AUSTIN -- Comptroller Bob Bullock issued checks totaling \$19.9 million Thursday to Texas cities in the second round of monthly city sales

The May payments were up from the \$16.1 million rebated April 15 when the monthly system replaced the old quarterly rebate system with its 60 to 90-ded, lag time.
But, Bullock said, the big

payment will come in June when city allocations are made of the qurterly returns paid by merchants since April 30. The great bulk of that money hadn't reached the Comptroller's office by the May 2 cutoff date for the May

The May rebates were the Comptroller between April 4, the cutoff for April's payments, and May 2, Bullock

Checks put in the mail Thursday went to 700 of the 809 cities which have the one per cent sales tax. The remaining small cities fell below the \$500 level at which monthly payments are not

All rebates, regardless of size, will be issued in June, Bullock said.

Knox City's second monthly check amounted to \$2,619.89, up from the \$1346 received last month.

We should not look at things seen for they are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal. Faith is taking God at His word and asking no questions. Faith is knowing that. "All things work together for good to them that love God."

There is only one kind of human being in this world that can please God, and that is one who has the faith of Heb. 11:6, "But without faith it is impossible to please God; for he that cometh to God must believe that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him.

CROP REPORTS FROM FARMERS NEEDED

During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionaire from Charles E. Caudill, Agricultural Statistician in Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting

Service in Austin. This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information

on Texas' most basic industry agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agricul-

Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and county totals.

About Your Social Security

Working persons under 72 getting social security retirement, survivors, or dependents payments should report any changes in their 1975 earnings estimates as soon as possible, according to Carl R. Beisner, claims representative for the Vernon SSA

Social security payments to people 72 and over aren't affected by their earnings. 'But earnings can affect payments to persons under 2." Mr. Beisner said. "They should report any change in their work or earnings on the post card sent to people who work and get social security checks. If the post card is lost, the report can be made by calling or visiting any social security office.'

The Vernon social security office is at 1701 Cumberland. The phone number is, 817 552-9346.

'Persons who find they are earning less than they originally estimated may get additional social security payments during 1975 if they report the change." Mr. Beisner said. "But those earning more than they originally estimated who don't report the change may get social security payments not due them and have to pay back some money at the end of the year

Social security payments are not affected by earnings of \$2,520 or less for the year. Payments are reduced \$1 for each \$2 earned over \$2520, but no matter how much persons earn in a year, they can get their full social security payment for any month they neither earn over \$210 nor do substantial work in their own business.

The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.



SS Recipients To Receive Rebate

A part of the tax reduction act of 1975 provided for a special \$50 payment to be made to most social security and supplemental income recipients. This will be a special one time payment paid seperately from regular social security checks, and it will come directly from the Treasury Department.

Persons eligible are those who have already applied for social security or supplemental security income before April, 1975, and who were due a check for March 1975. People who get both a social security and an SSI check will receive a \$50.00 special payment under only one program, not both, but if more than one member of the household is a beneficiary. each will get \$50.

Checks are being mailed out over a period of several weeks, and are expected to all be out by June 25. Persons who think they are eligible should contact Social Security to report they did not get a special payment if they have not received one by June 25.

Divorced Women Eligible For SS

Some divorced women may be unaware of possible social security benefits payable to them on the account of a former husband.

Women who were divorced from their husbands after being married for 20 years or longer may qualify for benefits much the same as if they never were divorced.

A woman whose divorced husband is still alive may qualify at age 62 provided the marriage lasted over 20 years, she is unmarried (even though she may have had a subsequent marriage and divorce), and is not entitled to a larger benefit on another record. The most the divorced wife of a living husband can get is 50% of what he receives.

In the case of the surviving divorced wife, one whose exage 60, or at age 50 if the woman is severely disabled. The other requirements of not being currently married, of having been married for over 20 years, and of not being eligible for a higher benefit on another account also apply. If the surviving divorced wife is age 65 or older, she may qualify for as much as 100% of what her ex-husband would get if he were alive. At ages under 65, it would be reduced. People who think they may qualify are advised to contact the Vernon social security office.

CHECK FOR PECAN CASE BEARER ACTIVITY TO

TIME INSECTICIDE TREAT. The pecan nut casebearer is a destructive pest of pecans. This insect pest attacts the small pecan nutlets in late spring. When casebearer are heavy, the insect may destroy one-third to three-fourths of the pecan crop on a tree. unless properly timed insecticidal applications are made to protect the pecan nuts from pecan nut casebearer attact.

The timing of insecticidal treatments for pecan nut casebearer control is based upon the presence of eggs on the tips of pecan nutlets and the detection of initial larvae feeding damage to pecan nutlets. The adult moth will soon by laying eggs on the pollinated nutlets, eggs should hatch in 4 to 7 days and then the young larvae will attact the small nutlets.

Knox County pecan grow-

ers should start checking pecan nutley clusters for casebearer eggs the last week of May and first week of June. The adult female moth usually lats eggs singly on the tips of pecan nutlets. The eggs are flat and blue-greenish white in coloration when first laid but assume a pinkish red color after a day or two. The eggs are small in size, but can

The pecan nut casebearer larvae, upon hatching from eggs, feed on leaf buds for a short period of time then attact the small pecan nutlets. The small larva (worm) will attact the nutlet by cutting a hole into the base of the nutlet.

be seen by the naked eye

upon close observation.

Pecan nutlets should be checked 2 to 3 times a week for eggs. When eggs are first detected on the nutley tips, insecticidal sprays should be applied in three to six days.

Where eggs are not detected but feeding damage to young nutlets are observed, insecticidal treatments should be applied immediately.

At this writing, I feel Knox County pecan trees will not need pecan nut casebearer control applications before the last day or two of May and early June may be a more logical time. To spray before the eggs have been laid and a few larvae hatching will not control the pest. A second application about seven days after the first is needed many years for effective control.

Insecticides such as Sevin, Malathion, and Zolone will: control pecan nut casebearers. Mix insecticidal sprays according to the instructions given on the LABEL of the insecticide container.

Many pecan producers will; want to apply zinc sulfate to: aid in controlling rosette (zinc. deficiency) when spraying tocontrol the pecan nut case:


