were printed by
this method. When the block was com-
pleted it was dipped in a color box and
the pattern was then impressed upon
the fabric by stamping by hand; and
for each color to be printed the cloth
had to be stamped by a separate op-
eration. The work was slow and la-
borious and in printing even some pat-
terns that were printed in those days
it would take a man and one or two
helpers a whole year to print as many
yards of cloth as can be printed on a
modern printing machine in probably
a day or little more.—Boston Trans-
cript.

A Burmese train is a variegated af-
fair, the first-class carriage being
painted white, the second-class green,
and the third-class brown. The rea-
son for this is that though they are
also marked first, second and third in
the usual way, the native, whether
Burmese, Shan or other tribe, cannot
read these figures. He can, however,
distinguish one color from another,
and he knows that brown is the color
for his part of the train. When travel-
ing by train at night in Burma it is
advisable to keep the window up, oth-
erwise at stopping places a long brown
arm is quite sure to be inserted and
next morning some of one's cherished
property will be found to have van-
ished. The Burman has quite recon-
ciled himself to the railway as a mode
of transit, but whether he goes today
or tomorrow is quite immaterial to
him. It is quite common to see a party
of Burmese peacefully slumbering on
the platform while their train is
steaming out of the station.—Wide
World.

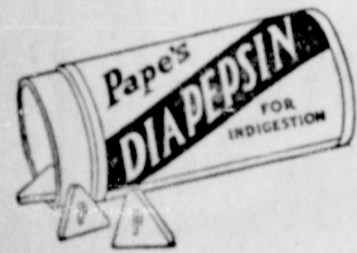

Texas News

Jackson County cotton crop is about harvested. Edna gins have ginned 4100 bales, while about 6000 bales have been made in the county.

The attorney general's department has approved a \$675,000 school house bond issue of the Port Arthur independent school district. The bonds mature serially and bear 5 per cent.

There were 51,970 head of cattle dipped in Shelby county during the month of September. That is an increase over the month of August, which was 49,596 head.

"Valley Sweet" grapefruit is being brought to the local stores at San Benito in sufficient quantities to supply demand.

The attorney general's department has approved an issue of \$2,000 of Garza County court house and jail bonds, payable in forty years, with 10-year option, and bearing 5½ per cent interest.

The annual convention of the Texas Hotel Keepers' Association of Texas will be held in Houston December 12 and 13, according to a decision reached at a meeting of the board of directors of the organization at Houston.

Half of the teams in the Texas Baseball League will be handled by new managers in 1923. The holdovers are Jake Atz at Port Worth, Walter Salm at Wichita Falls, Hub Northen at San Antonio and Pat Newnam at Galveston.

The yellow cosmos plants set out all over Cuero last spring under the influence of the Cuero Civic League are in full bloom now. The cosmos was planted with a view to having the city the more beautiful for the November turkey trot.

Bond issues in the sum of \$150,000 for road improvement and park purposes were approved recently by the voters, large majorities being noted in each vote. For road \$100,000 was voted, with an additional \$50,000 for drainage.

Only six counties made application for road construction aid at the regular monthly meeting of the state highway commission at Austin, and all were taken under advisement. The counties asking for aid are Brewster, Brooks, Matagorda, Shelby, Rockwall and Travis.

Bell County cotton ginnings are over 50 per cent in excess of the same period last year, the government report showing 26,241 bales for 1922 as compared with 16,283 for 1921. The crop is estimated at 40,000 bales this year by good judges and its money value placed at \$4,500,000, or about \$100 per capita. This is an increase of approximately \$5 per capita over last year, or about \$1,600,000.

Eighteen Texas federal aid highway projects, including 186 miles of road, have been found to be in unsatisfactory condition by the federal highway bureau, according to information received this week by State Highway Engineer Fauntleroy from federal authorities. The projects are in the following counties: Hays, Valverde, Dickens, Randall, Foard, Fisher, Wheeler, Falls, Caldwell, Freestone, Milam, Sabine and Cass.

The state fire insurance commission is without authority to assess penalties against cities, towns, villages and localities for "bad fire records," the attorney general's department has ruled. During the present year the commission has assessed a bad fire record penalty against the following towns: Sweetwater, 3 per cent; Cisco, 15 per cent; Pecos, 15 per cent; Conroe, 15 per cent, and Venus, 15 per cent.

The attorney general's department has held that a person who has been admitted into the Confederate Home, or into the Confederate Woman's Home, remains an inmate of such home during his or her absence therefrom on a furlough or other leave of absence, and during such absence such person is entitled to only one-half of the amount of the pension such person would be entitled to if he or she had not been admitted into such home.

Commissioner of Insurance and Banking Chapman has authorized the statement that 80 per cent of the troubles of the state banking system are over and that for the first time in many months conditions are much brighter. He further made the announcement that on October 1 dividends were paid from five closed state banks ranging from 10 to 20 per cent and that on November 1 ten such banks will pay dividends extending from 10 to 20 per cent. At this time there are thirty-five state banks in course of liquidation and thus half of them are paying dividends.

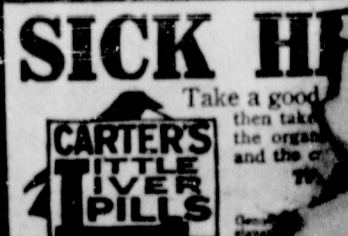

OWSLEY COMMANDER OF AMERICAN LEGION

TEXAN ELECTED ON FIRST BALLOT BY NEW ORLEANS CONVENTION.

WAS NOMINATED BY DAVIS

Former Texas State Commander Puts Aside Own Ambitions to Support Denton Man.

New Orleans, La.—Col. Alvin M. Owsley of Denton was elected, upon the first ballot, the new commander of the American Legion.

The only man feared by his followers was Col. Joseph Thompson of Pennsylvania, who was being urged by his home State as a dark horse and who also had the backing of Ohio.

However, the results of the vote show that Owsley received a good clear majority on the first ballot, and the vote came from every section of the United States. Maine, Washington, Oregon, Arizona, Florida and others voted for him.

The finance committee appointed by Commander Owsley will consist of General Metcalf, who will hold the year term of office, Bennett Clark "Bassett" who will serve for two years, and Joseph McQuigg of Ohio, who will serve three years.

The most interesting thing of the evening was the speech made by Major V. Davis of Denton, who had played a part in nominating Owsley. He had divided the vote between Owsley and Davis.

He finished his speech by saying that he was leaving the command to Owsley.

1000 HEAD OF CATTLE TO BE SHIPPED TO MEXICO

Plan to Send 200 Cowboys With Animals From South Areas of Texas and New Mexico.

El Paso, Texas.—With arrangements being made to ship to Mexico some 40,000 to 50,000 head of cattle from New Mexico and a large number from Western Texas, where ranges in general are in very poor condition, local railroads report a serious shortage of stock cars.

Negotiations are now pending with Gov. Ignacio Enriquez for rental of range land in the State of Chihuahua. O. H. Marron of Albuquerque, N. M., is one of a committee of three named by the district manager of the War Finance Corporation to confer with the Chihuahua Governor. He was here Friday on his way to Chihuahua City, where he will seek to obtain assurance from the executive that the American cattle will be protected from bandits. State lands probably will be used for grazing the herds, it was said.

It is planned to send 200 cowboys with the cattle and request will be made that they be allowed to carry arms.

If satisfactory terms can be arranged the big cattle movement will start without delay. The Texas dry area extends from El Paso to Big Spring and Del Rio. That of New Mexico covers practically the entire State.

Off for Far East.

St. Paul, Minn.—Bound for Vancouver and the Orient, the baseball mission to Japan, China and the Philippines passed through here Monday. There are twenty-six in the party including thirteen ball players. One game may be played in Vancouver, delaying the sailing until Oct. 20.

Conference Date Is Set.

Paris.—The Near Eastern peace conference date has been tentatively set for Nov. 13 at Lausanne. The preliminary conference, which it had been supposed to hold in London, was postponed after France had refused to accept London as the meeting place.

The progress of the school is in general highly satisfactory. The teachers and others express themselves as being of the opinion that a larger per cent of pupils are really working than one finds doing so in the average school. The grades on the report cards last week were in the main very good. Of course allowance must always be made for the individuals who will not apply themselves and who refuse to accept an education, but these persons are few in number in the Knox City school.

Such splendid records were made during the first six weeks of school by Joe Pate and Oli Reynolds, sixth grade pupils, that Mr. McKewen very abruptly moved them to the seventh grade for a trial. The last report we had of these boys they were making good. They have our congratulations in thus saving a year for themselves in active life.

Work toward the re-organization of the library is progressing steadily. A new table and other furniture, made by the boys of the agriculture classes, is being installed and it is hoped soon to have this part of the school operating as orderly as the library of any school in West Texas. It is hoped to make many additions to the library a little later in the form of references for the various classes.
